Blaze Sweeps Warehouse in Heart of Greenwich Village.

STARTS WITH EXPLOSION

New York, July 18. - Working shrouded the building and were forced of the war. The only fact which can o use powerful searchlights.

The fire started with an explosion bout 8 a.m. Several more followed. By noon the casualty list stood at two dead, nearly 30 injured and three missing. The toll was taken chiefly from the ranks of the fire and police departments.

Mobilized around the burning structure, which covered most of the lock, bounded by Jane street, Greenwich street, 12th street and 8th avenue, on the lower West Side, was the greatest collection of apparatus which has turned out since the Equitable Building fire, and the veteran acting fire chief, "Smokey Joe" Martin, pronounced it one of the worst

OF U.S. TROOPS

President Harding Prepares To Take Measures To Break Strike.

DEATH LIST MAY BE 30 Welter.

Search Continues For Additional Victims of Cliftonville Fight.

WASHINGTON, July 17 .-- The president, it was said tonight, was prepared to direct the mine operators to reopen their mines at once under protection of federal troops, and with a United States flag planted at the entrance

The president has in mind, it was further reported, to pay, if necessary for a short time, a royalty on such coal as would be mined to meet the emergency, and a call for volunteer

The president today invited bituminous mine operators who notified him at the White House of their acceptance of his offer of arbitration in the coal strike, to "return to your mine properties and resume opera-
