Atkens, March 20.—The body of the late King George will be placed aboard a warship at Saloniki March 26, and transported to Athens arriving the following day.

King Constantine who reached the capital today will be proclaimed tomorrow and will then proceed to Saloniki accompanied by Premier Venizelos. King Constantine, Dowager Queen Olga and the other members of the royal family will return here with the king's body.

The funeral will probably take place March 30, as the lying in state will occupy three days. Military honors will be rendered not. only by the Athens garrison but by an entire military division which has been ordered here for that purpose.



NAPOLEON'S GREAT MISTAKE

The first serious mistake of Napoleon's career, and one which was not without its effect in bringing about his subsequent downfall, was the execution of the Duke D'Enghien, 109 years ago today. The Duke, accused of conspiring to bring about the restoration of royalty, was arrested in Baden, though on neutral territory, hurried to the castle of Vincennes, near Parls, speedily tried before a military tribunal, convicted and shot on March 21, 1804.

The irregularity of this procedure caused widespread indignation and alienated many of Napoleon's warmest supporters. 
