DULUTH, June 29.—Edmund Reed, a young animal keeper of Ringling Bros.' circus, met with a frightful accident here Monday atternoon. The performance was over and he had been preparing meat to over and he had been preparing meat to feed the animals. A large crowd of spectators was standing about the lion's den. A lady asked to see the lion move around. His majesty was lying down. Reed put his hand into the cage and touched the brute. Like a flash the big paw of the beast came down upon his arm with terrific force and, to the horror of the spectators, the animal instantly set his jaws upon the man's arm. Other attaches of the circus rushed to Reed's rescue. Iron hooks and sharp stell prods were punched into the mouth and prods were punched into the mouth and nose of the ferocious beast, but to no purpose, and finally the fainting man was pulled away from the brute by sheer force His arm from above the elbow to the wrist His arm from above the ellow to the wrist was literally stripped of its flesh and the bone laid bare. The bone was not crushed. Reed retained consciousness, and was lurried into a carriage and taken to St. Mary's Hospital, where the arm was amputated close to the shoulder. The present is a good time to reflect on the cause of this difference.

IMPORTANT DECISION BY THE GREAT COMMERCIAL CON-GRESS.

The Congress of the Chambers of Comnerce of the British Empire, assembled in London, Eng., have voted down the resolution proposed by Sir Charles Tupper in favor of what is known as preferential trade relations between the British Empire and the colonies. The vote stood 34 for the proposition to 78 against.

The congress is a representative assembly. and the decision of its members against the revival of so-called "protective" taxes, even in their mildest shape, is a fitting answer to those who have been asserting that both Great Britain and the colonier were favorable to this retrograde step.

When Lord Salisbury delivered his amous speech at Hastings he suggested that it might be well to collect high duties on luxuries imported into Great Britain from countries that imposed duties on imports from Great Britain. The suporters of the scheme now rejected by the Congress of Chambers of Commerce professed to find in this suggestion a hint that Lord Salisbury was a convert to Howard Vincent's preferential trade fad, and there was much rejoicing. But they were happy prematurely. Lord Salisbury at once instructed his secretary to disclaim the construction put upon his speeches in these terms:

"Foreign Office, June 8, 1892.
"I have to point out that on the occasion referred to, March 12, 1888, on which Lord Salisbury spoke, two peers had recommended the imposition of a duty on foreign corn as a remedy for agricultural depression in this country, and that Lord Salisbury in 1888, as at Hastings in 1892, declared this to be impossible. to be impossible.

Then, in answer to the charge made against him that "he advocated protection and the increasing of the price of the people's food," his lordship addressed the owing reply to a Conservative member of

Parliament:

"This is absolutely untrue. Either Capt. Fenwick has not read Lord Salisbury's speech at Hastings or he is guilty of deliberate miscepresentation. Lord Salisbury expressly stated that the price of food and raw materials must not be raised, but that duties might be placed on articles of luxuricus consumption to enable this country to maintain the raised. cus consumption to enable this country to maintain her right of access to foreign markets.

And that there might be no mistaking the position of the British Government on the question, Lord Balfour of Burleigh, a member of the Salisbury Administration, a uple of weeks ago repudiated the view that a system of discriminating duties to turning the half of the national holiday against all products not grown in the into a time of work for themselves and their colonies would be in the interests of Great Britain, and that in the strongest possible terms. Replying to the proposition that Britain should enter into an arrangement of this kind with Canada, Lord Balfour said:

WHY THIS INTIMIDATION?

When James Dinkey, chief of the electrical department, climbed the poles to cut down the effigy of Mr. Frick the workmen turned the hose on him that had been prepared as a defense for the plant and caused him to beat a hasty retreat. Wm. McBroom is chief of the steel works police. To-night Jas. McNeely, a policeman supposed to be in the employ of the Carnegie Company, was artested, charged with carrying concealed weapons. All the Carnegie works here have shut down except the beam mill, and the idle workmen are patrolling the streets of the town on the lookout for "scabs."


