

In these times when it is necessary to bring every expense of growing a crop to the lowest point possible, it will be economy for a farmer with eight or ten acres of potators to tend, to buy a force pump and barrel for a reservoir, mount them on a cart or wagon and do the work by horse power. These pumps are now made with projecting arms that distribute the quid over s'x to eight rows at one passage of the team. If the lips are small, of course a portion of the poisen is lost by falling between the rows, but this is of little importance

compared with the saving of labor. The campaign against the po'ato oug is at the best a disagreeal le and irksome lator. No work on the farm is more dreaded by farm help. The morel taught us by the bugs is: Secure as even a stand of plants as possible, force a luxuriant growth carly in the season and fertilize sufficiently to p oduce a large crop.
Only large yields of a crop requiring as much labor as potatoes can be made profitable.—A. O. BAYLEY, in Am Cul. .

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
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
