UNITED STATES CONGRESS SPECIAL SESSION OPENED

Great Crowds Attracted to U. S. Capital Today By Opening of First Congress Called by President Taft—Purpose of Special Session is to Enact Tariff Legislation

Washington, March 15—Precisely at noon today the extraordinary session of the seventy-first congress, called by the president for the purpose of enacting tariff legislation, began. The senate had already to its credit a brief session of the new congress, this being customary following the incoming of a new administration, in order that cabinet and other appointments might be confirmed.

POLICE COURT



FINE SCHOOL AT KINGSTON WAS BURNED LAST NIGHT

The Consolidated School Erected at a Cost of \$25,000 Burned to the Ground By a Fire of Mysterious Origin—Van Shed Saved But Handsome Main Building is Completely Gone

No one was in the building at the time of the fire, the principal's residence being nearby. There were 120 pupils attending the school, being conveyed there daily in the big vans provided for that purpose. The school was a very attractive looking structure and the equipment was thoroughly modern and up-to-date. The halls were wide and the rooms airy and bright. The departments of manual training and domestic science were on the first floor. At one side was the school garden which was planted and cared for entirely by the boys.

PERSIAN TROOPS KILLED MAN WHO PILLAGE AND RUINED HIS WIFE

St. Petersburg, March 15—A despatch to the Novos Vremya from Julla, on the frontiers between Persia and Russia, says that 1,000 Persian government horsemen and 500 infantrymen are marching on Julla from the Persian bank of the Araxes River, devastating the villages in their path and shooting down the people. Already ten villages, four of them inhabited by Russians, have been pillaged and burned. The troops are ruthlessly killing the defenceless peasants. Many women carrying bundles on their backs attempted to swim the Araxes to the Russian side, but were shot down. Three hundred homeless families have taken refuge on an island in the river opposite Julla.

MINISTERS MEETINGS

LOST HIS COWS

Thomas Hannah, a milk dealer, living on the Board's Head road, lost two valuable cows. On Saturday, in the afternoon as is customary, Mr. Hannah led the cows out of the barn, when they did not return at night. No apprehension was at first felt, as they were in the habit of going to a vacant barn some distance from Mr. Hannah's home. Saturday night however, search was instituted, but no trace of the cows was found. Sunday morning searchers found one of the cows in the ice at Cedar Point Cove, about a mile distant. Although there was but three feet of water, the unfortunate animal was unable to extricate itself, and perished while the cold. It is believed that the other cow walked out on the ice towards the channel of the Narrows and broke through, and was drowned.



CLOTHES MAKE YOUR WOMEN IMMODEST

American Lecturer Makes Interesting Statement to New York Audience

(New York American.)
"American women should wear fewer clothes and they'd be more modest," said Arthur George Penney Collier, lecturer, yesterday. "The native women of Africa are dressed in a strip of bark or a bit of animal skin, and they are the most moral women in the world." Not until they achieve civilization do they become immodest or immoral.
Mr. Collier is here to lecture on Africa before the League for Political Education, having been for seven years a representative in East Africa for Great Britain.
"Wearing a strip of bark or a bit of blanket, the African women are as unconscious as children," he declared. "But with the first dress a white shirtwaist and skirt to which the missionaries introduce them—come the seeds of vanity. The women become vain, they flirt, they break up happy homes. I shouldn't like to think what would happen if one of them were given a Director's gown. They're far better off with their original raiment."
"I don't mean to say, of course, that American women should wear the garb of African savages. They couldn't because of the climate. But there are a lot of frills and furberies they might discard. Then they wouldn't be constantly struggling to outdress each other. That causes immodesty and immorality."
"This marriage is a regular institution in Africa," Mr. Collier said. The bridegroom purchases the bride with 80 worth of cattle. If they don't agree at the end of the year either one can depart from the hut and take a proper share of the cattle. Much of the time of the English officers is spent in deciding disputes as to who gets the usual increase in the cattle family at the end of the year.



E. W. ROWLEY REPLIES TO THE REV. B. BEATTY

Editor Times: Sir - In a letter relating to the People's Mission Rev. B. Beatty makes personal attack upon me. It is my reason for asking you to give me space for a reply.

I may say that I became a worker in the mission on Mr. Beatty's own invitation, and that he knew all about my former connection with the Reformed Baptist church, as did the other workers in the mission. Not only so, but Mr. Beatty himself frequently spoke about the matter, and he compared my case with his own, when he left the Salvation Army for a similar reason. I may add that the clerk of the Reformed church left it shortly after I did, and was Sunday School superintendent in the People's Mission for some time. He left the Reformed church because of the manner in which myself and others had been treated. Mr. Beatty further says -

"In the summer of 1890 he (Rowley) manifested a disposition to make trouble among the mission workers, and in order to restore harmony I was obliged to ask him to withdraw from the work, which he did, and has had no association with the mission work since that time."

The trouble to which Mr. Beatty here refers was caused by about fifty of the Sunday School scholars and workers, who held a private picnic at Anthony's Beach. He said it was "of the devil," and because we attended it, though not the promoters of it, he sent letters to G. Olsen and myself asking us to resign the offices which we held in the mission. This action by him was a direct violation of the constitution of the mission, and was the act of an autocrat. In a conversation with me at the mission, Mr. Beatty asserted that he was the People's Mission, and refused to permit me to continue in office. I told him that he was only one member of the executive, and demanded a meeting of the mission. He asserted again that he was the mission, and I thereupon threatened him with prosecution for getting money under false pretences. In the end he requested me to take my office that evening. Later a meeting of the five members of the executive was held at his house, but he talked and acted so much like a spoiled child that the other three members and myself withdrew, leaving the mission, and discontinued our relationship with him. We felt that we were forced out. This is the true story of the trouble, and why I left the mission. I wish the others had utterly lost confidence in the Rev. B. Beatty.

NO PLACE IN ALL BROOKLYN TO SEND POOR CONSUMPTIVE

Every Free Institution is Crowded and Many Are on the Waiting List—The Case of a Man of 23 Who is Doomed to Death by Delay in Treatment.

(Brooklyn Eagle) Huddled in a carless, unfurnished room at 301 Wyona street, East New York, there is a dreary figure of a man looking out of a window upon the squalid street fronting the building in which he lives.

The man is Charles Kahn, formerly an actor, but now a consumptive in the advanced stage, penniless and suffering. One month ago the doctor told this man that unless he went to some hospital where he might receive proper treatment, he must die.

There is not, it is stated, in the entire borough of Brooklyn today, a single institution where an additional consumptive patient, who is also a pauper, can be cared for. Hospitals where the city generally sends its white plague victims, are crowded past the point of accommodation any more.

These must be taken care of, the societies backed by the philanthropic Brooklyn people engaged in the struggle declared, "else there is very little to be accomplished in the effort to stamp out the white plague."

"We have taken care of all we can," the local officers of the department of health and the department of charities have replied. "There still is no room for more."

A reporter for the Eagle visited the home of Charles Kahn today. He was sitting at the window as he had been day after day for weeks past. Odors from the littered rooms outside permeated the room, mingling with the smell of cooking in adjoining flats.

LUMBERING ON THE MIRAMICHI

Conservative Estimates Place Shipments for Coming Summer at About 65,000,000 Feet.

Chatham, March 13.—Conservative estimates of lumber shipments from the Miramichi during the coming summer season, place the amount at about sixty-five million superficial feet. Of this amount probably twenty millions will be stored or wintered lumber, so that the cut for the present season on the Miramichi and its tributaries will be about forty-five million.

It is impossible to get exact returns from all firms operating as in many cases they are only rough ideas themselves and prefer to make no statement until the government tallies have been turned in. An average cut, however, is anticipated. Although nearly all the lumbermen announced that they would curtail this winter's cut owing to the low state of the lumber market, the season was such an exceptionally good one for operating that there is no doubt that the cut is much larger than at first contemplated.


