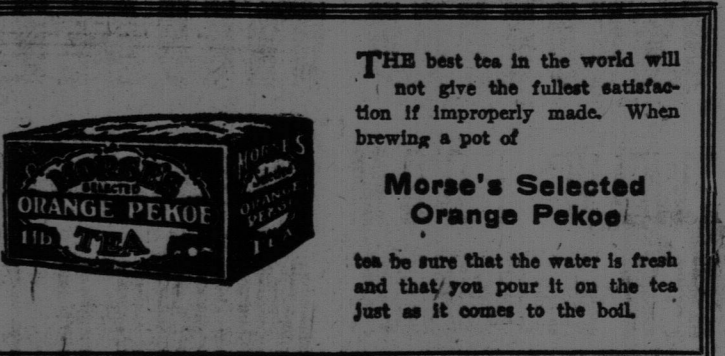

CANADA BEING MAPPE FROM AIR PICTURES

Royal Canadian Air Force Achieves Remarkable Work PHOTOS DISPLACING MAPS OF DOMINION Requests Pour Into Ottawa for Pictures, Forestry Protection, Etc.

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—A Canadian geography is veritably "up in the air." Instead of seeking the location of Toronto or Halifax or Vancouver or finding them by more black dots on a meaningless expanse of green or red map paper the student of the Dominion's splendid distances can now obtain local maps containing actual photographic reproductions of these cities as they actually appear to an aviator at altitudes ranging from 1,000 to 10,000 feet. A bird's eye view of the city has been substituted for a human eye's view of a dot.

PHOTOGRAPHS FURNISHED. Instead of Canada's official map-makers having to depend upon the coldly mathematical surveys of men on the ground and whose meridians are parallel lines stretched out through the pathless woods and over terrain never traversed by human foot the Topographical Survey branch of the Department of the Interior is now furnished with absolutely accurate photographs, vertical and oblique, thus being able to provide, in return for the sketches of the country's expanse not only the multitudinous boundary lines but also graphic pictures of the physical features lying within those boundaries.

IS ALL AIR FORCE WORK. All this is made possible by the increasingly useful work being done by the Royal Canadian Air Force branch of the Department of National Defence. Ever since the Armistice the activities of that branch, as far as civil aviation is concerned, have multiplied rapidly, and today the demands upon the service far exceed the ability to supply. Requests are coming in for survey pictures, for forestry protection, for pictures to be used in connection with school geographies, for hydro-electric power surveys, for land sub-divisions and for other commercial purposes.

ADVANCE IS REMARKABLE. There has been a remarkable advance in the practical application of a large scale of aerial photography to surveying, exploration and map production, and, in addition, to railway location and other engineering problems. An area of well over 40,000 square miles was covered in 1924 by oblique and vertical pictures for the Topographical Survey branch, and it is now fairly claimed that it has revolutionized their system of map production in many respects. The problem of aerial surveying in Canada is different from that existing in the smaller and older civilizations of Europe where ordnance survey maps are correct to the last minute detail, exist. In the Dominion the existing maps are imperfect and great areas have never been surveyed at all. The production of accurate topographical maps to keep pace with the growing demands for land settlement, lumbering operations and other activities is a difficult problem, the Air Branch admits, and despite the efforts of the Survey Services in the past generation map production still lags behind the demand.

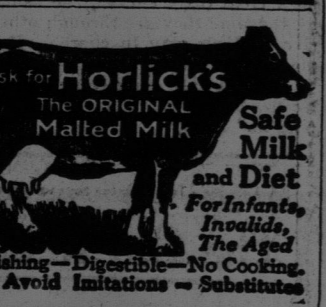
DR. O. B. PRICE IS NOMINATED

Will Contest Westmorland Seat for Conservatives in Federal Election.

Tells Convention He Will Always Fight for Maritime Rights.

SACKVILLE, Sept. 21.—Dr. O. B. Price, of Moncton, was today nominated to contest the County of Westmorland in the federal election on Oct. 29, when about 600 persons, including 200 delegates, were present at an enthusiastic convention of the Westmorland County Liberal-Conservative Association held in the Imperial Theatre. The names of Dr. Price, W. F. Humphrey and Major George O. Price, of Moncton, and H. M. Wood, of Sackville, were placed in nomination in open convention. Mayor J. F. Edgett, of Moncton, was also mentioned as a candidate, but Mr. Edgett stated that he could not possibly run at present. He might possibly accept the honor of some future time.

CANDIDATE SPEAKS. At the close Dr. Price was called to the platform and given a rousing reception. He expressed his appreciation of the honor conferred on him. He said he had not canvassed for support, but had accepted the wishes of his friends that his name be again placed in nomination. 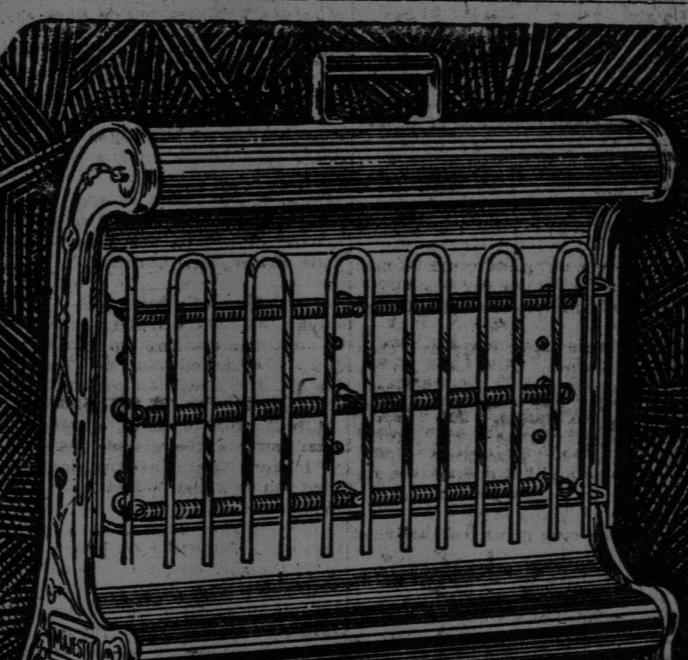

WORLD WHEAT CROP TOPS 1924 BY 8 P. C.

Harvests in Canada, Europe, North Africa Make up for U. S., India Slump.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Reports made public by the Department of Agriculture today from 29 countries representing 85 per cent of the world's wheat crop showed an 8 per cent increase in production this year over last year. Estimates of the production for these countries are placed at 2,882,000,000 bushels this year against 2,684,000,000 bushels last year. "The outstanding feature of the world wheat situation," the department said, "are the abundant harvests in Canada, Europe and North Africa, which have more than made up the deficit caused by the short crop of India and the United States."

RAIL BOARD URGED TO GIVE HEED TO MARITIME CLAIMS

Special Request Also Submitted Regarding Case for Traffic Through Canadian Ports, He Says

SAINT JOHN GIVES HIM BIG RECEPTION

West Indies Trade Agreement Defended as Portending Seaboard Development; Hope Held Out City Might Obtain Shipbuilding Work

PAYING special attention to the matter of freight rates, the West Indies trade agreement and to combating the statements made by the Opposition leader, Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada, spoke to an audience of 2,500 persons at the Imperial Theatre last evening.

The Premier and his colleagues were well received and there were no interruptions from the crowd.

During the course of his speech, Mr. King declared that the West Indies treaty, an awaiting sanction by Parliament, should be of great benefit to New Brunswick, the Maritimes and Canada as a whole.

Speaking in a foreign tongue was a difficult matter, but he believed he would receive the same indulgence that so impressed him on his former visit here.

TELLS QUEBEC LOYALTY. Canada, he said, now faced a federal election and it was well that the questions of the day should be thoroughly discussed before judgment finally was passed by the electors.

MANNER OF RATE FIXING. Regarding the matter of the fixing of rail freight rates, he declared that the Government had merely made applicable those rates fixed on by the Crow's Nest Pass agreement which had been suspended during the war.

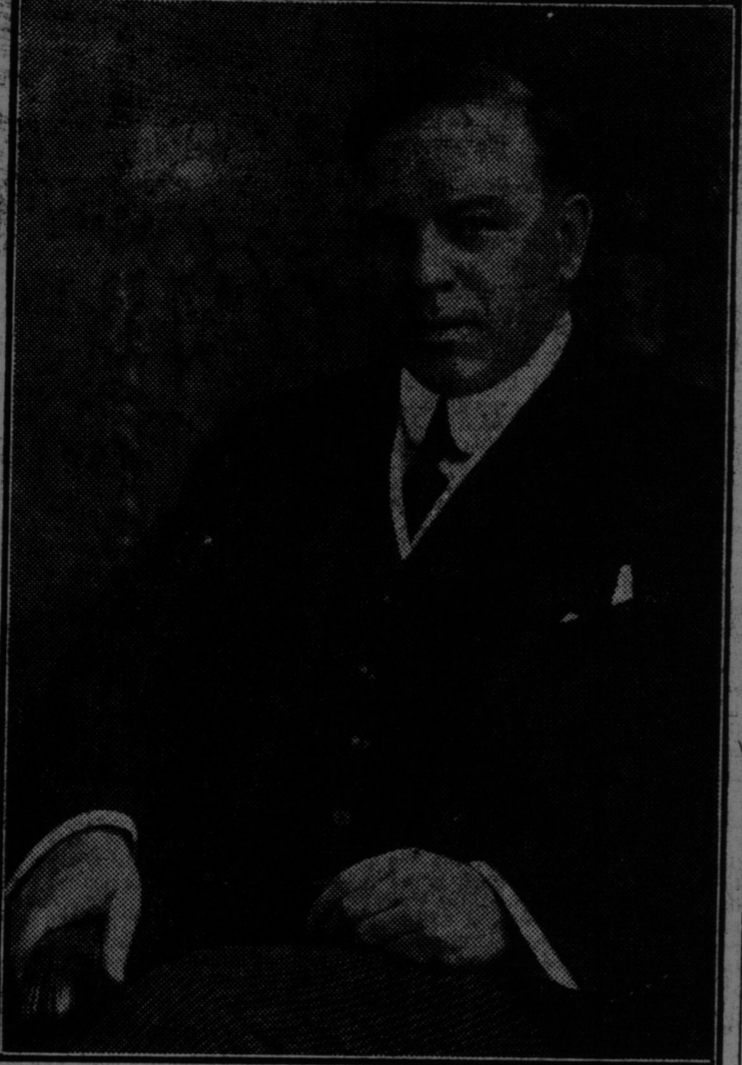
There had been special instructions issued at the time the Maritimes was put in their hands to pay attention to the contention of the Maritimes that they had a right to the rate in effect prior to 1918 and there had also been special instructions regarding the case for traffic through Canadian ports.

He attacked Mr. Meighen's statement that he should publish the terms of the West Indies agreement and declared that it had been published in two official printings and was available to anyone wishing it.

He declared that the policy of high tariff advocated by Mr. Meighen would be of benefit to only a few and that it would not help the Maritimes at all. He declared that Mr. Meighen was setting one part of the country against the other, and he expressed his belief that a policy taking into account the state of development of the country was the only possible one.

MR. COPP SPEAKS. In opening Hon. A. B. Copp said he was greatly pleased to be present with his leader. In his many years of experience in public life, he had learned that preliminary speeches were not popular, and he assured his audience that he would not be too long winded as they were all anxious to hear the Premier.

Meighen Tells Moncton People Plans to Solve Rail Problems.

HOLDS PROTECTION CANADA'S BIG NEED

Senator Robertson Says Trade Decreasing—Doubt Also Speaks.

(By C. F. Staff Correspondent.) MONCTON, Sept. 21—"Talk about annexation. There's no annexation as bad as the loss of our young men and women. If that continues this country will become just a pale, anemic shadow, a backyard, a feeding-ground for the United States. This Dominion has no chance for its industrial life save under a protective tariff."

RAILWAY RATES.

Mr. Meighen devoted a part of his speech to the question of railway rates and the policy which he proposed to pursue in regard to them if returned to power. He pledged his party to a policy of assisting the federal government of Canada to the end that their products might enter the great central markets of the Dominion under the most favorable conditions.

CHARGES FAITH BROKEN.

Mr. Meighen reiterated the policy which he said had been adopted by the former board of directors of the Canadian National Railway and which the Intercolonial Railway and its branches right up to Montreal were to be made a division of the federal system.

DIFFERENT PLAN, HE SAYS

It had been the intention of the previous Government to keep it in the National System, but it would have run through to Montreal and it would have been administered from the Maritime Provinces.

Woman Constable Takes Over Hotel

FORT FAIRFIELD, Me., Sept. 21—The Fort Fairfield Hotel company, owners of the Plymouth Hotel, announces the lease of the house to Mrs. Alice Fisher, of this town, who succeeds F. S. Huntington, proprietor. Mrs. Fisher has long been prominent in social and civic matters and is the only woman constable of the town.

AFRICAN EXPLORER DEAD.

BERLIN, Sept. 21—George August Schweinfurth, the noted African explorer, died here yesterday. He was 89 years of age. Schweinfurth, who with Livingstone, Nachtigal and others, was a pioneer explorer in Africa, headed a botanical expedition in the Nile Valley, 1864-68. He discovered the Wells River in 1870. His works include "In the heart of Africa."

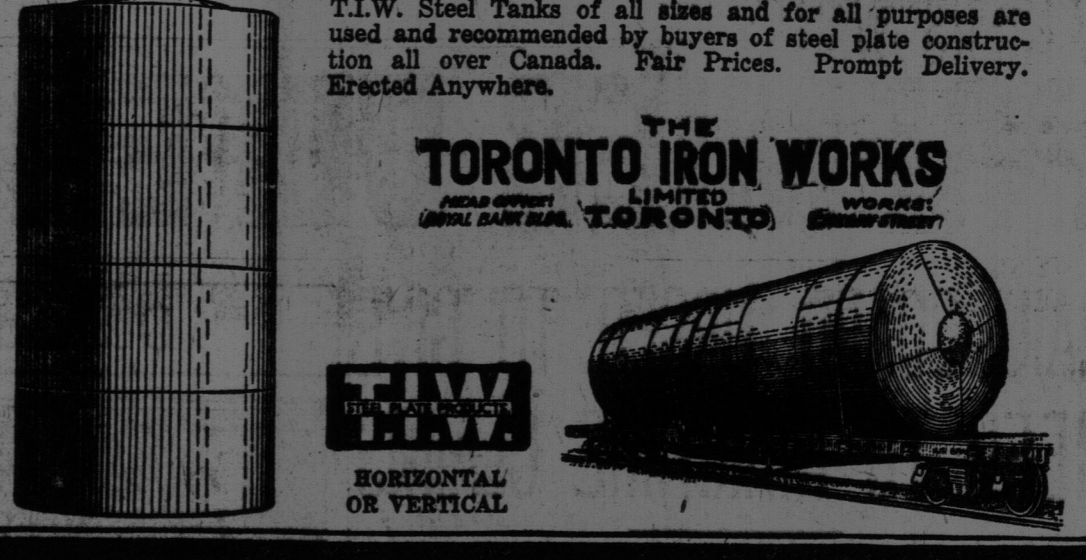

The small cost of a "Want Ad." is a secondary consideration. The object is results. Therefore, never cheepere here and there to save an odd cent or two. By doing so the value of the entire ad. may be destroyed.

When writing your "Want Ad." put yourself in the place of the reader, and answer the questions you yourself would naturally ask.

If you have a flat to rent, the home seeker wants to know more than a plain statement of the fact. He wants to know how many rooms there are; if there is hot water; bath; electric lights; garage, etc., and the amount of the rent.

Your flat may be a \$60 a month home, but if you don't say so in your ad, the \$60 a month tenant may not reply, thinking perhaps it is a \$15 a month flat.

**HAS OPERATED IN MANY LANDS**

**Prisoner in Moncton Pleads Guilty to Passing Bad Checks**

**Had Passport Issued in Berlin and Bank Paper Totalling Over \$12,000.**

MONCTON, Sept. 21.—W. E. Caleb who was arrested at Salsbury Saturday night on a warrant in connection with the passing of spurious checks, pleaded guilty in the police court here today and was remanded until Wednesday for sentence. The prisoner admitted guilt on two charges of fraud on warrants sworn out by F. Gordon Wright and R. F. Dickson.

Although he answered in court to the name of Caleb, the police believe that his real name is Karl Thiel, and that he is of German origin. He has travelled also under the aliases of W. F. Wesselhooff, F. C. Hunter and F. C. Holser, the authorities say.

When brought to the city Thiel protested that his name was Fred C. Hunter. He was identified here by Gordon Wright and by Alderman Budd Taylor as the man who had passed the checks in July, last, under the name of W. E. Caleb. Among his effects were found carefully concealed between the pages of a magazine a number of photostatic checks similar to the ones he had passed here.

TOTAL OVER \$12,000.

The certified checks were in the amounts of \$5,125.00, \$1,200, \$212.44, \$500, a total of \$8,300.24 and payable in blank. In addition there were other checks amounting to \$3,812.98. Papers found in the hands of Thiel indicated that he had been in various parts of South America, Central America and the West Indies and parts of the United States and that he had worked under the names of Thiel, W. E. Caleb, W. F. Wesselhooff, F. C. Hunter and F. C. Holser.

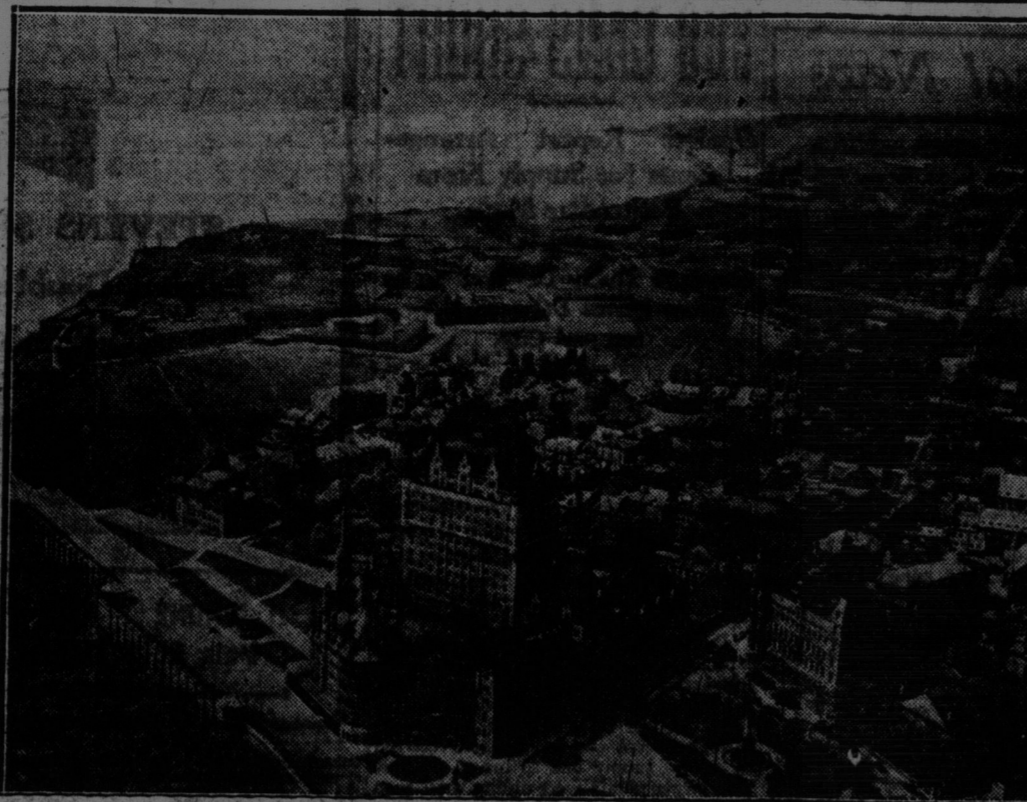
