THE LUMBER DIFFICULTIES.

The St. John Globe, whose influence is its snarl, last week laid bare another mare's nest. To see more than a week before it at any time is a difficulty which the Globe has never been able fairly to overcome.

Under these circumstances the European market has been the only outlet for the surplus of American production, and this, together with its own ordinary supply, was more than the market could bear, even though the consumption up to the present has exceeded that of last year by some 20 per cent.

In view of this state of affairs, your committee would strongly recommend an earnest effort on the part of the operators to abstain all they can from forcing their lumber on already overstocked markets, and further, to curtail their operations for the coming winter, by at least one third, thus saving the production to the demand.

Your committee believe that this joint action would have a very beneficial effect, and materially improve the markets. Your committee have not entered into any correspondence with other lumber producing centres, having observed from almost all sources that over-production is working its own cure, necessitating curtailed operations, and this Board having had the pleasure of meeting and conferring with the producers from the northern section of the continent, may safely say that over-production is absolutely necessary to stimulate their willingness to act in concert with us, having that end in view.

We regret that your business relations necessitate your temporary absence from this County, but we feel assured that this circumstance will not abate in the slightest degree the deep interest you have hitherto manifested in the political, commercial and social progress of this County.

In conclusion we beg to record our unqualified approval of the course hitherto pursued by you as our Representative in the Government, and the various interests of this County, and the Dominion at large, which will receive at your hands that consideration which his always characterized your past official career.

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Provincial Rifle Competition.

Yesterday week this competition commenced at Sussex, and in spite of the small number of our crack shots present, yet considerable prizes came this year to Northumberland. In the first competition Corporal Pallen won the Provincial Association Silver Challenge Cup and a money prize of twenty dollars with a score of forty points.

In the "All Comers Match" the highest score was forty-four points. Corporal Pallen is the seventh on the list, with a score of forty points and a money prize of five dollars. Fourteenth on the list comes Bombardier D. T. Johnston, with a score of thirty-nine points, and a money prize of four dollars.

In the fourth match for the silver medal of the National Rifle Association of England, and money prizes amounting to \$80, the highest score was seventy-six. Corporal Pallen coming eighth, with a score of seventy-two, winning \$4.00.

In the fifth match for a cup presented by the ladies of St. John, value \$400, and money prizes amounting to \$80, the highest score was forty-two. Corporal Pallen coming third with a score of forty points, and winning a money prize of \$5.00.

Messrs. Editors.

In the Advocate of the 2nd Inst., I noticed a communication under the signature of J. T., who desires to be informed why the Fishermen in Over-seer Parker's district have been allowed to fish sixteen days later than those on the North West River. Now those on the North West River, in justice to myself rather than to gratify his curiosity, I will briefly state the reason. Iron Steamer "Ontario."

Captain Leitch, who has exhibited considerable enterprise in the steamboating line, will have his steamer (now named the Ontario, late Rothesay Castle) ready to send off in about ten days time. Her machinery appears in place, and good progress is being made with the internal fittings. In model the Ontario is very sharp, and will rank probably among the cleanest vessels of her class afloat. She is over 200 feet in length; breadth of main-deck, over all, 51 feet; breadth of hull, 18 feet; depth, 9 feet 6 inches; draws but two feet 10 inches of water forward, and 3 feet aft. In point of speed it is expected she will spin out 16 miles an hour. Her houses and other accommodations will be placed on her arrival at her destination in Ontario. She will have a saloon, cabin and smoking room, each 50 feet in length; ladies cabin 40 feet; with other accommodations. It is intended she will ply on the lakes in the Upper Provinces, probably between Toronto and Niagara, connecting Canada Southern Railway with Grand Trunk at Toronto.
