The Winnipeg Boom.

A business man in Winnipeg, writ-

ing to a friend in this city, says: "I have been studying Winnipeg, and to my mind there is going to be Living and rentals have gone up to such a pitch that people are getting discouraged. The cheapest board is \$30 per month; any old frame house is from \$20 to \$40 monthly. A brick cottage or story and a half house renting in London for about \$15, brings \$50 here. Taxes are going up proportionately."

Testimony to the same effect comes from all quarters. The present rapid growth of the city is not artificial. Winnipeg is the gateway of the west, the buckle of the wheat belt. It must take toll of the abounding prosperity of the country around it. There is more or less speculative fever in every young and growing community, especially in the west where hopes are high, and in Winnipeg the necessity for housing a rapidly increasing population has created a legitimate demand for real estate. From all accounts, however, speculation is being dangerously overdone. Building lots miles from the center of the city are changing hands at values that strongly suggest wind and gas. In addition landlords have taken advantage of the pressure of population and the excess of the demand over the supply of dwellings and business premises, to raise rentals to an oppressive height. The people are being squeezed by high prices for everything. When the real estate boom comes to the end of its tether the effects may be very depressing. A deflation of values is long and painful process, of which Winnipeg has had one bitter experi-Plenty of Winnipeg people maintain that the boom is a healthy one, justified by the development and prospects of the west. No one can dispute that the city has a great future,

The report of the sub-committee o the Privy Council, advising the dismissal of Lord Dundonald, is a dignified recital of the facts of the case and lays down clearly the constitutional principles which govern it. The Lord Dundonald should have fallen in to so grave an error will be shared by all Canadians. They have admired his career and his soldierly qualities, and had begun to congratulate themselves upon having a commander at last who understood his relations with the civil power. Lord Dundonald has done good work, and has had the sympathetic co operation of the Minister of Militia. The Minister has not felt himself justified in asking Parliament to vote all the money (some \$13,000,000) required by the elaborate schemes of defense drawn up by the General, and in consequence there has been a note of impatience in some of Lord Dundonald's speeches. For this he has been criticised in Parliament, but Sir Frederick Borden has been his staunch apologist. For example, on April 24, 1903, Lord Dundonald made an address at Ham-

ilton, in which he used these words: "The militia, he was afraid, had had as their diet promises for a long time, instead of food; praise exuberant instead of wine. What was wanted was a little of that thirteen

If Sir Frederick Borden or the Government had been over-sensitive or not favorably disposed toward Lord Dundonald, they might have found an excuse in these words to reprimand his lordship. Mr. Bourassa declared in the House that Lord Dundonald had flouted his superiors in declaring publicly for a policy which the Government disayowed. Sir Frederick Borden chivalrously defended Lord Dundonald, saying that he agreed with him that the militia had had promises too long, and should have more performance. At the same time (May 5, 1903), the Minister defined the duties of the commander, and undertook to explain the causes of the friction that has so often occurred. His words are singularly apthe Minister:


