British Headquarters in France, July 4—An entire battalion of the 186th timent of Prussian infantry, recruited from the upper Rhine, surrendered yestay to the British near Fricourt. 

Germans Inactive As French **Consolidate Positions**

No Attempt to Interfere—Busy However at Verdun and Make Six Attacks Northwest of Thiaumont But Are

Paris, July 4.—The night was quiet north and south of the Somme with a French organizing the conquered positions, says the French official state-ent issued today.

ment issued today.

The Germans made no attempt to interfere with French troops which were consolidating the new positions. In addition to the batteries already captured, three more have been taken, two of which were composed of heavy guns.

French artillery is proving most destructive. In one dugout, which was wrecked by a shell, 40 corpses were found. The Germans are said to have suffered enormous losses in the fighting near Herbecourt, which the French captured. At one point between the Avre and the Aisne, a French reconnoissance penetrated as far as the support trenches.

Heavy fighting continued last night on the Verdun front. The Germans made six successive attacks northwest of Thiaumont work, from which they were driven by the French recently, a few hours after they had carried it. Last night's attacks were repulsed, the Germans sustaining considerable losses. Southwest of Fumin Wood the French made some slight progress.

The most remarkable of all operations for wounds sustained in the war was performed here recently at the Grand Palais by Professor Laurent of the Brussels University.

Corporal Rousselet had lost part of its thigh-bone by a shot. Amputation had been decided upon, when Pte. Tilliette was brought to the hospital and is leg removed. Dr. Laurent grafted the bony offshoots of Tilliette's stump on to Russelet's thigh-bone, the two solditers remaining linked together for a week like the Siamese twins. Many conscientious objectors have disregarded entirely the summons to the army. Then when brought before the recruiting tribunals they have been turned over to the military courts, where they have been dealt with practically as deserters. Many have been sentenced to prison, several to terms of hard labor of two years and others to lesser terms, ranging down to two months of mere detention, the mildest form of imprisonment. The number of objectors taken into custody up to the thirty first of May was 769. Of these 168 had been court martialed and 110 released. The others were waiting their trials. The status of these men has been the subject of much discussion in parliament and in the newspapers and charges of cruel treatment have been made freely by their friends. These charges were made regarding men who had claimed to be conscientitious objectors and whose claims were vetoed by the tribunals.

As a result of the agitation the government has decided that men undergoing punishment for disobedience on account of alleged conscientious scruples shall be transferred to civil prisons and have their cases reviewed by a judical committee which will have power to exempt them from military duty, or give them some other work of national importance.

There I had the roughest time you can imagine. I rerefused to march or turn and I was pounded and slapped on the face until I was nearly fainting. I could do no other than what I have done. I know I am absolutely wrong. Now everyone, N. C. O's, and officers are treating me like a lord."

First Jewish

Refugees From Palestine Took Glory of Gallipeli

Probably few people in Canada are aware that a Jewish unit formed a part of the British force which fought so valiantly and under such tremendous difficulties at the Dardanelles. The story is told in the current issue of The Forum, by Lieut.-Col, J. H. Patterson, who commanded the Hebrew volunteers.

Lieut.-Col. Patterson is a distinguished soldier, having served the Empire in India, South Africa and Egypt. For a time he was a member of the North West Mounted Police. He arrived in Egypt at the time when General Sir John Maxwell, the Commander-in-Chief, was looking for a suitable officer to raise and command a Jewish unit. As Col. Patterson says: "Such a thing as a Jewish unit had been unknown in the annals of the world for some two thousand years, since the days of the Maccabees, those heroic Sons of Israel who fought so valiantly and for a time, so successfully, to wrest Jerusalem from the grasp of the Roman legions."

Hundreds of people had fled into Egypt from Palestine to escape the wrath of the Turks. They were of Russian nationality, but of Jewish faith, and many of them expressed a desire to have some part in the battle for freedom under the British flag. Col. Patterson was sent to Alexandria, where the refugees from Palestine were gathered together as the guests of the British government. A call was made at the camp of Gibarri for Jewish volunteers who were paraded for the purpose of being "sworn in."

The scene is described as follows:—"It was a most imposing ceremony; the Grand Rabbi, who officiated, stood in a commanding position, overlooking the long rows of serious and intelligent-looking lads. He explained to them the meaning of an oath, and the importance of keeping it, and impressed upon them that the honor of Israel rested in their hands. He then asked them to repeat after him, word-for word, the oath of miltary obedience to myself and such officers as should be appointed over them, and with great solemnity, and in perfect unison, the men, with uplifted hands, répeated the formula.

"The Grand

by Moses, and at the end he turned to me and presented me to them as their modern leader. This memorable and historic scene aroused the greatest enthusiasm among the throng of Jewish sympathizers who had come to witness this interesting ceremony."

The Zion Mule Corps, as Col. Patterson's command was known, was the first and for several days the only transport corps on the peninsula of Helles.
Those Jewish volunteers deserve a share in the glory of Gallipoli. No finer tribute to the British Empire could be imagined than this voluntary service of refugees from Palestine, under the flag of their traditional protector and friend.
