Evacuation of Warsaw Near, Says London

London, July 20—The uppermost question concerning the eastern campaign now is when Warsaw will be evacuated rather than whether it will be given up. With virtually all of Courland in the hands of Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, and with the Austro-German forces across the Bug, continued occupancy of the Polish capital exposes the Russians to the danger of disaster.

These people must needs be fed, clothed and sheltered, and in addition, Canada is called upon

to provide a substantial portion of the wheat and foodstuffs for the old country.

Raising these foodstuffs is Canada's greatest industry. More than four millions of our people live upon the land. The crops these people have raised this year are not as great in volume as were the crops raised last year. Reliable estimates point to their being at least 30% less. But this smaller crop is selling for about 35% to 40% higher than last year's crop. Wheat, for instance, at this time last year was offered at 78c. a bushel. Today it is being held at \$1.13 bid. Other farm products are selling at about the same proportionate advance. at about the same proportionate advance.

So that, although Canada will reap a crop that may be 30% smaller than that of last year, she will get as much money for that crop, at the current increased price, as money for that crop, at the current increased price, as the received for last year's larger crop at the lower price. The point we want to make is that, despite conditions in Europe, about 55% of our population will be just as prosperous this year as they were last year. The money these 55% will have to spend will keep the remaining 45% employed. In fact, proportionately speaking, the 55% which comprises the argicultural population will be far

This year, and for possibly another two or more years, they will be spending this money for the development of cultivating facilities, and by doing so, raise a surplus that will enable them to make land payments two or three years hence without burdening themselves.

Furthermore, not all Canadian farmers have the millstone of debt hanging round their necks, so that the increased prices they receive for their crops will, in many cases, allow them a bigger spending margin than they have ever

Admitting, then, that we, as an agricultural country, are dependentt upon the crops for our prosperity, is there any cause for alarm about the small crop, when, on the face of it, the farmer is getting 35% more for his yield than he

Moreover, if this is true, it is also true that the farmer never had a greater inducement to increase his acreage than he has at the present time.

For the next two years the crops of Europe will be a negligible quantity, and Canada's agricultural products will be at a greater premium than ever.

Is is not reasonable, therefore, to suppose that Canadian farmers will be buying more equipment and supplies durCanadian manufacturer whose business is entirely governed by domestic conditions, as most manufacturing businesses in this country are?

There are only two courses open. One is a policy of curtailment and Micawber-like timidity; the other is to go on doing business as usual.

Admitting that there will not be as much business this year as there was last year, or the year before, it must also be admitted that there will not be as many men sharing in it. Some manufacturers have already quit. They seem to have lost their nerve, while other manufacturers have taken stock of resources, pulled their forces together, and girded themselves up to the point of getting every possible cent's worth of business that is to be had.

To give you an instance: Supposing there is a million dollars' worth of business to be done in a certain industry and that ten firms share it equally between them. We will assume that industry falls off 25%; that leaves \$750,-000 to divide up. But you will find that at least three, and possibly four, of the concerns in that line have lost their nerve, have closed up, or have cut down, or be showing signs of panic in other directions. The other six or seven who stay in the business with a strong resolve can

obtain just as much, if not more, buiness each, than they received in previous years. True, they may not make as much money this year as they did last year, but if they can keep their oganization together, their goodwill and standing at the end of the present crisis will be far greater than the mere matter of profit secured would indicate. And eventually their profits will be much greater, because they will be deriving

profits from an increased percentage of the extra business secured now. That is to say, whereas in normal times they only received profits on 10% of the total business done, the fact of three concerns dropping out of business will give them profits on about 13% of the total business to be done when conditions are again at normal. Not only so, but the banks are watching concerns that

have courage. The manufacturer who goes to a bank with a look on his face as though he has lost his spinal nerve is going to get the treatment he expects. But the man who meets his banker with a courage born of the certainty that the present conditions are not going to upset his business will get, within reason, the credit and support that he is looking for. Particularly is this the case with the manufacturer of an advertised product.

The man who keeps up his advertising at the present time The man who keeps up his advertising at the present time will be the last man to feel the pressure of adverse conditions. But the public is fickle, and if such a man withdraws his advertising during the present period, the banker will not only become suspicious, but the public will confirm those suspicions by transferring its allegiance to the man who uses the present to get his product before the public in a stronger and more forceful manner than ever before.

And it is a fact that a dollar spent for advertising now will give the publicity value, that, by contrast, could not be secured for \$3.00 under normal conditions.

Canada is not dependent for her prosperity upon experted manufactured goods. In fact, the balance of trade has been against her for many years. Right now, imports from Europe have decreased. Many things that were formerly made in Europe can be made in Canada by the Canadian manufacturer, if he will bring to the task the energy and ability first exercised by his European competitors. There is one other phase to this matter, and it is this:

Fall of Warsaw Is Expected

London, July 19, 11.25 p. m.—Can Warsaw be held, with the German field marshals, Von Hindenburg on the north and Von Mackensen on the south, whipping forward the two ends of a great arc around the city? It is realized in England that Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russian armies, has the most severe task imposed on him since the outbreak of the European war, and the military writers of some of the London papers seem

to think that the task is well-nigh impossible.

There was sustained confidence that Germany's previous violent at acks along the Bzura-Rawka front would never pierce the Russian line, but the present gigantic co-ordinate movement was developed with such suddenness and carried so far without meeting serious Russian resistance that more and more the British press is discounting the fall of the Polish capital, and, while not giving up all hope of its retention, is pointing out the enormous difficulty the Russian armies have labored under from the start by the existence of such a

Having been unable to straighten out their line by an advance through East Prussia, in the north, and Galicia in the south, the Russians have perpetually faced the pincers of the Austro-Germans, and if these can now be sufficiently tighened Warsaw must go, and with it the entire line.

As was the case on Saturday, when the Austro-Germans recorded the success of their offensive in the east, no official communication from either Berlin or Vienna reached the London newspapers today. Saturday's communication was released Sunday for publication, and up to nearly midnight tonight no new communication has come to hand. In the absence of additional official information from Petrograd there is nothing to throw fresh light on the eastern front, but the Austro-German advance could hardly so soon have lost its

According to the latest accounts the Austro-German forces, advancing from Przasnysz, were within forty miles of Warsaw; while to the south Von Mackensen's centre was, at certain points, within ten miles of the Lublin-Cholm rail

GERMAN SHELL FIRE George Curran Writes of One of the Unpleasant Features of the

THE WONDERFUL TRENCHES

The wonderful trenches

Streets Underground Like Chinese
Puzzles--Local Mea, Recevered,
Geing Back to Front—Colonel
Guthrie Improving

Private Bert Burden, son of Weldon
Burden, of Fredericton, who is serving in France with the French artillery, in a recent letter to a friend, says of his brother, Private Walter Burden, now a prisoner of war:

"He stench of decomposing bodies of horses and men lying in the open fields is very bad, writes George Curran to his sister, in a letter received yesterday. It was almost unbearable, but there was no escape from it. The heat in which the soldiers weres sweltering intensified the trouble, and the greatest relief one can get was to smoke, smoke, so long as the smokes lasted, to overwhelm the persistent odor from the fields.

Young Curran was in hospital for eleven weeks, but is now back in the trenches. In spite of his unpleasant environment, he says he is feeling fine. In his letter he gives interesting incidents of a day. He tells of aeroplanes in sham battle practicing for the enemy. It was a common thing to see them at the rear of the line practicing, and "they remind me of big roosters making repeated nips at one another, then backing away to strike again."

In writing of the trenches and shells used Wm. C. Wickham a Former Inspector of Mounted Police

their only drawback being the fact that they were so complicated.

"Then, too, there was always shelling and sometimes it was pretty warm. The Germans don't shell steadily, they do it fitfully, and they use big shells which do not respect anybody. Our last day was the worst. Our telephone station was in a fortified house, which had been pretty well smashed up. Our artillery was giving them fits and theirs was entertaining us, with exhibitions given by 'coal boxes' and 'whiz bangs.' The former are big long distance shells, and come with a sound like that of drawing your breath with a whistling sound. This develops into a moaning whistle, and if it is coming close to you, it takes on a hollow screaming whistle. Upon exploding an immense cloud of black dust is sent up mingled with scraps of whatever the shell has struck.

"The 'whiz-bangs' are small shells '3' shells which come like bullets. Just a high squeal, a bang and it is all over. When they strike the ground they make a hole about three or four feet across and two or three feet deep. A 'Jack Johnson' sounds like a street car, and makes a tremendous hole. I saw one hole made by a 'J. J' which was sixty-tisk feet across and five feet deep. Some class to that, eh! The shell itself stands over five feet in height, is seventeen inches in diameter, and weighs close to a ton and a half. Wouldn't it be a nice thing to meet on a dark night if von were alone I am afraid that the next time I hear a street car I will dive through the nearest cellar window. A riveting machine would send me in a wild scramble for the gutter, for it sounds just like a machine gun."


