

## Trinity College School, Lort Sope.

Extract from the Port Hope Times.

'The building, now finished in Elizabethan style, has four storeys, is built of brick—strong and massive, and will form, when the projected buildings are all erected, the east wing of the School. The main entrance, on the south side, reached by a broad flight of steps, leads through double doors into a wide lofty hall, lit by a fine gothic window, from which two staircases, one for masters and pupils, the other for servants, communicate with the upper storeys, where similar halls traverse the building from south to north, while each flat is again crossed from east to west by a passage eight feet wide.

"The ground floor contains, besides the reception, head-master's, and matron's rooms—all models of neatness and comfort—the studies of the pupils, one for the higher and lower classes, and one for the prefects, (elder scholars who, by diligence and good behaviour, have won the confidence of the head master,) and also the temporary dining-rooms. All these rooms have a charming view either of the fertile country and the lake beyond, or to the north, of the green hills and well cultivated fields and orchards, dotted with country houses and farm buildings. The walls of the studies wainscoted from floor to ceiling, look warm and com-

fortable, more like libraries of private residences; while their whole aspect is cheerful and cosy, and almost invites to quiet study. Each boy has his box on the wall for his books and writing materials. Each room is properly ventilated and heated with hot air. We have the choice to reach the second floor either by. a lift, which at present is only used to convey the meals to the dining-hall, and trunks to the loft and sleeping apartments; or, by the elegant broad stair-case, which we chose, and landed on the floor containing the dwelling and bed-rooms of the First Assistant Master, with its magnificent view far over the great lake. Close to it, the boy's library; further on, abutting on the broad passage, we find the sleeping apartments of the boys, of different sizes, holding some three, some four to six neat iron bedsteads, with snowy white linen, washstands, &c., and in the walls, closets for their clothing in daily use. There can be nothing more comfortable, more inviting, neater, and cleaner than these bedrooms, with their broad windows offering enchanting views of the surrounding country, heated by hot air, and provided with the most complete system of ventilation known.

"The next floor is devoted to a similar purpose as the second. It is a notable feature that each floor contains a sitting and bedroom for a master, so that in ease of an accident, of illness or disturbance, an experienced gentleman is close at hand.

"The lowest floor contains a large, neat kitchen, the larder, china closets, linen closets, and all the sleeping apartments of the male and female servants of the house. It is reached by an entrance on the north side

of the building, exclusively used by the servants of the institution, and boys have no access to this floor, except to the bathroom and lavatory close to the east or boys' entrance; so that, returning from play, they may perform their ablutions without going upstairs to their bedrooms, before entering the dining-hall or their studies.

"Want of space forbids us to give our readers a more detailed description of the new College building, of the minute contrivances and devices to save labor, give comfort, to equalize heat, and provide a constant stream of fresh air through all parts of the large house, to furnish fresh water to all the floors, hot and cold water to the bath-room, hard and soft water to the kitchen, to prevent the accumulation of dust, &c., &c; suffice it to say, that we consider this school-house the best arranged and best regulated we ever saw, both in this country and the old world, and we can assure our readers that we have visited a great number in all parts of Europe and America.

"The class rooms are at present in the old house, but will be removed to the centre building to be erected, which is to contain large lofty halls and school-rooms, a library and museum. Although at present the school-rooms are comparatively small, great care has been taken nevertheless to make them healthy and comfortable. They are four in number; and, in each, one of the resident masters presides. The small wooden chapel will shortly be replaced by a large brick edifice adjoining the east side of the new school-house.

"The instruction comprises Classics, Mathematics, English, German, French, Natural Science, Drawing, Vocal and Instrumental Music, and Book-keeping. Thoroughness being aimed at, the masters wisely abstain from overtaxing the mind, and devote an equal share of their attention to the body of the boys.

"The food provided is simple but excellent; the masters partake of the same food as the pupils; frequent ablutions and batking is insisted upon; rural sports, foot-ball, and cricket playing encouraged, and no means neglected to make the children happy as well

as healthy."

The School was first established in the village of Weston, near Toronto, and was opened May 1st, 1865. In consequence of the liberal offers of assistance made by the inhabitants of Port Hope, during the summer of 1868, the School was removed to that town, where it was established in buildings provided by the townspeople, free of rent for three years. Early in 1871, the property, consisting of ten acres of land, together with the buildings upon it, and situated on one of the most picturesque sites in Canada, was purchased by the School. The erection of large permanent buildings, designed by H. Macdougall, Esq.; Architect, Toronto, was then proceeded with. They furnish accommodation for about eighty boarders, with apartments for Masters, Matron, and Servants, and were occupied for the first time in January, 1872.

Trinity College School was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed during the Session of 1871-2, constituted a corporate body, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, the Chancellor of the University of Trinity College, the Provost and the Professors in Arts of Trinity College, the Head

Master of the School, and such other persons as may from time to time be appointed by the Governing Body.

During the present year, (1873) a large and handsome Chapel, capable of containing upwards of two hundred worshippers, and a spacious Dining Hall, are in course of erection at the east end of the new school building. They are expected to be completed before the commencement of Michaelmas Term.

## Course of Instruction.

The Course of Instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, English, German, French, Natural Sciences, Bookkeeping, Drawing, and Vocal Music.

Pupils are prepared for the Matriculation Examination of the Universities, and the Entrance Examination of the Law and Medical Schools, the Army, Navy, &c. In the Modern Department special attention is directed to preparation for commercial pursuits.

The discipline and general management of the School are based upon the English Public School System. Out-of-School government is, accordingly, to a large extent, vested in the hands of the Prefects, who are selected from the senior boys by the Head Master.

#### FEES.

- \$220 per annum; or \$73.33 per Term, for board and tuition.

\$60 per annum; or \$20 per Term, for tuition only. The Piano-forte is taught as an extra. Fee, for tuition and use of instrument, \$10 per term.

Each new Boy, on admission to the School, is required to pay an entrance fee of \$4, which is devoted to the maintenance and support of the Boys' Library, and a fee of \$12, in lieu of Bedding, &c., which are now supplied by the School, instead of, as formerly, by the pupils.

The above fees are inclusive of all School expenses, except books, stationery, drawing materials, &c, and medical attendance.

(A reduction will be made for Sons of Clergymen, in certain cases, on application to the Head Master.)

The payments for Board and Tuition, which are apportioned between the School Terms, must be paid strictly in advance. All other School Accounts will be sent in the usual way.

A half term's notice must be given in writing before the removal of a pupil. If such notice is not given, a half-term's fees will be collected.

The following Rule respecting the payment of Fees was adopted at a meeting of the Governing Body of the School, held on August 18th, 1870:—

"The Fees for Board and Tuition in each Term, and any balance which may remain for Books or otherwise, from the previous Term, must be paid within a week after a Boy presents himself at the School. If this be not done, the Bursar is required to draw on the Parent or Guardian for the amount (with Bank charges,) at ten days, and should this draft be returned dishonoured, the Boy must be sent home by the Head Master."

Books and Stationery are supplied in the School at the ordinary prices.

Boys over fourteen years of age will be admitted to the School only on the production of such testimonials of previous good conduct and diligence as shall perfectly satisfy the Head Master and the Governing Body. Boar building modern other ay health of vision of Masters householden enged L

#### BOARDING.

Boarders are received into the new School House, a building warmed and ventilated on the most approved modern system, and furnished with bath-rooms and all other appliances which can promote the comfort and health of the Boys. It is under the personal supervision of the Head Master, assisted by three Resident Masters, who direct the Boys' evening work. The household arrangements are attended to by an experienced Lady Matron.

It is particularly requested that parents should send their boys to School with their clothing, linen, and other requisites, carefully and clearly marked with the name in full.

It is desired that no eatables should be sent to the boys during Term, with the exception of fruit.

Pupils from a distance are allowed, upon application, to remain in residence during the Christmas and Easter Vacations at a charge of \$4 per week for board. No pupils are permitted to remain during the summer holidays.

It is recommended that pocket-money should be supplied to the younger boys only through the Head Master, instead of directly from home. A small sum furnished weekly is more beneficial than an occasional larger amount.

#### TERMS.

The School Year is divided into three Terms, of about thirteen weeks each:

Michaelmas Term, 1873.—From September 19 to December 19.

Lent Term, 1874.—January 9 to April 2. Trinity Term, 1874—April 17 to July 17.

### VACATIONS.

Two weeks at Easter; eight weeks at Midsummer; three weeks at Christmas. Return tickets are issued for the holidays by the Grand Trunk, Great Western, Northern, Canada Central, and St. Lawrence and Ottawa Railways for one fare and a third.

### EXAMINATIONS.

Examinations are held at the end of the Christmas and Summer half-years,—the Midsummer Examination being conducted by the Professors of Trinity College. Removes are made only after these Examinations. General Proficiency Prizes are given at Christmas and Midsummer to the head boy of each Form; and at Midsummer, Form Prizes for standing throughout the year. A report of the progress and general conduct of each pupil is sent by the Head Master to parents or guardians, at the end of each half term, and at the close of each examination.
