The Local Legislature.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 22.

Mr. Davidson took his seat in the Assembly this morning.

Mr. Barrie moved his bill authorizing Restigouche County Council to exempt Spool Robin and Starch factories for ten years. Mr. White, of Carleton, in the chair.

Mr. Davidson who agreed with the principle of the bill, favored an Act for the whole Province.

Hon. Mr. Adams, Messrs. Hill, Thompson and the mover took the same ground and progress was reported.

The following committee was appointed on bills relating to Municipalities: Messrs. Hill, Sayre, Morton, Black, Ritchie, Davidson and Thompson.

Mr. White (Carleton), gave notice of the following enquiry for Saturday—

"By what authority were the members of this Assembly paid for by stationery at last session; also if any person or persons other than the clerks and members have been supplied with stationery from the clerk's table during the present session, is it, I, Ball, a member of the House. If so, what is the character of his work and how long has he been employed? Was the money paid for stationery at full rate for all services, and if not, what amount is still due?"

Mr. Johnson gave notice of a resolution that one member from each County be appointed a committee to apportion the by-road money for the ensuing year.

Mr. Barrie introduced a bill to amend the Free Schools Act, the amendment providing that the school assessment on property shall be paid in the school district in which the property is situated, instead of as at present in the district in which the owner resides.

Hon. Mr. Fraser followed up the motion of Hon. Mr. Wedderburn by urging hon. members to take advantage of the bill in business at present to bring forward what private bills they could. He gave this early notice so that the public might not be taken by surprise.

Mr. Hill endorsed all the Attorney General had said, and regretted that the first two weeks or so of each session were practically wasted.

Mr. Willis started a little breeze by insinuating that an accident like that which delayed the consideration of the Address might also delay the estimates.

Hon. Mr. Wedderburn warmly responded to this allusion to his recent indisposition, and advised Willis to withhold his sarcastic allusions till he (Willis) had at least recovered his own good health.

Mr. Butler introduced a bill to amend Chap. 59 Consolidated Statutes, of "Parish Courts." The bill provides that in the event of a vacancy in the office of Parish Court Commissioner, residents may bring action in an adjoining parish.

A number of motions were passed. House adjourned at 5.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 23.

Hon. Mr. Crawford introduced a bill to encourage the establishment of manufactures.

Hon. Mr. Fraser introduced a bill to amend Chap. 100, of the Consolidated Statutes of Rates and Taxes.

Mr. Gillespie gave notice of motion for a detailed account of the assets and liabilities of the Province at the time of the meeting of the Legislature, showing every bank or persons with whom the department have had financial transactions; also a statement of advances made by the Dominion Government to this Province up to the present date.

Mr. Colter introduced a bill to amend the Act relating to the survey and exportation of lumber.

Mr. Johnson gave notice of a motion that it is desirable that an official reporter be employed to report the debates of the Assembly.

Mr. Barrie gave notice of inquiries as to whether lands in Gloucester, advertised for sale on the first Tuesday in March have been disposed of to some purchasers, and if so, at what price and to whom; also were any of the lots advertised as aforesaid withdrawn from sale; also, were the lots advertised as for sale on the first Tuesday in April, applied for by bona fide applicants, who were the purchasers, and at what price?

The House then adjourned.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 24.

The House met at 10 o'clock, and several bills were advanced a stage.

Mr. Fraser introduced a bill relating to representation to the General Assembly, which gives the counties of Kent, Carleton, and Gloucester three members each.

Mr. Johnson gave notice of motion for Tuesday next in regard to additional representation for Kent, Carleton and Gloucester Counties.

The rules were suspended and Mr. Elder introduced his bill to amend the act of incorporation of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

Mr. Elder's bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Bible Society passed in committee without amendment.

The Attorney General gave notice that he would move the House into committee on Tuesday on his bill relating to parish courts.

Mr. Barrie gave notice of motion for correspondence of the government with reference to the claim of Robt. Sinclair.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 25.

Hon. Mr. Adams submitted the 21st Annual Report of the Crown Land Department.

Mr. Sayre's bill providing that the Clerk of the Peace shall be the trial judge of contested elections of county councillors was considered in committee.

Mr. Lynott in the chair. Mr. Sayre argued that it had been found necessary to vest the power of trying contested elections to the Assembly in Judges.

The Attorney General's bill was considered in committee. The bill was passed by the County Councils showed that the same principle should be applied to Municipal Councils.

Headed visting his power and the Peace and pointed out that the machinery connected with such trials was simple and inexpensive.

The bill also contained a clause which the Attorney General had inserted at the suggestion of Mr. Barrie at Municipal elections. A general discussion ensued, and finally it was voted to report progress, which was done.

Mr. Blair moved his resolution asking if the Government proposed making appointments to the Legislative Council.

Hon. Provincial Secretary replied that the Government did intend making appointments and that the matter was now occupying the attention of the Government.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 27.

Afternoon Session.

The House was engaged all morning with routine business.

Dr. Vail's motion for all papers connected with the Eastern Extension Railway claims called out some debate, which was in progress at adjournment for dinner.

Mr. Blair supported the motion in a vigorous speech, asking that the House should be put in possession of the exact position of the claim at present.

Hon. Mr. Fraser replied, showing that the Dominion engineer had submitted a report which was now under the consideration of the Federal Government.

He hoped to be able to give the full particulars before the prorogation, and the papers and information now in possession of the Government would be brought down.

Mr. Barrie and Mr. Wedderburn followed.

SPECIAL TO THE ADVOCATE.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 27.

Afternoon Session.

A lengthy debate on the Eastern Extension Railway, took up a greater part of the afternoon.

Mr. Blair did not think the Government was pressing the claim as they should. He said that the Government had been guaranteed by the Hon. leader of the Government to be forth-coming before the opening of this Session, and apparently the Province was as far from getting it as the last.

Mr. Blair, with explanation to the House the basis of his claim. That it was for some reason the Province claimed the Eastern Extension Railway had been estimated when taken by the Dominion Government in connection with the Intercolonial.

He thought that there were no doubts that the Province would eventually receive the money.

Hon. Mr. Hanington spoke at some length favoring the policy of the Government in regard to the claim. He said the Government did not want to withhold any information—in fact they were being very cautious.

Messrs. Blair and Willis also made extended remarks.

The Provincial Secretary said all the papers connected with negotiations between the Provincial and Dominion Governments would be brought down.

Mr. Willis's inquiry if there was any charge preferred against Robert Vail of Gloucester, for non-compliance as Sheriff was answered by Provincial Secretary that there had not been.

Parliamentary Secretary to the Government of the Province, Mr. J. A. F. McLean, in a speech of some length, urged hon. members to take advantage of the bill in business at present to bring forward what private bills they could. He gave this early notice so that the public might not be taken by surprise.

Mr. Hill endorsed all the Attorney General had said, and regretted that the first two weeks or so of each session were practically wasted.

Mr. Willis started a little breeze by insinuating that an accident like that which delayed the consideration of the Address might also delay the estimates.
