Two Farm Hands' Sunday Afternoon Quarrel.

Charles Hodges Alleged to Have Stabbed Ben Hubbard.

Death Results in a Short Time-

Residents of Middlesex county have not sed to talk of one unfortunate quar articipants until another somewhat simi Robert Murray quarreled with W. O. Rowe and killed the latter by a blow on the head. His trial, resulting in a verdict of manslaughter, was but finished on Satur-

Yesterday afternoon a quarrel occurred at the farm of Mr. John Geary, lots 13-14, con. 5, London township, a few miles north of this city, and one of the parties to it is

now numbered among the dead.

THE MURDER.
Charles Hodges, 65 years of age, and Ben.
Hubbard, aged 35, were employed as farm hands by Mr. Geary, both being married men with families. They quarreled during yesterday afternoon, and are said not to have been on speaking terms for about a ar prior to that day. Half an hour after the first quarrel (about 4 o'clock) Hodges was standing on a platform, four feet high, used for straining and shipping milk. Hubbard walked towards the platform and ascended it. A souffle ensued, and Hubbard fell to the ground. He died in a few minutes from a severe wound in the region of the heart, evidently inflicted by a knife. The vest and two shirts had been pierced through as can be learned nobody was near at hand when the affair occurred, although a young son of Hubbard saw his father fall and gave the alarm.

THE WEAFON.

Hodges was placed under guard and word was sent to the city. Dr. Hutchinson and some of the county officers drove at once to the scene. Detective Graham searched the premises for the knife and finally found one in a small tin box on one of the windows inside the house. On this black-handled knife, the blade of which is three inches long, are stains, some of which the detective claims, have been made by blood. Dr. Hutchinson examined the body and found that the bottom of the heart had been pierced.

THE ARREST.

The prisoner was placed under arrest and brought to this city, the information charging him with "willful murder" being sworn out by Detective Graham. Squire Jarvis remanded the prisoner for one week. In the meantime witnesses are being summoned for the inquest.

While suspicion may point strongly to the wound having been inflicted by Hodges, there is no direct proof as yet and the fact that the prisoner denies having used a knife or having seen one, as well as that no weapon was found in his possession, making the case one not readily solved.

Hodges was sitting quietly behind the railings in High Constable Schram's office with an officer on guard when an ADVERTISER reporter dropped in. The prisoner looks young for a man of 65 years. He has an iron grey beard and a ruddy complexion. He was dressed in his working clothes, and did not show that he realized his position very keenly, whatever his inward feelings might have been. He spoke calmly enough about the affair. When asked if he had used a knife, he said with emphasis,
