

Eye-Witness of the Awful Disaster in Montreal Paper

The survivors bore in their appearance, eloquent testimony to the awful ordeat through which they had passed. Some were cut, bruised and bleeding and had their faces smeared withis lime and dirt. The alderman says the sight was the most painful he ever witnessed.
