#### With This Wonderful Invention Accurate and Reliable Records May Be Obtained.

"The novelty of this machine, said the chief medical officer of the department, "is the perfection to which it has been brought. It may be worked by a finger. Here, you see, is the cruder appartus, made some years ago. It has no the fittings that make the orthodiagraph

"But you can see the action of the human heart without all this though it may not be generally known. An X-ray tube and a screen are all that are really necessary."

Great value is attached to the use of the orthodiagraph, which will enable accurate and reliable records of the state of patients' hearts to be obtained. At present however, only the outlines and the movements can be observed. It is not possible yet to see the structure of the heart. The orthodiagraph was made at Nauheim, Germany.






