THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY, 19TH JANUARY, 1892.

The Thirty-Third Annual Meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal was held on Tuesday, 19th January, 1892.

At half-past ten o'clock a.m. His Lordship celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay, Dr. Norton, Canon Fulton

The Bishop's charge was as follows:-

HIS LORDSHIP'S CHARGE.

Dear Brethren in Christ, both clergy and laity, fraternal greeting:-

So short a time has elapsed since we last assembled in Syaod, that the usual review of the work of the Church would scarcely be in place; nevertheless, I may be permitted to say, that through God's mercy I have been enabled to visit the portion of the Diocese usually served in the time that has passed since we last met. I shall, however, confine my remarks to general matters which have arrested my attention since the meeting in June, and to those thoughts which have been suggested by the meeting itself. Promin. ent amongst these thoughts are the valuable statistics given in the report of our deceased and mourned brother, the Rev. Robert Acton, in his lifetime Immigration Chaplain for the Diocese. In the midst of much ill-health and weakness he continued his duties to the end, and his last report, his fifth annual report (as he tells us), may be ranked as one of the most valuable documents brought under the notice of the Synod of 1891. I will not pass to a review of the report itself before expressing my regret at his loss. His simple piety and unaffected kindliness of heart endeared him to all who knew him; and had his health been equal to his earnestness and good will, he would certainly have ranked amongst the foremost of our missionary clergy for purity of intention and conduct and religious influence over those

The report of the Immigration Chaplain for 1891 informs us that over 4000 i mmigrants had remained in Montreal and the neighborhood for local settlement in the course of the preceding year; of these 4000 nearly 3000 were Protestant, and as 2709 were English, we may infer that there was amongst them a large accession to our own Church. I find Mr. Acton's suggestions under the head of " accommodations" most sensible and practical, and I hope that the country clergy, especially, will give the report close attention,

and do all they can to aid our present Immigration Chaplain, the Rev. J. F. Renaud, Rural Dean, that he may profit by the experience of his predecessor, and that the least possible loss may be felt in the work, a result which would certainly be agreeable to the pious and unselfish mind of our deceased brother.

We have been advised by the Trustees appointed under the will of the late E. E. Shelton, Esq., that no income from the "Shelton Fund" must be looked for during the coming year. I must urge therefore upon clergy and laity the necessity for increased contributions to the "Mission Fund," that we may not lose ground in the meantime, nor incur a load of debt, which for years may hamper us to pay. The Rev. Rural Dean Naylor enquires, in his Deanery report of last year, whether the Executive Committee will eventually make up the arrears of stipend due to the clergy in certain missions. The promise on the part of the people seems to be beyond performance, especially in the missions of Aylwin and Portage du Fort. They are in arrears \$298 and \$150 respectively, and these are of course constantly increasing amounts.

The balance in favor of the Mission Fund, which in 1883 amounted to \$4000, has steadily diminished until it is now only about \$400. There are many vacancies in the Diocese which ought to be filled, but I hesitate to appoint in such a state of the funds, and trust that a generous effort will be made in every church in the Diocese to increase the amount at the disposal of the Executive Committee for missionar y purposes.

Nothing satisfactory has yet been arrived at in the matter of appointment to vacant rectories. It is most desirable that some word or sentence be introduced into the Canon on "Patronage of Rectories," whereby it shall be plain to all interested, that at least two of the names returned to the Bishop for selection shall be the names of clergymen quite agreeable to the vestry, and otherwise eligible, so that in choosing either of these names the Bishop may be sure, while in the exercise of his privilege of choice, that he is in sympathy with the vestry.

I desire to ask those who advocate, and those who contribute to the support of missions in the Northwest, when they appropriate their contributions, to bear in affectionate recollection the missions in the neighborhood of Moose Factory. The missions approach very nearly to our own Diocese, not only by contiguing a ferritory, but because one of our well-known and much loved Montrea clergy, the Rev. J. A. Newnham, has chosen the remote and inhospitable shores of Hudson Bay as the site of his labours in the Gospel field. Let us give him heartily of our prayers and good wishes, and let us no less heartily support his work, with our substance, out of our goodwill.

The Church Home as to its administration continues to give me satisfaction. But I am disappointed and distressed because so little encouragement s given to the Charitable Fund, upon which the destitute, or nearly destitute, women depend. The result of the collections just made is very meagre, but little over \$1100. The Treasurer asked for, and really required, \$2500, which is a moderate sum to be the mainstay of so useful and respectable an Institution. The consequence is that the accounts for 1891 closed with a deficit, and without funds in hand to meet the calls of the new year. The deficit is not large, but it is a balance on the wrong side, and it makes me anxious for the future of the Institution. I trust that assistance will be volunteered by some of our wealthy Church members, in the shape of regular subscriptions, of sufficient amount to form a dependable income. The response to the appeals I made in the parish churches on behalf of this charity was very general, but coming in small sums of \$1 and under, with some \$5, and very few of larger amount, it takes a great many of them to provide food and lodging for a year, even for one person. I trust that something reliable will be done, for we cannot expect an honorary committee of ladies to carry the burden of want of money, in addition to the cares and anxieties inseparable from the management of an institution full of aged and infirm women. The Church Home is unendowed, and therefore entirely dependent uponvoluntary contributions, which must not be withheld it it is desirable to

Although I cannot find in our Constitution any express mention of Church property used for educational and Charitable purposes (probably because none existed when the Constitution was drafted), I should be glad to know what the Bishop's responsibility is, when he is officially President or Governor of such an Institution; I suppose the subject would come under the head of temporalities. Apart from those we have now, viz., the Theological College, the Church Home, the Dunham Ladies College, all of which possess more or less real estate, I have been approached on the subject of other charities which would also bring with them some substantial property. We cannot expect honorary committees to take office year after year, without some assurance of general interest and support, and those who present to us valua. able gifts in houses and lands have a right to expect that we shall take care of them. I would like to know, therefore, upon what terms a charitable property should be accepted by the Bishop, in the name of the Church, and what precautions are proper for its maintenance and stability. Gifts for the use of the poor arean essential part of Christianity, without which our Church is maimed and crippled. I should be glad to see the house in Guy street free of mortgage. Something solid should be done for it, that it need not so often touch the confines of insolvency, to the discouragement of its managers and the discredit of the Church. It would be a very great misfortune to lose the

Church Home. It is our representative charity, the only charitable institution in direct connection with the Diocese. Some of our Church people have expressed disappointment because the corporation does not do a more extensive work, but this seems to me unreasonable in the face of such limited support. But there is indeed much need of more kindred work, and I would gladly encourage an increase of philanthropy, properly based and sustained. We need a "Boys Home" of our own, also an "Immigrant Home," where the Church could receive and foster her own people. But I am decidedly of opinion that we must first do our duty by those we have already.

I take this opportunity to repeat and confirm the remarks I made in June in regard to the Montreal Diocesan Theological College. We cannot do without this right arm of the Church in the Diocese of Montreal, and I hope those who are able will contribute liberally to its support. The subscriptions promised annually for five years lapsed with 1891, and it is most necessary that they should be renewed without delay. I may be permitted to allude to the generous offer of Mr. George Hague, who promised \$5000 to the Endowment Fund of the College if within three years the capital sum now possessed—\$29,000—be increased to \$100,000, of which his own contribution shall form a part. This kind and generous offer should stimulate to good works, and I trust that you all will do your best, so to contribute of your store, that we may be able to claim his bounty without delay.

The College teachers and lecturers, who are well known to you through their parish duties, are sufficient guarantee that the instruction given to the Students is sound and practical. The younger of my clerical brethren, especially those young men appointed to work in distant missions and solitary places, must be careful, while tending the Lord's vineyard, not to neglect personal culture. Dependent to a great extent upon books to keep them, in touch with the educated world, they must exercise judgment in the selection of their voiceless companions, and in the quiet of their secluded homes make choice of good life-long friends. In these days of universal literature, much is required of the pastor and spiritual teacher. To go in and out amongst his people with mutual respect and goodwill, he must be a man of considerable general information, and (I need scarcely add) he must be well taught in the subjects proper to his holy vocation. A minister must be able to instruct and comfort his people on the one hand, and to sympathize with their religious aspirations and more elevated thoughts on the other, and even more than this is desirable if a man's leisure and his mental capacity render it possible. It is desirable as leading to useful influence that the minister should be able to enter into and enjoy the general tastes of his parishioners (where they are elevating and good), even though they should be (what are generally called) eccular. The pastor who would be the true shepherd of his flock must not live to himself, he must spend and be

spent on the happiness and sorrows of other people; and in order to be able for these high duties, he must form and watch his own character with prayerful anxiety and humble desire to excel. To be a witness for Christ, he must be Christlike. He must receive power from the Holy Ghost, and manfully exert himself, in dependence on that power, to follow the leadings of that Holy Spirit. All great characters stand out with marked individuality. In this age, when all educated men (whether commercial, scientific, literary, religious or irreligious) are seeking for themselves a distinct individuality, can the clergyman afford to dissipate his energy in a meaningless round of perfunctory duty? No! his character must preach as well as his lips, his influence must be personal as well as professional, if he would make a success of his ministry or mature his own soul for the world to come. No sturdy man will allow his circumstances to spoil his character; he has received power from the Holy Ghost, and he will bend circumstances to the formation of character. In the comparative quiet of youth and inexperience, preparations will be made for the excitement and hurry of middle life, when the storm grows fierce, and the exigencies of responsibility as witnesses for Christ present themselves one on another, without pause or order of coming. Let the young clergyman then make a good use of his youth. The young men of this generation have special talents committed to their charge, talents which their predecessors did not possess. It is easy now to possess good and cheap literature of every kind and in almost every language. Make a choice-read in a good and useful line; make yourselves generally well informed. Employ your time profitably; lay up material for thought, and vigorous power of thinking will build up the individual character, ready to be tempered and matured by the contact of other minds-a contact which the chances and changes of this mortal life will be sure to bring when you are ready for it. Make friends of good books; in the meantime I will add, nothing must come between you and your Bible. It must be your constant companion. You will know the text well and accurately, lest you be shamed at the outset of your career by the better information of those you come to teach. The Bible, thank God, is in every hand, and every child can read it; guard therefore against the neglect with which we are apt to meet familiar things. Next to the Bible itself (with the comments and instructions of learned and competent men) comes the Prayer Book. It would be a shame if you were not thoroughly acquainted with the history and the teaching of the Prayer Book, as a book for prayer and a comment on the word of God it has no equal.

If you will take a lesson taught by the experience of more than sixtyyears, you will make your Prayer Book your faithful friend. Then come the lives of good and great men, both modern and ancient, an acquaintance with which will help you materially to that distinctive character which is SESSION.]

so desirable. Characters differ-good characters as well as bad. On this subject we have the judgment of our Lord Himself. "Wisdom," He said, " is justified of all her children." All men idealize at the outset of life-that is, all civilized and educated men. The more imaginative the man the more he idealizes. Of life he makes a mental plan, a pattern, and fills it in with things and men in accordance with these preconceived The missionary while still at college maps out his field of work, fills it in with sermons and services, with congregations of men and women, with schools full of respectful and teachable children. He drives over the country with patient regularity, is the welcome friend at store and farm-house, he builds churches, parsonages and schools. He loves his work and his grateful people (they must be grateful), his gentle imagination cannot doubt it. Has he any thought but for their welfare? Any plan apart from their good? Has he any wish in life but to befriend them? If they are sick he will visit them! If they are poor he will relieve them! If they are ignorant he will teach them! When they are good he will praise them, and when they sin he will exhort them to repentance and show them the better way! But in the mission field, at all events-the people ideafize too. In many a store and farm-house, men and women waiting for a new Pastor form an image of him in advance. Each member of the expectant congregation has a very decided notion of what the man should be who is soming to settle down amongst them. They know what they want to hear,-they know what they want to do, -they know how the man must behave, who is to stand to them in the intimate relation of pastor, teacher, friend and neighbor! How seldom, how very seldom, these ideals are realized we all know very well; as it is now, so it was of old time. John the Baptist came neither eating nor drinking. This did not please. His want of social qualification was a disease if not a crime; they said " he has a devil." The Son of man-the lover of humanity itself-the gentle Saviour-the pure and holy Jesus-came eating and drinking, living the common life of ordinary men, present at the marriage feast, a guest in the house of Pharisee and publican, an intimate in the house of Bethany, but this did not please. Idlers as they lounged, scoffers watching in temple and synagogue, thoughtless chatterers and thoughtful cynics, agreed together to disapprove; "behold," say they, "a gluttonous man and a wine-bibber, a friend of publicans and sinners!" The servant is not greater than his Lord, and where the unerring and sympathetic Saviour failed to please on the one hand, and the holy and uncompromising Baptist on the other, the young minister, however devoted and ardent, should not fret and complain because he does not all at once give universal satisfaction. Rather should he remember his own faults and failings, and looking to the pattern life placed before him in the Gospel, study to be patient and humble, especially while making that

experience for which he may hope to derive strength and judgment in due time. Let no one be discouraged, but making a right use of opportunities of study, both of men and books, let the present precious moments always be valued even by those missionaries cut off for a while from congenial society. So shall strong habits of thought and reflection be formed, and no minister feel solitary in any time or circumstance.

On the subject of Church Consolidation I have little to add to what I said at the June meeting of this Synod.

The report of the Committee appointed to consider the matter expresses in few and clear words what seems to me the right attitude for the Synod of We are willing and even desirous that all the Dioceses in British North America should be formed into one Province, but we are not willing to weaken our ecclesiastical system by the introduction of a so-called "General Synod," which offers nothing that we do not already possess in the combined action of our Diocesan and Provincial Synods.

By the will of a wealthy lady, lately deceased, the late Mrs. Charles Phillips, the " Sustentation Fund " has been further endowed with \$10,000. The Montreal Diocesan Theological College and the Church of St. James the Apostle each with a like amount, and Trinity Church with \$5,000. These gifts are very timely, and we receive them with gratitude, as an expression of Mrs. Phillips' affection for the Church of England. Through a long life passed in this city, she manifested from time to time (by the exercise of liberality towards it) her deep affection for the Church in which she worshipped on earth, and we trust, by the grace of Almighty God, she is comforted now in the everlasting presence of her Lord and Saviour.

Another of our missionaries on the Montreal list of pensioners of the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel has passed away, leav ing only four to represent the work of that great missionary association which was the nursing mother of the Church in Canada. The Rev. T. A. Young, of Coteau du Lac, was a man of retiring habits, little known outside of the quiet village in which he ministered, but in the scene of his life's work .his gentle presence will be greatly missed.

I have also to record the death of the Rev. A. T. Whitten, who for many years has been superannuated. He resided, of late years, in the United States, and will scarcely be remembered by many of the present day. He did good work while his health lasted in places which demanded much toil

Since the meeting of Synod in June last, I have visited 87 Parishes and Missions, and confirmed 286 persons. I have admitted four to the Diaconate. I have consecrated the Bishop Stewart Memorial Church of Holy Trinity, Frelighsburg, and a new portion of a burying ground at Buckingham. myself; and of St. John the Divine, Warden, by Archdeacon Lindsay. Three extra churches are built to replace old ones, that had done good service, but had become too small for the increasing congregations, and worn out. They are beautiful and suitable structures. St. Mary's was opened a short time ago, and the other three will soon be ready.

I cannot close without adverting to a great grief which weighs on all hearts. Death has been very busy amongst us of late. The young have been cut down like early flowers, and the aged like the ripe corn. And now the nation is called upon to mourn the death of one who, though young in years, by his position as Duke of Clarence filled a large space in the eyes of the world. All the circumstances surrounding this death move us to deep sympathy with the bereaved. There is our beloved Queen, long acquainted with sorrow, and touched with the feeling of all her people's sorrows; there are the bereaved parents, and amongst the young hearts pierced there is onestricken through by a dart winged with youthful love. What can we do tohelp those afflicted ones? We can put on mourning, we can join the nationin its deep and heartfelt sorrow, but what can we do to comfort our widowed Queen and her desolated House? How can we reach that heart-stricken groupof parents and dear ones that I see bowed down in unutterable grief for the loss of a deservedly loved son and brother? How can we make our sympathy and love felt by those desolated hearts in the mourning and gloom of the palaces of England? We cannot make our voices heard there. We cannot tell our afflicted Queen and her children how much we love them, how loyally our hearts weep with them, how the thought of their anguish of soul has drawn us closer to them in tenderness of spirit. We are deprived by distance of this privilege and power of consolation; but we can pray for them. He who has wounded can heal. He who has broken can bind up. He who has stricken can comfort. He who has bereaved can speak peace. and we can reach Him. We can move our Heavenly Father's loving heart, and we will. We will join the nation in looking unto Him, that He will. give unspeakable comfort and strong consolation to the desolated Household. God grant it. Amen.

In closing, I humbly and gratefully acknowledge the infinite mercy of God in blessing the Church in this Diocese. In reviewing the work, I rejoice to see the clergy as a body witnessing for Christ by Christ-like lives, and the laity uniting in the witness, by increasing numbers of devout persons carefully prepared, intelligently consecrating their lives to the service of God in confirmation, and giving evidence of the spiritual reality of their witness, not only at the Lord's table, but also through the power of the Holy-Ghost, living as becomes the children of God.

Gracious Father, give us grace, we pray Thee, as individuals, and as a Synod, in all things, to witness faithfully for Christ, and glorify Thy great name.

Moved by the DEAN, seconded by Dr. Norton, that this Synod adjourn till to-morrow at 12 o'clock, and proceed to the Cathedral to take part in a special service, to mark the occasion of the funeral of the Duke of Clarence and Avondale. Further, that His Lordship the Bishop be requested to forward a telegram from this Synod to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, expressive of the sympathy of this Synod with the Queen and Royal Family in their deep affliction .- Carried unanimously.

The report of the Executive Committee was submitted to the House and ordered to be taken up to-morrow morning.

Archdeacon Evans gave notice that he will move that the case of Rev-James Pyke, referred to in the report of the Superannuation Committee, be referred to the Executive Committee.

Rev. F. H. Clayton gave notice that he will move, seconded by Rev. W. P. Chambers, that any clergyman who has been in the Diocese for ten years or over, and who has paid in his dues to the Superannuation or Widows and Orphans Fund for that time, may, upon leaving this Diocese for any other Diocese in the Dominion, still continue upon those funds, by paying annually double the amount required to be paid had he remained in the Diocese.

It was moved by the Chancellor, seconded by Dr. Davidson, that the Committee on Canons be instructed to prepare a revised edition of the Constitution, Rules of Order, By-laws and Canons, embodying therein all amendments and alterations made since the publication of the edition of 1883, and submit the same to the Synod at its next session.—Carried.

It was moved by Archdeacon Evans, seconded by the Chancellor, that clause 10, page 3, of the Constitution be amended by substituting January for June in the first line of said clause.—Carried.

It was moved by Archdeacon Evans, seconded by the Chancellon: 1st, that the amendments to the Canon on Superannuation carried, as on pp. 36 and 37 of the Journal of the 28th session, be confirmed.—Carried. 2nd, That the amendment to the said Canon carried, as on page 27 of the Journal of the last session, be confirmed.—Carried.

The Bishop here read the cablegram to H. R. H. the Prince of Wales prepared by Committee appointed for the purpose, the House rising to hear it read. It was accepted by the House, and Mr. R. White was intrusted with the care of transmitting it:—

The DEAN moved, seconded by Dr. DAVIDSON, the adoption of the report of the Committee on Anglican Church Consolidation .- Carried.

Rev. H. J. Evans moved, seconded by Rev. L. N. TUCKER, the adoption of the report of the Committee on Works of Mercy .- Carried.

Moved by Dr. Davidson and seconded by Mr. C. Garth, that this Synod has learned with much regret that the funds of the Church Home show a deficit, and in view of the importance of the work carried on by the Home, would express the hope that it may receive more liberal support from the members of the Church, such institutions having, in the opinion of the Synod, a prior claim to that of ordinary charities .- Carried.

The time for the elections was fixed at 3 p.m. for Executive Committee, 3.30 p. m. for Provincial Synod, 4 p. m. for Diocesan Court,

Archdeacon Evans moved, seconded by Dr. Davidson: 1st, That the report of the Committee on Superannuation be adopted .- Carried. 2nd, Also, that the case of the Rev. Mr. Pyke be referred to the Executive Committee.

Then the adoption of page 16 concerning Coteau du Lac.-Carried.

Then the Treasurer's Report. - Carried.

The Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, now assembled in Annual Session in the city of Montreal, desire humbly to approach the throne of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen with the cordial expression of the fervor of their loyalty and attachment to the Crown. And, at this solemn hour, when it has pleased Almighty God in His inscrutable but merciful Providence to lay upon the Royal Family a most heavy affliction in the death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence and Avondale, the Synod would further venture to tender, especially to Her Majesty and to their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, their profound sympathy, in earnest prayer and certain faith that the God of all consolation may visit them richly with the abundance of His peace and comfort—Carried.

The Bishop also read the following :-

The Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench presents his respects to the Lord Bishop of Montreal, and regrets that he and his colleagues were unable to be present at the special Service held in Cathedral Church (Christ Church) in connection with the decease and interment of His Grace the Duke of Clarence and Avondale.

The debate on Dr. Davidson's resolution on the Boys' Home was resumed by Mr. G. Hague, who moved, seconded by Dr. Norton, an amendment as follows:—

That this Synod, recognizing it as the duty of the Church to care for all her children, gratefully acknowledges the efforts made by the Clergy of Montreal to bring within their influence the boys of the "Boys' Home" who have been baptized in her faith but are now deprived of parental oversight.

Acknowledging, also, with thanks, the efforts of Christian people of various denominations to save such boys from a career of vice and crime, it expresses its conviction that they are entitled not only to attend public Church services but to pastoral care, and, in due time, preparation for confirmation; and for due furtherance of this end, regretting any difficulties that may have arisen.

The Executive Committee beg to make the following report of their proceedings during the eight months from 1st May to 31st December, 1891, to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, at its thirty-third annual session.

Meetings have been held on 19th June (when the various sub-committees were named), 11th Sept., 10th Nov., 1891, and 18th Jan., 1892.

The sub-committee on Grants was not re-appointed, a resolution being adopted that in future all questions on the subject of Grants shall be taken up and discussed at meetings of this Executive Committee.

In accordance with a resolution adopted by the last Synod (see page 25 of Report), the committee re-considered the grants to Bolton, Buckingham, and Portage du Fort and the applications of Franklin and West Shefford,

Bolton .- No change in the grant.

Buckingham.—Grant restored to \$270. A deputation was appointed to visit the parish and report to the Committee. The deputation made an exhaustive report, for which they were tendered the thanks of the Committee, and the Bishop named a sub-committee to prepare a circular letter do be addressed, under authority of the Bishop, to the members of the Church in the parish, urging them to take measures to relieve the Mission Fund of this grant. The Bishop was also respectfully requested to urge the matter apon the attention of the parishioners at his ensuing visitation to the Missien, with a view of carrying out the wishes of the Committee.

Portage du Fort .- No change in the grant.

West Shefford and Fulford .- A special grant of \$100 for one year.

Franklin and Havelock .- A special grant of \$100 for one year. These grants were made on the representation to the Committee that these parishes had never exercised, and do not claim, the rights of rectories, and had never been so constituted by any act of Synod.

A committee, composed of the Chancellor Dr. L. H. Davidson and Archdeacon Evans, was requested to consider the question whether a parish once existing as a rectory may cease to hold this position and come again on the Mission Fund.

Chelsea .- The grant was restored to \$400.

Milton.—The grant of \$300 renewed.

Arundel .- A grant of \$350.

Portland .- The grant of \$300 renewed.

Books and Tracts.—The Committee was authorized to draw \$50 of the grant made last year, but only partially used.

It was resolved to recommend to the Synod that the present scale of grants in force to 30th April be continued to 31st December, 1892.

The Rectory has been renewed this summer at a cost of somewhat over \$700. This has not been paid yet, but the tendency is in the direction of a speedy removal of the debt. The building, which was hitherto a one-storey structure 55 feet long, has been shortened to 41 feet, by having an extension, which was made some 32 years ago, removed. This was placed behind the kitchen, to be used as a summer kitchen and winter storeroom. The walls of the original house (built by the late Rev. Joseph Abbott, and in which the present Premier was born) have been raised by means of a mansard roof; a new verandah on three sides added; the whole covered with tin, and this protected by two coats of paint. The second storey has been finished off into three bedrooms, bath room, linen cupboard and hall. I beg to lay before you the accounts of the Diocese for the eight months ending 31st December, 1891, and to give a brief synopsis of them.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON "BETTER OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY."

Your Committee beg to submit the following report to the Synod.

- 1. Six days of labor and a seventh day of rest God has joined together, from the time of man's innocency in Paradise, in indissoluble union, and man should never put them asunder.
- 2. The toiling classes of English-speaking race, in our own and in every land, can hardly realize what an unspeakable boon the Sunday rest is until they lose it.
- 3. Sir John Gorst, late under-secretary of State for India, a noted member of the Imperial Parliament, and one of the British delegates at the Berlin Congress, said recently: -One thing that struck him very forcibly was the way other nations spoke of the English Sunday. They did not sneer at it as some in his own country did. They all spoke of it with the greatest admiration, and said that public opinion was ripe enough to enable them to introduce it into their own countries. Adding further, " it was remarkable that the richest nation in the world was the one which refused to work for more than six days in a week, and that those who set at defiance God laws, and worked for seven days, were not only not richer but were absolutely poorer than his own." An undeniable and a highly suggestive fact.
- 4. It is therefore with deepest, regret that your Committee have to notice the rejection, at the last session of the Dominion Parliament, of a Bill intended to promote the "Better observance of the Lord's Day,"-although that Bill was supported by the petitions of very many thousands of every creed throughout the Dominion.
- 5. Your Committee would suggest that it should be the expressed desire of this Synod that a Bill, having the same object in view, should again be brought forward in suitable form by some member of the House at the next session of the Legislature, and be vigorously pressed, if possible, to a successful issue-
- 6. Only a year ago (Dec. 2nd, 1890) The Swiss Federal Assembly is reported to have enacted a law to the following effect :-
- "That all men regularly employed as officials or as workmen on railways, tramways, steamboats, post offices, or other traffic shall have fiftytwo days of rest per year."
- 7. It is hard to conceive why the British inhabitants of our own free and glorious Dominion should not all enjoy the same weekly exemptions from toil in the fifty-two Sundays of the year as Swiss workmen now do.

8. Your Committee deeply deplore that they have still to protest and to contend against the continued and ever-increasing encroachments of human greed and of powerful corporations on the sanctity of the Lord's Day.

9. The Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company have this year started a boat for Quebec, leaving on Sunday afternoons, thus luring, to the desecration of the day, the great annual tide of American and of summer travel, beside robbing their own employees of their God-given rest, and following in this particular the deplorable example of the Pacific, the Grand Trunk, and the North Shore Railway in starting their trains, from this chief centre of Montreal, on God's own holy day.

10. The much respected managers, directors and shareholders of these different and influential companies are doubtless many, if not all of them, members of Christian churches, and as such cannot but recognize the fact that principle and not expediency, that Godliness and not earthly greed, should regulate the observance of the 4th no less than of any and of all the other commandments of the Decalogue.

11. Your Committee would, therefore, solicit the support of the Synod in this expression of their opinion, as an earnest appeal to these Christian gentlemen who are connected with our great rail and river companies, and especially to such of them as are members of our own Church, to use individually their influence on all suitable occasions at their Board or other meetings in seeking to promote the glory of God and the good of their fellow-men, by securing for them the inviolable sanctity of God's holy day.

12. Your Committee would recommend a similar appeal to our City Rail-road Corporation, which, unlike the highly laudable example given by our younger sister city of Toronto, affords in Montreal, neither to man nor beast, throughout the livelong Sabbath Day, any share in the beneficent provisions of the 4th commandment.

13. Your Committee note with pleasure the persevering efforts of the Citizen's League in this city, of which Major Bond is the efficient president, in the suppression of those drinking dens, gambling resorts, vile saloons, and multiplied places and fountains of evil, which are the prolific sources of Sabbath desecration, and of all moral and spiritual injury to the souls and bodies of men.

14. Your Committee desire to draw the attention of the clergy of this Synod and Diocese to the importance of their impressing on their respective flocks, especially upon the younger members of their congregations, before the great annual tide of summer travel sets in, the duty of their carrying with them to their various seaside, mountain and country resorts the same habits of devout Sabbath observance in which they have been trained in their city and united family life and in every well-ordered Christian home.

A thoughtful writer of some celebrity in his own land, whose work has passed through several editions, recently observed-" There are certain greatfocal points of history towards which the lines of past progress have converged, and from which have radiated the moulding influences of the future Such was the Incarnation, such was the German Reformation of the 16th century, and such are the closing years of the 19th century.

The observation is suggestive, and it applies with equal force to the stanp. ing ordinance, through all the ages of God's own holyday; for as warpand woof in the same texture, so has been and so is the Sabbath day, and its devout observance, interwoven by God Himself with all that is elevating, praiseworthy, and of good report in private, social and public life, and with all that is brightest and best in our own ultimate human destiny in the "Sabbatismos," or Sabbath rest, that remaineth for the people of God-

3rd. That the appointment of Diocesan delegates to the Conference proposed to be held in Toronto on the second Wednesday of September, 1893, tenot made until the meeting of this Synod to be held after the next meeting of Provincial Synod.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The Committee on Canons beg to report that in their opinion, it is desirable to amend the rule of Synod regulating the status of Parishes, as

That paragraph 3 be made to read as follows:—A Rectory is an ecclesiastical division raising within its limits the whole of the stipend of the incumbent, which shall not be less per annum than the amount fixed by the scale in paragraph 5 hereof, according to the position and status of the incumbent, and providing a rectory or parsonage for the occupation of said incumbent. Before any such ecclesiastical division shall be entitled to be regarded as a Rectory, it shall satisfy the Executive Committee of the Diocese that settled provision has been made for payment regularly of the stipend agreed; and should such Rectory fail to pay the stipend for six months after the same shall become due, it shall be within the power of the Executive Committee to deprive it of its character and position of a Rectory. Provided always, that it be understood that nothing herein shall be regarded as affecting parishes erected by Letters Patent from the Crown, or any sub-divisions thereof.

That paragraph 4 be amended so as to read as follows:—Whenever in any Parish or Mission an Endowment Fund to the amount of \$4,000 shall have been raised and invested to the satisfaction of the Bishop, and the balance of the salary at the rate per annum to which the incumbent would be entitled according to status and term of office under clause 5 hereof, pledged by the vestry to the Executive Committee of the Diocese, through the Lord Bishop, such Parish or Mission shall, in case of a vacancy in the Ministry thereof, enjoy the same privilege in the choice of a clergyman as if it were a Patent Rectory.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WORKS OF MERCY.

As in June, so now in January we open our Report by recalling a sad loss from our army of co-labourers.

The gradually returning strength during the last several years of the late Rev. Robert Acton had enabled him under God to perform such excellent work as Immigration Chaplain, that in his death, which occurred in the month of August, the advocates of Emigration in England and the friends of Immigration here feel that they have met with a very serious loss, and many of the recent settlers in this vicinity from the Mother Country can testify that one has passed away from among them who was ever a faithful and sympathising friend, whose help and advice were a great comfort to them in the trials and difficulties incident upon their taking up new abodes, and in some cases new modes of obtaining a livelihood in a new country.

CHURCH HOME.

Having made a Report to Synod in June last, the Managers of the Church Home have little new to add. All the immates have had good health since the removal to Guy Street, where the out-door exercise possible on the galeries and in the garden during the summer months has been a source of comfort and enjoyment.

The Managers wish they had the means to acquire a few more feet of land on the south side of the building, so that the house might not be built in so closely, as appears inevitable at present.

They own now one hundred feet frontage on Guy Street, and an additional thirty feet would be decidedly advantageous. But enterprise in that direction seems out of the question just now that it is almost more than we can do to live.

The Treasurer reports a deficit of \$443.92 in the accounts for 1891 and this fact signifies that there is at present no balance at all in the Charitable Fund, all the collections made in the autumn of 1891 having been absorbed by the floating debt, a state of affairs for which we somewhat prepared our friends in our June Report, as you will see by reference. The sum of the collections failed to reach the half of the amount asked for, which was not more than is absolutely required. \$2500.00 represents about half the income required for 1892, the other half being derived from the payment for board and lodging made by some of the inmates, or friends on their behalf.

As the Branches of the G. F. S. connected with the various City churches do not commence their winter's work until October, and some of them even later, the returns from the Branch Secretaries are not sent in until April, when the annual meeting is held and the report for the whole year read:-

There is little therefore to record since the last meeting of Synod. On the whole there seems to be steady progress, or while some Branches have preferred taking up more distinctive Mission work, and have joined other organizations, the new Branches which were formed are very vigourous and full of hope for the future.

There are also Branches in the Parishes and Missions of Aylmer, Cowansville, Clarenceville, Dunham, Grenville, Havelock, Hallerton, Huningdon, Papineauville, Noyau, Shawville, Sorel, St. Andrews, St. Johns, St. Lambert, West Farnham and Waterloo. Many valuable bales of clothing, etc., have been sent out by these Branches, but their destination and value cannot yet be given. Many are to missions in our own Diocese. As nearly as can yet be computed, the Treasurer has received and disbursed \$42.00 for Home Missions, \$445.00 for Domestic Missions, and \$155.00 for Foreing Missions.

We would again respectfully urge on some of the longer established Rectories and Parishes the advisability of establishing Branches of the Auxiliary. It would not be found, as has been sometimes feared, to lessen the interest in the Parochial work, but on the contrary increase it by broadening and enlarging the sympathies in all Church and Missionary efforts.

REPORT OF REV. E. McMANUS, CITY MISSIONARY, FROM JUNE 1st TO JANUARY 1st.

I have visited the House of Refuge, Longue Pointe, for services and visitation of the sick twenty-two times, and the House on Dorchester street three times. I have visited the Women's Protective Immigration Society's Home on Osborne street twenty-six times; the Protestant Infants' Homefor Divine Service eight times, and baptized nine children. I have also visited the Jail three times, the Hervey Institute eleven times, the Working Girls. Home on Drummond street twenty-one times. I have attended four Committee meetings of the Society for the Protection of Women and Children and also twenty four Committee meetings of the Fresh Air Work at the Staroffice. These Committee meetings for the reception of inmates to the Homeat Chambly have involved much additional work, in the way of visiting doubtful cases before passing them to the Home. I have visited the Church Home five times, and conducted Divine Service there during the month of August. I have also visited the Montreal Foundling and Infants Nursery four times, and baptized seven children there. I have also made one hundred and twenty-six visits to families and individuals in the city, ninety-one pastoral visits at Outremont, and one hundred and twenty-eight at Sault au Recollet.

HOSPITAL VISITATION, ETC.

The Hospital Chaplain records several visits to patients, members of our Communion, in Hotel Dieu and Notre Dame Hospitals, 85 visits to the Montreal General Hospital, 800 visits to patients, about a third of these accompanied by religious exercises. The Holy Communion has been adminis-

tered, funerals have been conducted, and the Sunday afternoon Service has been regularly held. To the success and interest in these services the presence of the Hospital Committee from the St. George's Y. M. C. A. ever tends.

We are glad to state that a service is held once a month by the Bishop or one of his clergy at the Hospital for the Insane at Verdun; that Rev. Thos. Everett continues his hospital services in the west end of the city; that Rev. L. N. Tucker continues his instructions in the Holy Scriptures to the children at the Protestant Orphan Asylum; and that the clergy generally throughout the city do good and faithful work in private hospitals, institutions, and homes undenominational, or beyond the jurisdiction of this Synod within the bounds or in the vicinity of their respective Parishes.

REPORT OF IMMIGRATION CHAPLAIN.

The flow of immigration ceases or becomes much reduced during the winter months, but much remains to be done in the way of keeping in touch with those who have already required our care and attention. The correspondence is large, and often demands an amount of outside work and an expenditure of time that those not practically acquainted with the work will hardly credit.

Still, the more I see of it the more the importance of this work grows upon me, and I am impelled to ask for the continued assistance of the clergy and laity in carrying out our scheme for watching over those who pass from my immediate care.

The following few points may be a guide to what can be done in this way:-

1st. Clergymen on receiving notice of immigrants being placed in their parishes should at once visit them, use their influence on their behalf, constantly see them, and maintain the interest in their Church which is so apt to flag under the influence of new surroundings.

2. On any of these leaving a parish, they should have an introduction to the clergyman of their new residence, and he should be made acquainted with anything that may be a guide in his ministration.

3. The Chaplain should always and at once be made aware of such removal, and much troublesome correspondence thereby saved.

4., A list of farm situations vacant and available for Protestants, and openings for tradesmen will be of much use.

5. Interest your Church associations in this work. Ask them to visit any immigrants in the clergymen's care. Get them enlisted in some Church work, and much will be done to keep wandering sheep within the fold.

The Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, now assembled in annual session in the city of Montreal, desire humbly to approach the throne of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, with the cordial expression of the fervour of their loyalty and attachment to the Crown; and at this solemn hour when it has pleased Almighty God in His inscrutable but merciful providence, to lay upon the Royal Family a most heavy affliction in the death of His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence and Avondale, the Synod would further venture to tender, especially to Her Majesty and to their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, their profound sympathy, in earnest prayer and certain faith that the God of all consolation may visit them richly with the abundance of His peace and comfort,

Died 14th January, 1892.



The Synod desires to place on record its recognition of its loss in the death of Rev. T. A. Young, a faithful and devoted minister of the Church, a member of the Synod since its inception, and the Incumbent of the Mission of Coteau du Lac during a period of thirty years.
