



The city of St. John provided accommodation for six steamships with an expenditure of one million and a quarter dollars. Dredging and wharf building under the control of Mr. Pugsley's department is a very expensive luxury.

Mr. Pugsley's defeat at the hands of the citizens of St. John would not have a detrimental effect upon the Public Works now under construction in the harbor of St. John nor on those proposed in the future. National interests demand that there shall be proper facilities for handling the trade of the country at all of its great ports. St. John is not the least of these, and could not be ignored with Mr. A. W. Adams as the third member. Or is this a case of more promises?

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
