CZAR'S ARMY CAPTURES TOWN OF BAIBURT

SHOULD NOT GIVE TOO GREAT IMPORTANCE TO ZEPPELIN RAIDS, KITCHENER SAYS

Lives Have Been Lost, But So Far the Raids Have Been a Failure from Military Viewpoint - Sending Anti-Aircraft Guns all Through Country as Fast as They Can be Produced-Making of These Have Precedence Over all Other Ordnance.

London, Feb. 17.—Earl Kitchener announced in the House of Lords to day that the British accounted for one German airship, which was lost at sea, and that there was good reason to believe a second airship had been put out of action.

Lord Kitchener added:

"Up to the present time a hostile air invasion of England has had no influence whatever on the military conduct of the war, and regrettable as is the loss of citizen life and dam age to private property I do not believe the people desire to give too great importance to these attacks or to allow them to affect military operations.

"It must be realized that in war it is not always possible to insure safe ty everywhere, and some risks must be accepted in order to be strong at important points.

"It is beyond our power to guarantee these shores from a repetition of these air incursions, but we shall make them more costly each time."

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

Vessels not sunk or captured are lying tied up to wharves in neutral ports there to remain until the close of the war, and the net result of this is that although the Germans may be able to purchase in neutral countries all the supplies they may need for two or three years of war they are unable to take delivery and consequently the shortage of food and other materials becomes more acute as the war goes on. That, in itself, is one of the most potent factors making for the success of the Allies.

"Until a definite position on the subject is taken, of course, the consequences are a matter of conjecture. The British authorities ought not to overlook the possibility of using armed liners to transport munitions from the United States without calling at United States without calling at United States ports. Halifax and St. John have not as good harbor facilities as New York and other American ports, but if necessary they could rapidly be extended. The British government has, according to a statement by the Minister of Marine a few days ago, about fifty merchant vessels ply-Minister of Marine a few days ago, about fifty merchant vessels plying between Canadian and United Kingdom ports. These are carrying food supplies mostly. The large development of this special traffic points the way for further augmentation in case of necessity. Indeed, it is easy to conceive British and other allied merchant vessels that carry guns for defensive purposes calling at Halifax or St. John, removing their guns temporarily, going to New York or other port of call, and on the return voyage replac-New York or other port of call, and on the return voyage replacing the gun or guns. The one or two comparatively small guns carried by merchant liners could probably be temporarily removed without much work, and the United States authorities at the ports of call could not treat the vessels as other than unarmed traders. If the United States government is going to be so easy and inconsistent as to let Germany dictate its new stand in the matter it cannot blame the Allies if they take whatever means are available for nullifying the effectiveness of the new orders. The Allies have a wealth of resource to employ, much to the embarrassment of United States foreign trade, if they choose to evade the new conditions."

Sir Thomas White, who has delivered his fifth budget speech, already ranks as easily the greatest Finance Minister in Canadian history. This is partly because a period of confusion and strain in world credits has brought out his high qualities and thrown his peculiar fitness for the place into clear relief. 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

Clippings of home news, jokes and little trifles are often enclosed in these letters and from the grateful replies received it is known that the letters are appreciated. 
