In the year 1827, a Charter was granted by His Majesty George IV., for the establishment of a University at York (now Toronto), under the designation of "King's College;" and in the following year the Institution was endowed by patent, with a portion of the land which had previously been set apart by His Majesty George III. for educational purposes.

In 1837 the Royal Charter was amended by a Statute, passed by the Legislature of Upper Canada, with the object of removing certain restrictions which were regarded as unsatisfactory; but, in consequence of various impediments, the Institution was not open for the admission of Students until June 8th, 1843. From that date to December 31st, 1849, it was conducted under the Royal Charter as amended by the Provincial Statute.

Another Provincial Statute, whereby important modifications were effected, and the designation was changed from "King's College," to that of the "University of Toronto," came into operation on January 1st, 1850. Under this Statute the Establishment was conducted until April, 1853.

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when the University was divided into two Institutions, one retaining the title of the "University of Toronto," and the other styled "University College, Toronto." The first of these Institutions is formed on the model of the University of London, its functions being limited to prescribing subjects of Examinations for Degrees, Scholarships, Prizes, and Certificates of Honor, examining Candidates therein, and conferring such Degrees and Distinctions.

The Courses prescribed by the University of Toronto have been adopted by University College; and its Lectures are given on the Subjects appointed for Candidates for the Degree of B.A., or for the Diplomas in Civil Engineering and Agriculture.

SECTION I.

STUDENTS.

1. The regular Students of the College are those who have passed the Matriculation Examination in Arts, Civil Engineering, or Agriculture, in any University in Her Majesty's dominions; but those are also admissible, although Non-matriculated, who desire to attend Lectures in any Department.

2. Matriculated Students are required to attend the Lectures and Examinations, on all the Subjects appointed by the University of Toronto as necessary for Students of their respective standings. Certificates of Attendance, during one or more Academic Years, will be given to those Matriculated Students who have been regular in their attendance on the required Lectures, and who have passed the prescribed Examinations.

3. Matriculated Students are required to reside, during the period of their attendance on Lectures, in the College; unless they have the permission of the President to reside in houses selected by their parents or guardians; or approved by him.

4. Students who reside in the College are under the immediate charge of the Dean of Residence, Mr. LOUDON.

5. Non-Matriculated Students may be admitted to Lectures, on application to the Professors in the respective Departments in which they desire to attend, and are not required to produce any Certificate, or to pass any Examination.

6. Certificates of Attendance on Lectures in any Department during an Academic Year, may be given to those Non-matriculated Students who have been regular in their attendance, and who have also passed the Examination in such Department.

SECTION II.

TERMS.

1. The Academic Year consists of Two Terms : the first (*Michaelmas*) extending from October 1st to December 23rd, and the second (*Easter*) from January 7th to May 18th.

2. The Term will not be allowed to those who have attended less than three-fourths* of the required Lectures, or who have not passed the prescribed Examinations, or who have not conformed to the other Statutes or Regulations of the College, or who have been reported to the Council for bad conduct.

* Satisfactory explanations will be required of absence from any Lectures.

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SECTION III.

COURSE OF STUDY IN ARTS.

First Year.

FIXED COURSE.

The Fixed Course in the First Year, or for Senior Matriculation, comprehends the following Departments and Subdepartments :---

Classics; Mathematics; English and French; Elements of Natural History.

Senior Matriculants, and those Students who did not take French at the Junior Matriculation Examination, are required to take either French or Hebrew. German is necessary for those who may substitute "Modern Languages" for "Classics" after the Second Year,

The Elements of Natural History are necessary either in this or in the Second Year.

Chemistry is necessary for those who purpose offering themselves as Candidates for Honors or Scholarships, at the Examination in Natural Sciences for the Second Year.

Students may in this year, at their discretion, pass their Examination in any necessary Sub-department prescribed for a succeeding year.

Second Year.

FIXED COURSE.

The Fixed Course in the Second Year comprehends the following Departments and Sub-departments :---

Classics ; Mathematics ; History ; French ; Elements of Mineralogy and Geology ; Logic, Metaphysics, and Ethics.

German is necessary for those who may substitute "Modern Languages" for "Classics" after this year.

Those who take Hebrew may omit French and German.

The Elements of Natural History are necessary for those who did not take them in the First Year.

Third Year.

FIXED COURSE.

The Fixed Course in the Third Year comprehends the following Departments and Sub-departments:---

Classics; Mathematics; History and Ethnology; French; Chemistry; Metaphysics; Elements of Civil Polity; Natural Theology, and Evidences of Christianity.

Those who are not Candidates for Honors may exercise an option between Classics and Modern Languages. Those who take Hebrew may omit French and German, but not Classics. An option is also permitted between Mathematics of this year and of the Fourth Year, and between Natural History of this year and Mineralogy and Geology of the Fourth Year.

A Candidate for Honors in the Departments of Classics, Mathematics, Modern Languages with History, Natural Sciences, or Metaphysics, Ethics, and Civil Polity, who has also obtained Honors in the same Department or Departments at the Examination for the Second Year, may omit all other Departments or Sub-departments, except Chemistry, Elements of Civil Polity, and Natural Theology and Evidences; but those who have only taken Second Class Honors must take an additional Sub-department, which they may select.

A Candidate for Honors in the Departments of Classics, Mathematics, Modern Languages with History, Natural Sciences, or Metaphysics, Ethics, and Civil Polity, who has also obtained First Class Honors in more than one Department, at the Examination for the Second Year, may omit all other Departments or Sub-departments, except Natural Theology and Evidences.

Each Scholarship offered each year is tenable for one year only, but the Scholars of one year are eligible for the Scholarships of the succeeding years.

No Student can hold two Scholarships at the same time; but if two or more Scholarships have been awarded to him, he will be entitled to the sum of Forty Dollars for each additional Scholarship: his Scholarship being called a double, triple, &c., Scholarship, as the case may be; and the Senate may award the remainder of the value of such additional Scholarship to the Student who would next have been entitled to it.

Fourth Year.

FIXED COURSE.

The Fixed Course in the Fourth Year comprehends the following Departments and Sub-departments :---

Classics ; Mathematics ; English ; and French.

Those who are not Candidates for Honors may take any three Departments; but two of them must be selected from the following four:—Classics, Mathematics, Modern Languages, Natural Sciences; and those who take Hebrew must also take Classics. Those who have not taken Mathematics in the Third Year must take them with Meteorology in this year; and those who have not taken Natural History in the Third Year must take Mineralogy, Geology, and Physical Geography, with applied Chemistry, in this year.

A Candidate for Honors in the Department of Classics,

Mathematics, Modern Languages, Natural Sciences, or Metaphysics, Ethics, and Civil Polity, who has also obtained Honors, in the same Department or Departments, at the Examination for the Third Year, may omit all other Departments.

A candidate for Honors in Modern Languages, is not required to take both Italian and Spanish, but either of them at his option.

University Medals, Prizes, and Certificates.

Gold Medals may be given upon the special recommendation of the Examiner, to the Students who, at the Final Examinations for the Degree of B.A., have been placed first in the First Class of Honors in any of the following Departments, viz :--

> Classics. Mathematics. Natural Sciences. Modern Languages. Logic, Metaphysics, and Ethics, with Civil Polity.

No Gold Medal in Modern Languages will be awarded, except to such Candidates as have been placed in the First Class, in each of the following Sub-departments, viz: English, French, German, Italian, and Spahish.

No Gold Medal in Natural Sciences will be awarded, except to such Candidates as have been placed in the First Class, in each of the following Sub-departments, viz.: Chemistry, Mineralogy and Geology, and Natural History.

A Silver Medal will be given to each of the Students who, at the Final Examinations for the Degree of B.A., has been placed in any of the above Departments in the First Class in Honors, provided a Gold Medal has not been awarded to him in that Department.

In the Natural Sciences, the rank of First Class in Honors in two of the three Sub-departments, and Second Class in Honors in the Third, will be sufficient qualification for a Silver Medal.

In the Modern Languages, the rank of First Class in Honors in. English, French, German, and either Italian or Spanish, will be sufficient qualification for a Silver Medal.

A Prize, of the value of Twenty Dollars in Books, will be given to each Candidate, who, at the Final Examination for the Degree of B.A., has been placed first in the First Class, in any Sub-department in the Natural Sciences, and is not entitled to a Medal in the Department.

A Prize, of the value of Ten Dollars in Books, will be given to the Candidate who has been placed first in the First Class in Meteorology.

A Prize, of the value of Ten Dollars in Books, will be given to the Candidate who, at any of the Four Examinations of Undergraduates, has been placed first in the First Class in Oriental Languages.

Prizes, each of the value of Ten Dollars in Books, may be awarded annually among Undergraduates in Arts, Law, or Medicine, for the best Compositions in Greek Verse, Greek Prose, Latin Verse, Latin Prose, English Verse, English Prose, French Prose, and German Prose.

Certificates of Honor will be given, at each Examination, to those Students who have been placed in the First Class in any Department.

Application of Chemistry to Agriculture and to Physiology.

The lectures will be illustrated by experiments, specimens, diagrams, and an extensive collection of models and physical apparatus.

The usual applications of the science to manufactures, the arts, pharmacy, and medicine, will be made particularly prominent. The detection of poisons and adulterations, as well as testing in general, will also be fully considered.

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Text Books: Roscoe's Elements of Chemistry; Williamson's Chemistry; Lardner's Hand-book of Heat and Electricity, or Miller's Chemical Physics. For Reference: Fownes's or Naquet's Chemistry.

Fourth Year.

APPLIED CHEMISTRY.

In this course the application of Chemistry to the Arts and Manufactures, and to the ordinary purposes of life, will be more fully entered into; as for instance, glass-making, china and pottery, gas, sugar, calico-printing, dyeing, tanning, preservation and preparation of food, metallurgic processes, &c., &c.

The Lectures will be illustrated by diagrams, models, and specimens of manufacture.

ANALYTICAL CHEMISTRY.

In this short course, the preparation of pure religents, the use of analytical apparatus, the detection of poisons, and the general process of qualitative analysis will be discussed.

NATURAL HISTORY.

Including Zoology and Botany.

Professor. - R. RAMSAY WRIGHT, M.A., B.Sc. (Edin.)

Two courses of Lectures are given in this department; an introductory course for Matriculated Students of the First Year, and a detailed course for Matriculated Students of the Third Year.

I.-Introductory or First Year Course.

The earlier part of the Michaelmas Term will be occupied by a course of Lectures on Elementary Botany, chiefly Morphological and Physiological. The latter part by Lectures on Physiology, chiefly as an introduction to Zoology, which will form the subject of the Lectures of the Easter Term.

(Text-books : Gray's "How Plants Grow ;" Huxley's Elements of Physiology ; Nicholson's Text-book of Zoology.)

Candidates for Honors will find it necessary to consult the following books-Gray's Text Book of Botany; Rolleston's Forms of Animal Life; Nicholson's Manual of Zoology.

II.-Detailed or Third Year Course.

This will consist chiefly of Lectures on Zoology and Comparative Anatomy. These will be illustrated by dissections and preparations of various kinds; and the Morphology, Development, and Distribution in Space and Time of the Principal Groups of the Animal Kingdom will be entered into at length; one of the larger Sub-divisions will be selected for the purpose of demonstrating details of Classification. A short course of Lectures will be devoted to the Morphology and Physiology of Cryptogamic Plants.

(Text-books Nicholson's Manual of Zoology; Rolleston's Forms of Animal Life; Balfour's Manual of Botany, or Gray's Text Book of Botany.)

Candidates for Honors are expected to be familiar, to some extent, with the Canadian Flora; and, for this purpose, will find it necessary to consult Gray's Manual of Botany.

SECTION VIII.

1. Examinations are held at the close of each Term, in the Subjects of Lectures during that Term.

2. All Matriculated Students of the College are required to attend the Michaelmas Examination, in every department or branch prescribed by the University of Toronto as necessary for Students of their respective standings; but the Easter Examination is exclusively for Candidates for Prizes and Honors.

3. Non-matriculated Students are not required to attend the Examinations, unless they are Candidates for Prizes or Honors, or desire to obtain Certificates of Attendance.

4. Candidates for Prizes or Honors are arranged, according to their proficiency, in two classes; and those who are not Candidates for Prizes or Honors, are similarly arranged in the Third Class.

SECTION IX.

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE PRIZES AND CERTIFICATES OF HONOR.

Certificates of Honor in each Department are awarded to those Students who have been placed in either First or Second Class at the First Terminal Examinations, and in First Class at the Second Terminal Examinations. The Prize in each Department is awarded, and on the same principle, to that Student whose standing is highest on comparison of the results of the Examinations.



REGULATIONS RELATIVE TO RESIDENT STUDENTS.

1. The Resident Students are under the immediate charge of the Dean of Residence, MR. LOUDON.

2. Graduates formerly members of the College, and Matriculated Students in Arts, Civil Engineering, or Agriculture, attending Lectures in the College, are admissible as Residents. Rooms cannot be vacated without the permission of the President.

3. Each Student upon entrance is required to sign his name in the Dean's Book, to a declaration that he will conform to the Statutes and Regulations relative to Resident Students.

4. A Register shall be kept of the Attendance of the Residents at Lectures, at Prayers, and at Meals, and also of their Hours of passing the Gate. This Register shall be submitted weekly to the President, and shall also be laid before the Council at their Monthly Meetings.

5. Resident Students shall wear their caps and gowns during Term, both in and outside the College, at the discretion of the Dean.

6. They shall regularly attend Morning and Evening Prayers of the College, unless exempted from so doing, in consequence of the objection of their Parents or Guardians.

7. They shall regularly attend their respective places of Worship on Sunday.

8. No Student shall be absent from the College after the closing of the Gate, except by permission of the Dean.

9. No Stranger shall be admitted after the closing of the Gate, nor remain in the building after 12 o'clock at night.

10. The Dean is authorized to impose Fines for Infraction of Regulations, Insubordination, or Disorderly Conduct.

11. The authority to suspend is vested in the President, and that to expel in the Council.

12. The First Morning Bell shall be rung at 7.30 A.M.; Second Morning Bell at 8 A.M.; Prayers at 8:05 A.M.; Breakfast from 8:15 to 8:55 A.M.; Dinner at 2:15 P.M.; First Evening Bell at 7:P.M.; Prayers at 7:05 P.M.; Tea from 7:15 to 8 P.M.; Second Evening Bell at 9 P.M.; and Gate closed at 9:30 P.M.

13. Students may occasionally invite their friends to any Meal, having previously entered their Names in the Book kept by the Bedel, to whom they shall pay the charge fixed for such Meal.

14. The Officers of the College and Non-resident Students can purchase from the Bedel tickets for Meals.

15. The Fee payable for Resident Students for Board and Rent of Room, varies from Three to Four Dollars per week.

16. All Fees of Undergraduates are to be paid in advance per Month or per Quarter; of Graduates, per Quarter.

CIRCULAR OF DEAN OF RESIDENCE.

As your______purposes coming into residence in this College, I beg to inform you that it is the desire of the Council, that, where there are no conscientious objections, all the Students under their charge should be present in the Hall at Daily Morning and Evening Prayers, with reading of the Scriptures. It is also their wish that they should regularly attend on Sundays their respective places of worship, and receive such other religious instruction as their parents or guardians may desire. I have to request that you will be so good as to let me know whether you desire your ______ to attend such Daily Prayers in the College, and that you will also mention the Minister under whose charge you wish to place him.

The Council will afford every facility for the carrying out of your intentions, and, with this view, will exercise such control over your <u>during his residence</u>, as may be best calculated to effect your wishes. In the event of your not informing me of your desire on the subject, the Council will assume that you have no objection to his being required to attend the Daily Prayers of the College, and will exercise an oversight as to his attendance on the ministrations of a Clergyman of the denomination to which he belongs.


THE MACDONALD BURSARY.

PRESENTED BY JOHN MACDONALD, ESQUIRE.

The sum of \$50 shall be awarded to the Candidate ranking highest in General Proficiency at the University Matriculation in September, 1871, who shall not have taken any University Scholarship. It shall be paid him in two sums of \$25 each, the first on his Matriculating in University College, and the second on his passing the Examination at the close of the Easter Term, on his producing satisfactory evidence of good conduct and moral character.

The sum of \$50 shall be awarded in like manner, in the three following years, to a student of University College of the Second, Third, and B.A. Years, not taking a University Scholarship for the year, according to his standing in General Proficiency in the College Terminal Examinations; the holder of the first year's "Macdonald Bursary" being eligible as a Candidate for it throughout his course, and having the preference in case of equality. It shall be paid him in two sums of \$25 each, the first at the beginning of Michaelmas Term, and the second at the close of Easter Term.

Should the "Macdonald Bursary" fail to be taken during either of the specified years, it shall be again competed for on the same Terms in the following year; and in case of its being forfeited by misconduct, it shall be awarded to the Candidate next in standing.



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
