A Remarkable Confession.

About two years ago two respectable farmers, Henry Johnston and Samuel Brooks, being in the vicinity of the St. Lawrence, England, were convicted of feloniously wounding Isaac Brooks, a neighboring farmer. The details of this peculiarly revolting nature, and Mr. Justice Bowen, in sending them to penal servitude for ten years said they had been found guilty of a heinous and heinous crime. Mr. Brooks, who is described as having gradually wasted away called in a local preacher and told him he could not die without righting two innocent men. He dictated and signed a full confession that Johnston and Clowes were altogether guiltless of the crime of which they had been convicted, and that he himself had obtained a large sum of money from Johnston and Clowes or their friends. In a few hours after the confession Brooks died and was buried, his family having great difficulty in getting hired people to carry his remains to the church-yard. The document, which was attested in presence of Brooks' mother and brother, will be laid before the Home Secretary, and it is believed and hoped the unfortunate men will be speedily released.

The Discoscope.

(From the Electrician.) By the aid of the discoscope, an ingenious instrument brought to public notice during the various Electrical Congress, patrons of the drama will henceforth be able to see as well as hear their favorite operatic and histrionic artists, without moving a yard from home. The apparatus consists of a small "objective" lens, fixed in a position commanding the stage at some distance, and connected by a flexible wire with a diminutive white glass plate, which may be framed and set in the panel of a private drawing-room, however distant from the play-house in question. Total darkness having been obtained in the room furnished with the discoscope, a perfect picture of the stage, its scenery, actors, and so forth, faithful in color and absolutely reproducing the whole performance, will become visible upon the surface of the glass plate. Supplemented by a telephone communicating with the theatre, the discoscope will therefore enable its owner to spend his evenings at the opera in dressing gown and slippers, seated at home in an easy chair.

Russia.

London, Feb. 20.—The Times on Gen. Skobelev's recent speech says: "The Russian Government by its laxness in discipline becomes morally responsible for a state of things distinctly endangering the peace of Europe. Skobelev's position cannot fail to breed alarm and suspicion in the financial and political world. Europe has the right to ask that the Czar's authority should be used to prevent the recurrence of his brand speeches from Russian Generals."

St. Petersburg, Feb. 20.—The Government has ordered that if Anyoub Khan appears he should go to Persia to keep a fixed subvention. This order is due to the desire of Russia to maintain good relations with England.

A remarkable discovery has been made accidentally in Dakota. It is a new fuel, an oil saturated rock inflammable as the best coal. The discovery was made in a creek, and it happened in this way. Some men were blasting a ledge, when a piece of the rock fell into a fire near by and was quickly in a blaze. A pile of three bushels of the rock, and the petroleum rock is soon to be tested on the Milwaukee R. R. as fuel for locomotives. A piece of the rock about as big as a brick was tried in a retort recently by a Yankton scientist, and found to contain three drops of petroleum. The inflammable property of the shale comes from this oil.

In explaining, in the Commons, his recent interferences in regard to Home Rule, Mr. Gladstone said that the centralization of Parliament should be the cardinal rule of policy; that local interests are a source of great strength, and that the only limit which, in principle, he is necessary to them is adequate provision for supremacy of central authority. He believed the wise and just way of getting a demand for bringing Irish affairs more under Irish control is not to regard it as the first step towards separation, but rather to ask the promoters in charge to formulate the general principle proposed to give for supremacy of Parliament.
