

# NORTHWARD HO!

The news that arrangements may be made for the glant British dirigible airship R 36 to attempt to fly to the North Pole again prompts the question whether these leviathans are a safe means of aerial transport.
Sceptics point to the terrible "Dix

mude" catastrophe, which occurred only a short while ago, the disaster which befell the super-airship R 38, while flying over the Humber, in 1921, and the premature destruction of the Italian airship Roma.

"How can you expect people risk their lives in these giant airliners when practically every large dirigible has come to an untimely end?" they ask.

These accidents have certainly shaken the public's faith in lighter-than-air machines. At the moment the average air-traveller prefers the aeroplane, for these craft have flown many millions of miles in all kinds of weather, and there have only been two serious accidents on the British com mercial air routes.

## Giants of the Upper Air.

Airships, however, can remain in the air far longer than aeroplanes, and commercial dirigibles have been oper ated successfully in the past. So, despite adverse criticism, there are two syndicates which hope to inaugurage commercial airship services in the near future. One is British and the
