MONTREAL BLACKHANDER SENTENCED TO DEATH

Francesco Creola to Die for the Murder of a Fellow Countryman.

Montreal, March 24.—With the compasses of an ancient scale, a former citizen of Italy yesterday afternoon heard and accepted without flinching the intimation that he is to pay the extreme penalty of the law for having taken the life of a fellow countryman nearly a year ago.

"Have you any reason to advance why sentence of death should not be passed upon you?" was the question put by Justice Lavergne to Francesco Creola, alias Crocola, who had been found guilty of murder.

Answering through the interpreter, the condemned man replied: "Seeing that such is the decision of the learned judge, there is nothing for me to do but to meet death." Sentence was then imposed, by the learned judge, who assumed the official cap while pronouncing it, fixing the date of the execution for May 26. Creola remained quite unmoved as he heard the sentence.

GREY TO BE ASKED TO DISSOLVE COMMONS

Toronto, March 24.—Toronto Conservatives have called a public meeting for next Thursday, when they will draw up a petition asking Edward Grey to dissolve Parliament in order to bring on an election, and thus block passage of the reciprocity agreement.

EWART ONCE MORE CRITICIZES GREY

Declares Governor-General Is Too Imperialistic.

FOR MOST CANADIANS

Considers That the Earl is Advocating Overseas Clubs Is Acting Against Sentiment of Majority of Canadians.

Ottawa, March 24.—John S. Ewart, K.C., is out with a statement in reply to the criticisms of his attack upon Earl Grey for his advocacy of the Overseas Clubs in Canada.

He says in part: "I join most sincerely in the general denunciation of Lord Grey. In many ways his activities have been most unfortunate and permanent benefits. We owe him much, but unfortunately, with reference to a matter of most vital importance in connection with the subject of the Overseas Clubs, he has shown a very large number of people to be a large majority of our people."

"In the nature of their aspirations for the betterment of this country, Canadians have always been sharply and fundamentally divided. Imperialists and Nationalists (although not both last year) have stood for the same ends, but by different means. The former have stood for a policy of expansion, and the latter for a policy of contraction. It is my contention that we are now living under a constitutional monarchy, and that our King most properly maintains an attitude of strict neutrality with regard to all subjects of political dispute, that our duties are to be loyal to the Crown, to the Constitution, and to the people."

AN ORANGE PROTEST

N. B. Grand Lodge Say Church Is Interfering With Marriage Laws.

St. Stephen, N. B., March 24.—The Orange Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, which finished its session at an early hour this morning, Rev. H. Thomas, chairman of Executive Committee, was elected grand master.

The following resolution was passed: "That this Grand Lodge of New Brunswick, in writing the Governor of St. Stephen, unanimously register a protest against the unlawful and unjust interference with the marriage laws of Canada, and against their disturbing interference with the homes of the British subject as aforesaid, and that we urge upon all loyal subjects to write and demand that our Legislature enact a special law which will make it a criminal offence for any priest or bishop of the Roman Catholic Church to write any minister of any denomination, why, in the exercise of their duties, disturb the peace of families or seek to annoy any British subject in the full exercise of his civil right, or from being that which the laws of Canada permit him to do, under a fine or imprisonment."

RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT PURELY CANADA'S CONCERN

Mr. Bryce Not Instructed to Act for Home Government Over Negotiations.

London, March 24.—In the House of Commons yesterday Sir Edward Grey informed J. F. Broun, M. P., that no instructions were given to the Washington ambassador to invite the Canadian Government to insist on equal concessions being granted by the United States to British as to Canadian trade.

Mr. Broun further asked Sir Edward Grey if he was still determined to sign the treaty, and whether he intended before attempting to obtain advantages, which undoubtedly would accrue to British trade by the treaty on the same lines as the Canadian. The home secretary, answering, said: "No, the treaty does not require ratification. The legislation is Canadian and purely domestic in character."

Mr. Broun: Are we to consider Canada part of the British Empire? Sir Edward Grey: I need hardly refer to the very explicit local declaration of Sir Wilfrid Laurier on this subject. (Cheers.) Sir Edward further said the Canadian Government had not expressed a desire to be relieved of their obligations under the most favored nation treaties. President Taft had indicated that the present agreement was to be only a beginning of new relations with Canada.

GOVT. DETERMINED TO FIGHT THE "TRUST EVIL"

Will Oppose Application for Injunction Made by United Shoe Machinery Co.

Ottawa, March 23.—For the first time in Canada the Dominion Government will cross swords with the trusts. It will go to court to fight, so far as the Government is concerned, it is the determined intention of the representatives of the Canadian people that the trust evil, as it is known in the United States, shall not obtain any foothold in this Dominion.

In the commons this afternoon Mr. McLean, of Huron, drew the attention of the Government to the fact that the United Shoe Machinery Corporation, a Montreal branch of the United States concern, had applied to the court for a writ of prohibition or injunction to prevent the board of investigation appointed by the Government from proceeding with its inquiry into the corporation's methods. (Loud cheering.) Hon. Macdonald King stated that the chairman of the board had applied to the court for the writ, and that the Government was opposed to it. The Minister of Labor had immediately appointed Mr. Aime Gauthier, K. C., to advise the Government on the merits of opposing the application and showing cause why it should not be granted.

The press understands that the Government has decided to make a thorough test of the present case. In the event of non-success, the pending legislation, the case will be carried on to the highest courts if necessary. The Government is determined not to be intimidated at the inception of its conduct with the trusts, and to demonstrate that such corporations cannot block official public proceedings for investigating themselves.

CITY WILL ONLY PAY 50 PER CENT OF REPAIRS

County Is Likely To Be Surprised on Matter of Court House Improvements.

The finance committee will meet this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock to discuss the repairs to the court house.

For some days City Auditor Jewell has been obtaining information for the committee regarding former agreements for repairs, and that will be ready for the afternoon this afternoon. Mr. Jewell has figured out the price for the repairs, and will report to the committee that he will insist on the city not paying more than 50 per cent of the cost, instead of 60 per cent, as first mentioned.

The conference between the finance committee and the full committee will take place this evening in the city hall.

Joint buildings will not be discussed at the meeting, as the whole energy of the representatives in settling the proposition each municipality is to pay for the changes.

"We intend to hold out for a good agreement," declared Ald. Eckert. "I think 60 per cent is too much for the city to pay, particularly as we have no proprietary rights whatever in the building. I think the county will agree with our contention."

RUSHING CHATEAU LAURIER. Ottawa, March 23.—"We are going to try our best to have the Chateau Laurier finished by about Sept. 1 or Sept. 15, and we expect to do so," said E. W. Sherman, manager of the magnificent new hotel, this morning.

The response was made to the G. T. R. some time ago by the city that it should finish the hotel by September in time for the arrival here of the Duke of Connaught, and the company is accordingly making strenuous efforts to do so. Its completion will be made the occasion for a big "coming-out" of some kind, the details of which have not yet been decided.

THE OPPOSITION STILL OBSTRUCTING

Continue to Retard Progress in Voting of Supply.

NO COLOR LINE DRAWN

Government Gives Denial to Report That Negroes Had Been Turned Back

Ottawa, March 23.—Within an hour and a half of ascending the House of Commons yesterday, the process was not accomplished, however, without vigorous opposition efforts to obstruct by the reading of further communications, press reports, and other data concerning reciprocity. The speaker avoided himself of the point of Mr. Foster on Tuesday, to the effect that he was too lenient in administering the rules affecting the introduction of extraneous subject matter, to tighten the reins, and require closer conformity to the rules. In this course he recalled the forbearance of the Prime Minister and Minister of Finance, both of whom emphasized the necessity for making progress in the voting of supply.

Mr. Gilbert, Nationalist member for Drummond and Arthabaska, however, served notice that tomorrow on the government motion to go into supply he would move an amendment calling for an extensive free course of agricultural training and assistance to farmers throughout Canada.

Mr. Meunier, inquired from the Premier as to when it was proposed to resume the consideration of the reciprocity agreement. "We were told a few days ago," the Jacques Cartier member continued, "that this was to be the first consideration of the House, that Parliament was in honor bound to continue the deliberations on it until it was finally disposed of. Now we suddenly find the matter shelved without any explanation. I would like to ask the Prime Minister why this course has been followed, and whether the subject has been shelved for good."

"My honorable friend is aware that we are engaged in the end of the fiscal year," replied Sir Wilfrid Laurier, "and that it is consequently our first duty to attend to the voting of supply."

The Nationalist leader did not think this was an answer to his question. He wanted to know if reciprocity had been shelved.

"When supply has been voted, then we will attend to the reciprocity agreement," observed the Prime Minister.

No Color Line in Canada. On motion to go into supply, Mr. Wilcox pointed out the charges that the Government was drawing the color line against negroes coming into the country and securing appointments in the department of 2,000 colored men.

Mr. Meunier was assured that such was not the case. In the country of Kent there were many colored farmers, and he was glad to hear that the Government was being urged to place a total ban of 2,000 colored men, as was done with Chinese, he had protested earnestly against such a discrimination against a people who were doing themselves worthy and industrious in various avocations. He had at once taken the matter up with the Minister of the Interior in a very urgent manner, and was glad to say he had received a letter from Hon. Mr. Oliver, stating that the report that the Government intended to draw a color line without foundation in fact, and that no such course as was suggested would be followed.

Mr. Meunier pointed to many of the colored people in his constituency, who are diligently working out their own livelihood and helping to build up Canada.

Mr. Wilcox asked if there was any sentiment in Canada in favor of excluding colored people. If there was he was opposed to it.

Hon. Mr. Oliver said it was undoubtedly the fact that there was a strong sentiment in Canada against admitting colored men as settlers or citizens. 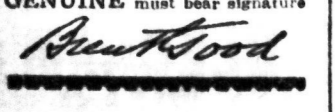

Brantford, March 23.—The Canadian Baseball League commenced business in earnest at a general meeting held here tonight, but owing to difficulty in securing the proper man for the presidency, this position was left open until the next general session, which will be held at London on the 11th of April.

Only Terms to the Rebel Leader Are Those Made by War Department.

[Canadian Press.] Mexico City, March 23.—Admitting that Mexico is in a worse position than he had believed, Minister of Finance Limontour today said that the administration had no definite plans for the solution of the problems confronting the Government. It had no alternative but to continue the military programme upon which it had entered, he said. Notwithstanding the Government's aggressive attitude, reforms which were intended to remedy the alleged grievances were being considered. The most important of these reforms was that relative to the revision of the local laws.

This is the outline of the situation as presented by Mr. Limontour to a representative of the press, following a meeting of the cabinet. The administration, he said, recognized two classes in the dissatisfied public opinion represented by the nationalist but not by the rebel forces, and the offer by the followers of Madero.

Terms for Madero. The offer of the administration had not gone beyond the point of being made at the war department.

Mr. Limontour frankly expressed surprise at the attitude of the administration that the rebel leader should be offered terms.

"I don't know as yet how far we should go," he said. "I am not conducting a campaign against the rebel forces. More than that, I hope to discover the reasons for their resistance and to see that the rebels may be brought back to the fold."

Senior Limontour said he did not know how far the rebels had gone in their military operations. He had, however, his father and his grandfather for many years and for a long time have held this position of attorney. He said he had never before seen the rebels and he hoped that the rebels would be brought back to the fold. The rebels, he said, had no other alternative than to return to the fold.

ABUSES, NOT SCHOOLS TO BE ABOLISHED

Premier Whitney Explains His Statement as to Bilingual Friction.

Toronto, March 24. Sir James Whitney yesterday afternoon gave out the following statement with reference to the work of the session, and more particularly to the debate on G. H. Ferguson's bilingual resolution, which was disposed of Wednesday.

"The work of the session has been quite satisfactory, and some very necessary and desirable legislation has been done. All the bills have been done without any delay, and the House has not had to encounter the dangers that always attend heavy legislation. I regret to observe the statement made by the Mail and Empire this morning that the Government may abolish bilingual schools, and that the Government would abolish schools if conditions warranted such action, etc.

"This statement is untrue, and if uncontradicted will lead to the formation of entirely erroneous beliefs as to what took place. The resolution proposed by Mr. Ferguson, and adopted by the House, reads as follows:

"The English language shall be the language of instruction and of all communication with the public in the public and separate schools of the province except where, in the opinion of the department of education, it is impracticable by reason of the pupils' inability to understand English."

"When I stated with regard to the so-called bilingual schools, which, of course, are the schools working under the above statutory provision, that it was alleged that certain abuses had crept in, and that if the report of Mr. Merchant should be to the effect that those abuses had then such abuses would be abolished.

"It is satisfactory indeed to realize that every member of the Legislature adopted the view put forward by the Government resolution, and that as they are all in accord with the position of the Government, there will be no room for any of the friction over this question which some sensational people were ready to expect."

ACCIDENTS ON THE I. C. R.

Three Minor Wrecks With Passenger and Freight.

[Canadian Press.] St. John, N. S., March 23.—Three minor accidents are reported on the Intercolonial Railway today. On the Nova Scotia section a baggage car jumped the rails and derailed at the New Bedford station, N. S., this morning. The express from St. John struck the rear of a special freight, small damage resulting. The Maritime Express from Montreal is reported off the track at Dalhousie Junction.

ROBBERS FIGHT POLICE

Exciting Exchange of Revolver Shots in Ohio Town.

[Canadian Press.] Columbus, Ohio, March 23.—Following the robbery of the safe in the post office at Columbus, ten miles northeast of Columbus, last night, a fight took place between deputies and citizens led by Mayor Dawson, and the five robbers. Two of the thieves were wounded.

The robbers then took refuge in a barn, where they were surrounded and subjected to a heavy fire, which they returned. When the officers were ordered to make ammunition, the robbers made their escape in the darkness, taking the wounded men with them.

SOVEREIGN BANK CASE

Early Hearing of Appeal in Suit Against Directors.

[Canadian Press.] Toronto, March 23.—At the April sittings of the court of appeal the appeal will be heard in the suit brought by W. E. Stover, against the directors of that bank. The action was admitted at the trial by the Ontario High Court, but the directors were ordered to pay \$44,186, all legal costs on twenty-four promissory notes which were given for the bank's stock. The directors were ordered to pay the amount of the notes, and a purchase by the bank of the notes does not prevent a bank from profiting in its own stock, the consideration for the notes was illegal and the transaction void.

SHOT DOWN IN STREET

Italian Killed in a Crowded District of New York City.

[Canadian Press.] Denver, Col., March 23.—Antonio J. Puro, said to be an Italian, was shot and killed on a crowded street in the downtown district, last night. Philippe Droppola is under arrest charged with the murder.

Droppola is said to have declared Puro and had carried out a successful diamond robbery in Vancouver, but that Puro had taken his share of the proceeds and had betrayed him to the police.

Fingers found on Puro's body indicated that he had been employed on several Italian newspapers throughout the country.

A SHOPPING WEEK FOR THE CAPITAL

[Canadian Press.] Ottawa, March 23.—The Greater Ottawa Association, after a session of civic posters, formed last night, has just to this in getting down to business. It was announced today that a shopping week for Ottawa would be organized for the first week in May when the house show is in progress here. An effort will be made to attract visitors from all over Eastern Ontario.

TOM WILLIAMS DEAD.

New York, March 23.—Thomas T. Williams, a widely known newspaper business manager, died last night in his room in the Hotel Germania. His death resulted from a heavy stroke. Mr. Williams, who was 56 years old, had been connected in an executive capacity with the Hearst newspaper since the late Saturday. Hearst owned the San Francisco Examiner. In late years he had controlled a part of the Hearst business interests from the New York office.

DIES OF BURNS.

Montreal, March 23.—Lena Jones, who was badly burned last Friday while lighting a gas stove in the kitchen of the home of Mr. Carl E. Gidley, in the Roseville apartments, Westmount, died in the Western Hospital last night.

SNOW AT MONTREAL.

Montreal, March 23.—Not since 1876 has Montreal experienced such a snowfall at this time of the year as that which began early yesterday morning and continued without cessation until a late hour last night. Fully ten inches of snow fell and traffic was kept moving with great difficulty.

Trains are reported much behind schedule, but no serious delays are expected.

RATE CONFERENCE.

Berlin, March 23.—It is announced here that the trans-Atlantic shipping representatives who have been in conference at Cologne since Tuesday last have reached a friendly arrangement of the several disputed points now standing in the way of a renewed agreement of the Atlantic conference. The members of the conference probably will meet again during the summer.

FIRE AT DANBURY, CONN.

Twenty Thousand Dollar Damage Done a Five-Cent Store.

Danbury, Conn., March 23.—Fire, which broke out in the basement of a three-story building on Main street, occupied by the Woodworth five and ten-cent store, this morning destroyed that structure and did a damage estimated to equal to other buildings in the city. The fire, caused by a defective chimney, had spread to the second floor, but was soon extinguished in the buildings. When it started, the total loss estimated at \$20,000. The cause of the fire is not known.

U. S. TROOPS ATTACKED

Fired Upon by Mexicans for Stopping Passage of Provisions Over the Border.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, March 23.—The report of a shooting incident between United States troops, by Mexican forces, because the former stopped the exportation of provisions to Mexico, has excited the attention of the military officials here as to the possibility of the American authorities having exercised their authority in stopping the exportation of provisions to Mexico. The report holds that the shipment of provisions and other goods and animals to the border is in violation of the law of the United States.

No word has yet reached the State or War departments in regard to the reported firing upon United States troops along the border.

STABBED BY HATPIN.

Providence, R. I., March 23.—The crusade against the long hatpins ended a strong supporter today in Representative John B. Lecher, of Wood County, who, after having wounded by one of the "hat pins" a "dangerous weapon" announced that he would introduce a bill in the Legislature halting the length of these continue accessories.

While riding to the State House today, Representative Lecher was stabbed in the nose by a long hatpin protruding from the new spring headgear of a woman passenger. The steel prong sank deep into the legislator's nose and the blood flowed freely.

THE LONDON MARKET.

London, March 23.—American securities opened steady today. Light covering during the first hour advanced prices from one-quarter to seven-eighths over yesterday's New York closing.

ART IN THE UNITED STATES

Earl Barnes' Lecture Last Night in St. Andrew's Hall

THE INFLUENCE OF WAR

By the Revolution Art Suffered, But the United States Prospered From a Material Standpoint.

In "The Art of a Modern Democracy" Earl Barnes described last night in St. Andrew's Hall the history and development of art in the United States. As yet, he pointed out, there is no fixed type of American art, any more than there is a fixed type of American. The southern, the western, and the Yankee New Englander are all individual types. Not one of them can be called the American type. The American people are still in the "Melting Pot." Even the American desert is producing an art type of its own. The poets of the desert are producing a poetry of their own. Even Arizona is producing a distinct type of art. The United States consists of too large a tract for one distinctive art.

The Canadian People.

On the other hand, the Canadian people are a much more homogeneous type, in contrast with the exceedingly mixed type of the American people. An art type can be formed at present of the art type which America is about to produce.

In the colonial period there was no time for art. The arts proceeded out of excess energy and surplus capital. Again, the Protestant sects of the colonial period were not sympathetic with a love of the beautiful, with the arts of music, dancing and painting. The arts of the American Indians had an appreciable effect upon the art of American civilization.

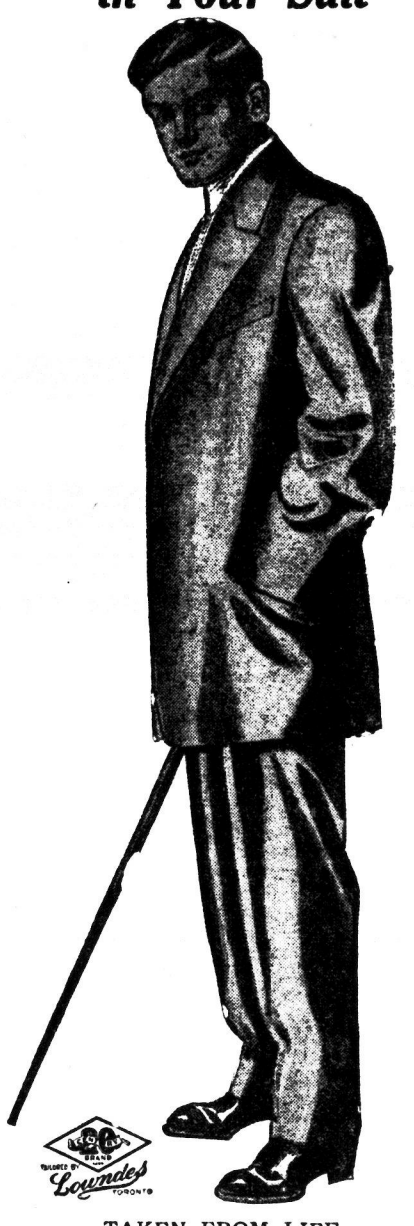
An early American portrait painter was Benjamin West. Born of Quaker ancestry, he was taken to Europe and became court painter to George III. Great artists have rarely been good patriots, from the national point of view, but West always maintained that he was an American patriot, although he accepted the patronage of the English king. John Colver, a New England portrait painter, also went to England.

Material Prosperity.

The revolution broke the all connection between Europe and the United States. Art suffered, but a wave of material prosperity followed.

Handling a carriage in front of a house, went about painting portraits at \$1 a piece. German influence largely affected American art in the early thirties. The Dusseldorf sentimental tendency was very marked.

Decorations of Buildings.

In the last few years the decoration of public buildings has been an important part of American art. The Pennsylvania railway station in New York, the Boston public library, the National Library in Washington, the State House in Harrisburg, and Trinity Church in Boston, are noted for their decorative paintings. La Farge, Sargent and Abbey have done good work of this kind.

Book and magazine illustrating is today a source of income for artists. In our magazines pictures are cheaper than printed matter, and printed matter is cheaper than plain paper.

"How shall we get the people like the United States," asked Professor Barnes, in closing, "and its voice? How shall its message be spoken in art? How shall we get the people to express this message? Where shall we get the leaders? How can we create a great body of people who care for art?"

Making Artists.

It is a mistake to endeavor to make artists of everyone. We must create a large, healthy public. Scranton, Pa., although one of the ugliest centres in America, is one of the musical centres of the United States, because it is largely inhabited by Welsh people who love music. We should provide beautiful pictures for our public schools. We should have children who love for art. In a generation we would produce people who would make our land fairly blossom with the arts.

CAMORRA WITNESS HELD TO BE MAD

Bandit's Defence To Be That Informer Is Insane.

MAY DIE FOR HIS STORY

State Claims To Have Certain Evidence That Prisoner Murdered Cuccolo.

[Canadian Press.]
Viterbo, Italy, March 24.—This was the day set for the interrogation of Genaro Abbatemaggio, the Camorra informant, about whose confession the state has built up the evidence upon which it is hoped to rid the country of the criminal organization that for years has exacted tribute from the rich and poor, robbing and murdering with practical impunity. In anticipation of witnessing what may cost him his life, great crowds gathered early in the vicinity of the court of assizes, and when the session opened the room was packed to its capacity.

The defence, so far as Abbatemaggio is concerned, will be that the man is insane, a theory strengthened by his own boldness. Professor Otto Benjamin, alienist from the University of Rome, has been retained to examine the informer, and as the professor was not in court during the morning hours Abbatemaggio's interrogations were deferred until the afternoon, and President Bianchi opened the proceedings with the examination of Genaro Abbatemaggio.

Cuccolo Was Defiant.
Belli is asserted to be the head of that branch of the Camorra which operates in the Vesuvian villages. He was one of the party that dined with Enrico Alfano on the night that Genaro Cuccolo and his wife were murdered. He refused to testify, but was released upon the false representations of the priest, Ciro Vitolo. According to Abbatemaggio, one of the Camorra leaders who was his informant, he is charged with having been of those who instigated the murder. This he denied today, and also denied that he had dined with the other leaders of the Camorra on the night in question. He said that the key Alfano and Giuseppe de

MEX. REBELS TAKE AWFUL REVENGE

Kill Federal General Who Had Woman Rebel Shot.

AND SHIP BODY TO DIAZ

Corpses Sent to the Capital Addressed to President and Clothed as Woman.

Denver, Col., March 24.—Murdered by knife wounds and nails driven into the skull the body of General Luque, a member of the personal staff of President Diaz, has been shipped in a packing box to Mexico City by Insurrectos to whom General Luque had been sent by Diaz as a peace agent. News of the assassination reached Denver today in a letter from a former Denver man now residing in Mexico.

According to the letter, General Luque, in whom Diaz had the greatest confidence, was sent from Mexico City to Chihuahua in December to investigate the conditions of the instruction in the north and attempt to pacify the rebels.

He reported his arrival at Chihuahua. Then the Mexican press suddenly ceased to refer to him, but it became known that he had been captured by the Insurrectos.

A few days ago a large packing case was delivered to the National Railroad at Chihuahua consigned to President Diaz at Mexico City. It was swarmed about the case, and there were other circumstances that excited suspicion. The railroad officials notified President Diaz of the coming of the case and the names of the men who were to deliver it. The case was opened in the presence of railroad officials and a heavy guard around.

In the case lay the corpse of Gen. Luque. About it was wrapped a woman's clothing, while a woman's hat was fastened to the skulls with nails. On a cord through which a knife had been driven into the body was inscribed:

"From the Insurrectos of Chihuahua to Porfirio, the tyrant. We send you our general who has received at our hands the same kind of treatment he gave our countrymen, Senora Cerda, of Puebla."

It is believed in Mexico City that Gen. Luque caused Senora Cerda to be murdered, she having been one of the more active Insurrectos in the vicinity of Ensenada and that her hat and clothing were those placed in the box in which the body of Gen. Luque was shipped to Diaz.

SANK TO HIS DEATH IN THE QUICKSANDS

Aged Man's Tragic End in the New Jersey Marshes.

[Canadian Press.]
Elizabeth, N. J., March 24.—His body covered by quagmire to a depth of several inches, which prevented discovery by searchers for the last sixteen days, the body of John Donnell, 67 years old, was found accidentally in the marshes by one of the police of the health department here. Indications are that the aged man died in great agony, while he was propped up by the quagmire, which grew firm in slowly until his body was out of sight. Sixteen days ago, Donnell left his home at a local factory and took a walk. He never got there. It is supposed that when he got some distance into the marshes he became bewildered, strayed from the narrow pathway through the marshes, and at last became lost in the barren stretch of land.

GREAT CLERICS FOR WORLD-PEACE MEETING

British-United States Arbitration Pact Movement To Be Supported by Mass Meetings.

[Canadian Press.]
New York, March 24.—A public mass meeting to support the general peace movement, and particularly to urge the ratification of the proposed arbitration treaty between Great Britain and the United States, is being arranged by Bishop Green of the Episcopal Diocese of New York, to take place in the new Cathedral of St. John the Divine soon after the completion of that edifice on April 19.

Canterbury Invited.
The meeting will be national in scope, and Bishop Green has written to the Archbishop of Canterbury, requesting him to be present, both at the convention exercises and the peace meeting. Other men of international note in the peace movement, including Andrew Carnegie, have expressed themselves heartily in favor of the proposed meeting.

The date of the meeting will be arranged after correspondence with England, where a similar meeting is to be held in Albany. It is believed that the efforts of the Archbishop of Canterbury in co-operation with the Free Churches, for the purpose of advancing the general peace movement and urging the ratification of the arbitration treaty proposed by Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign minister. The two meetings will be held on the same day, and probably at the same hour.

FANNY CROSBY'S BIRTHDAY.
Bridgeport, Conn., March 24.—Fanny J. Crosby, the blind poetess and hymn writer, today celebrated her 91st birthday at her home in this city. Miss Crosby, who is in excellent health, was the recipient of many congratulations.

West Lorne Local Option Inoperative

St. Thomas, March 23.—Judge Collier has decided that West Lorne local option is inoperative, following the judgment of the court of appeals, recently pronounced in the case of Ellis vs. the Town of Westlorne, in upholding a decision of Judge J. J. Donahue.

The applicants for the amendment of the bylaw were represented by C. St. Clair Letell, of St. Thomas, while the bylaw was defended by W. E. Ranney, K.C., of Toronto, the general counsel of the temperance interests.

G. T. R. Trainmen May All Be Back

Montreal, March 24.—Eight men appeared before Judge Barron, of Stratford, yesterday seeking reinstatement with the Grand Trunk. They were brought into the room one by one and allowed to state their grievances, but the inquiry was a strictly private one. Judge Barron stated that he had nothing to do with the reinstatement of the men, but would report direct to Mr. C. M. Hays on each case before him. He added, however, that the men fared pretty well and that the railway representatives showed a spirit of fairness and goodwill. The result was undoubtedly that the whole affair might now be considered to be practically settled though, he added, in reply to a question that he could not say that the men would be reinstated.

Manitoba Rejects the Boundary Offer

Winnipeg, March 23.—By a unanimous vote this afternoon, the Legislature accepted the resolution introduced by Premier Roblin, which is in effect a refusal of the offer of the Dominion government for a settlement of the Manitoba boundary question by annual cash payments in lieu of the public domain of \$200,000 rising to \$300,000. The resolution sets forth that Manitoba will be satisfied with nothing less than equal treatment with the other provinces. Either the public domain or financial consideration equal to those of Alberta and Saskatchewan.

THE WAR SECRETARY ELEVATED TO PEERAGE

Move Was Made in Order to Strengthen Government in the Lords—Lloyd George Not to Resign.

London, March 24.—King George yesterday created War Secretary Haldane a Viscount. The elevation of the secretary to the peerage has been anticipated as a move intended to strengthen the government in the House of Lords. J. B. Stokely, parliamentary secretary of the colonial office, has been appointed under secretary for war, and Lord Lances, parliamentary secretary of the war office, has been made under secretary of the colonies. This exchange of offices is subsequently the elevation of Secretary Haldane, which would place both representatives of the war office in the House of Lords, it being customary to have a representative of the chief government departments in each House.

The rumor that David Lloyd George would retire as chancellor of the exchequer, is now officially denied. Secretary Haldane's promotion is merely intended to relieve Lord Morley of the heavy task of leadership in the House of Lords during the Earl of Grey's absence.

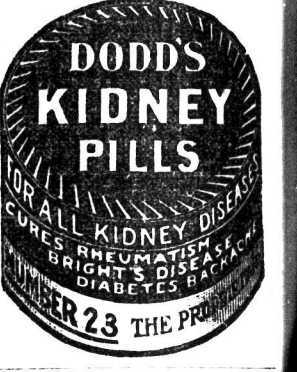
