Surplus Produce of Rumania Must Go to the Central Powers

Amsterdam, May 14.—A Vienna dispatch says that a special economic treaty between Rumania and the central empires provides that Rumania will sell to Germany and Austria-Hungary her surplus production in 1918 and 1919 of all kinds of grain, including oil seeds, and also fodder, pulse, poultry, cattle, fibrous plants and wool. Rumania also agrees to sell this surplus to the central powers for a further period of seven years if it should be re-

ITALIANS VICTORS IN FURIOUS FIGHT FOR MOUNT CORNO

Austrians Are Repulsed With Heavy Losses.

Italian Army Headquarters in Northern Italy, Monday, May 13.-Italian vac troops repulsed with heavy loss a desperate enemy attempt last night to redeem the loss of Monte Korno. It is believed that this was only the first of a series of efforts to regain the lost ground owing to the value of the height which commands the approaches to the valley leading from Trent to Rovereto.

The fight last night was in the darkness and was a bloody hand-to-hand struggle over the rocky slopes of the mountain. The Italian positions, howtroops repulsed with heavy loss a desmountain. tivity all along the mountain front. LITHUANIA MUST HELP CARRY THE WAR BURDEN

Amsterdam, May 14.-Emperor Wiliam has issued a proclamation con-cerning Lithuania in which he says it is assumed Lithuania will participate in the war burdens of Germany.

Lithuania is one of the former Russian border states which the Germans have attempted to set up as nominally independent countries, under German influence. Germany is taking effort to exploit the states economically, but except in the case of Poland, has not attempted to force the former Russian subjects to fight with the German army, as the emperor's announcement indicates may now be done in Lithuania. The attempt to enroll a Polish army on the same plea that is now made in the case of Lithuania was a failure.

Monster Delegation Invades Capital and Shows Govt. Has Not Kept Pledges to the Agriculturists Over Military Service.

QUOTES PREMIER AND COLLEAGUES IN PROVING CHARGES MADE

Ottawa, May 14.-Farmers of Ontario and Quebec presented their views to the Government today. It was such a delegation in its extent as has rarely, if ever, been seen in the capital before. Twenty-five hundred Ontario farmers jammed the Russell Theatre; outside were a couple of thousand men from Quebec, unable to secure admission. They held an overflow meeting in the street. For New Brunswick, Farmer C. L. Smith spoke briefly. It was announced also that a delegation from Manitoba was on the way.

MUST HOLD LINES, SAYS PREMIER. In his reply, the prime minister emphasized the necessity of holding the lines on the western front. "I know whereof I am speaking when I tell you," he declared, "that if the channel ports should be reached through the breaking of that line it would be, to say the least, extremely problematical whether any of that production of which you speak could be made of service to the Allied nations overseas, or to our men who are holding that line. I regard it as the supreme duty of this Government to see that these men, some of whom have been fighting for three years, are sustained by such reinforcements as will enable them to hold the line."

NO SPECIAL CLASS Sir Robert Borden, replying to the delegation said: "You have given us your new of what is best in the national interest. 





THE WAR SITUATION

Committed, as they are, to a continuation of heavy fighting on the western front, the Germans apparently are taking their full time before beginning another forward operation on the line from Solssons north to the Belgian coast. North of Kemmel, around Serre, on the line between Aibert and Arras, and on the southern end of the British line across the Somme, and on the French sector immediately south, the German big guns are hurling thousands of shells into the allied positions. The British last night carried out a successful raid northeast of Robecq (Flanders), and took prisoners.

Alled airmen are taking advantage of every opportunity to invade new territory. Many more tons of bombs have been dropped on important railway centres and other military targets behind the German lines in Flanders and Picardy. In aerial fighting the British have brought down six more enemy machines. While British naval airmen bombed the German sub bases at Zeebrugge and Ostend, army filers continue the aerial bombardment of Bruges.

West of Montdidier and northwest of Toul, American artillerymen are haras-West of Montdidier and northwest of Toul, American artillerymen are harassing the Germans with a heavy fire. Considerable damage is believed to have been caused on both sectors. Lively fighting continues in the Monte Corno region, south of Asiago, with the Italians throwing back repeated Austrian efforts to regain the summit of the mountain. Elsewhere on the Italian front the artillery duel goes on, but there are no indications that the enemy is ready to start his heralded attack.







OTTAWA, May 13.-When consideration of the civil service bill was resumed by the House, in committee, this sumed by the House, in committee, this afternoon, H. C. Hocken, with the consent of the committee, withdrew his amendment in regard to requiring the publication of names of relatives in the civil service. He then submitted another amendment extending its scope.

The new amendment provided for the publication of a report showing names of "any relatives by blood or marriage in the Government service in the Senate in the House of Commons or in the civil service of an appointee to a position in the civil service.

Mr. Nicholson remarked that the position taken in the amendment was adopted by certain large corporations some years ago, but they had found it inadequate and unworthy. In Mr. Nicholson's opinion, the amendment would simply bring an efficient civil servant into contumely simply because he happened to have some relative in the public service.

ENGLAND BANISHES 'FAVORED NATION' IN **COMMERCIAL PACTS**

Country Will Be Left Free In Matters of Fiscal Policy.

London, May 14.—Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, made an important announcement in the House of Commons on Monday, the the House of Commons on Monday, the Times says, when, in reply to a question by Sir Edward Carson, he said the British Government intended to adopt a policy similar to that of the French Government, in denouncing all commercial conventions containing a general clause regarding "most favored nations." Such a step, the Times declares in Such a step, the Times declares in its editorial comment, will leave Great Eritain free in matters of fiscal policy. Up to this time the United Kingdom has been bound by commercial treaties with allied and neutral countries guaranteeing reciprocal "most favored nations" treatment in fiscal matters.

Commercial treaties with enemy countries were terminated by the war. So long as commercial treaties remained in force the Times adds, it was impossible for the United Kingdom to give specially favorable treatment to her dominions or allies in customs duties on imports or to differentiate beduties on imports or to differentiate be duties on imports or to differentiate between countries to which are exported goods of the United Kingdom.

These commercial traties are now to be denounced. This denunciation, it is said, does not mean necessarily that there will be any radical change in the fiscal policy of Great Britain, but it makes such a change possible.

BUSINESS LIFE INSURANCE.

Business life insurance should particularly appeal to a businessman. The relationship between home and the business in which he is engaged is very close. Huebner says: "So close is this relation that a policy taken for the special conservation of the business may often prove even more valuable than a policy taken out for the direct protection of the family. The latter policy can seldom do more than alleviate in a measure the financial injury caused by the death of the income-producer, while the former may be the means of successfully continuing in operation the business of the deceased. Had not the former been taken out the business might have failed or declined. The family policy usually assures the continuance of a portion only of the insured's income during life, while the business policy, since it conserves the efficiency of the insured's business, may be instrumental in bringing about the continuation of a much larger income, viz., the income from a successful business. Moreover, the owner of a business, generally speaking, conducts the same primarily with a view to supporting a home and the welfare of the business are so intimately related as, generally speaking, to be inseparable. On the one hand the advantages of family insurance, such as freedom from worry, increase of initiative, etc., will produce a very wholesome effect upon the welfare of the insured's business, and business success means, as a rule, family happiness and contentment. On the other hand business adversity practically always means family adversity, and therefore, business insurance which protects the business against disaster, is in reality also family insurance since it preserves the family's interest in the inome derived from that business.. The speculative risks connected with nearly all business pursuits and the danger of meeting with business failure need not be outlined to men of experience. Suffice it to say that compilations show that the number of actual business failures is exceedingly large, that the amount of failure liabilities over a series of years is about the same as the total fire loss and is equally subject to great fluctuations because of unforeseen contingencies and that the probability of business mortality is about as great as human mor tality at age 41. It is also noteworthy that in a year like 1907 approximately one-fifth of the total number of business failures, involving over 55 per cent of the total failure l'abilities, was due to disasters, failure of apparently soivent ors and competition—causes which cannot be considered as due to the faults of those who failed, while another 37 per cent of the failures were trace able to lack of capital and 5 per cent to inexperience.

In every community we meet with instances of once prosperous families duced to straitened circumstances through failure brought about by the sudden

death of the head of the business, or of a valued official or employee.

At such a time all adverse influences will seem to operate at once against the credit facilities, and the competing power of the business, with the result that the enterprise may go under because of lack of capital and the inexperience of the survivors. But the cruelest results of business failures become apparennt when we note the effects upon the homes of the deceased and surviving partners. Here the reduced income may necessitate moving to humble quarters, curtailing expenses, and withdrawing the children from school or college. That such occurrences should be so common is truly a pity when by the employment of business life insurance the business might easily have been protected against the dangers referred to." the dangers referred to."
