

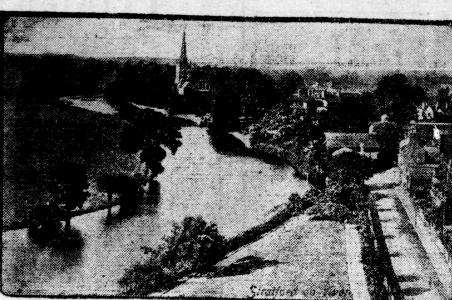

Former President of Venezuela Now Says He's Going Back.

CASTRO THE NERVY

Dresden, Feb. 22.-Cipriano Castro, the former President of Venezuela, is planning to return to that country and resume the position of a private citizen. He sent a letter some weeks ago to President Gomez, setting forth his purpose to return, and his willingness to recognize the position of Gomez by himself voluntarily retiring from the presidency, but up to the present time he has received no answer.
