SMITH IS INSPECTOR

Board of Education Appoint Him I. P. S. for Chatham

County Appointment Temporary—City Appointment Permanent

J. H. Smith, the temporary appointee as inspector of rural schools in West Kent, who was appointed permanent Public School Inspector of the Chatham Public Schools, by the Board of Education at their regular meeting last night, on a motion made by Trustee Brackin and seconded by Trustee Morley.

The matter was brought up by Mr. Brackin, who moved that the Board proceed with the appointment of a Public School Inspector for the city. This motion was seconded by Mr. Morley.

Dr. Duncan—I understand that a resolution was passed at our last meeting that we consider this matter at a special meeting to be held for the purpose of appointing an Inspector, and I will move in amendment that we leave this matter over to be considered at our next meeting.

Dr. Duncan's motion was seconded by Mr. McLachlan.

Mr. Richards—What applications have we in for the position?

Dr. McKeough—Just two; those of Mr. Colles and Mr. Smith.

Mr. McKeough wanted to know if any benefit would be derived from leaving the matter over till another meeting.

Dr. Duncan said that there would be no objection in particular to making the appointment at once, only that several parties had expressed the desire that the matter be left in abeyance.

Mr. Richards, however, cited other good reasons why the matter should be left in abeyance. He drew attention to the fact that Mr. Smith was simply the temporary appointee of the Board of the County of Kent, and the Board has no assurance that the County Council at their next session might see fit to differ with the Warden and appoint another man. By leaving the matter over, other applications might be received, and a saving of salary would be made up till the time when the Board should appoint the permanent choice of the whole County Council.

Dr. McKeough remarked that the best excuse for leaving the matter over lay in the fact that the Board could economize in the matter of the Inspector's salary. The Board had been asked to economize as much as possible by the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the City Council, and as the appointment of the Inspector was not urgently needed, this had been the object of the members in leaving the matter in abeyance for the present.

Mr. Morley could not see how Mr. Smith would accept the temporary appointment of the Warden if he were not sure of getting a permanent appointment from the County Council.

Dr. McKeough—The point is this, if the present efficiency of the city schools is thoroughly up to the mark, I cannot see that it is urgently necessary that we should be in any rush to appoint an Inspector until the County makes a permanent choice. I cannot quite understand what the reason is for haste in making this appointment.

On being put to a vote, Mr. Brackin's motion carried and Dr. Duncan's amendment lost on a vote of four to three.

It was then moved by Mr. Brackin, seconded by Mr. Morley, that J. H. Smith be appointed permanent Public School Inspector for the city of Chatham at a salary of \$400 per annum, his duties to commence with October 1.—Carried.

Mr. McLachlan stated during the course of the discussion that Mr. Colles had asked him to withdraw his application.

Hon. R. F. Sutherland, Speaker of The House of Commons Delivers Instructive Address in First Presbyterian Church—Large Attendance

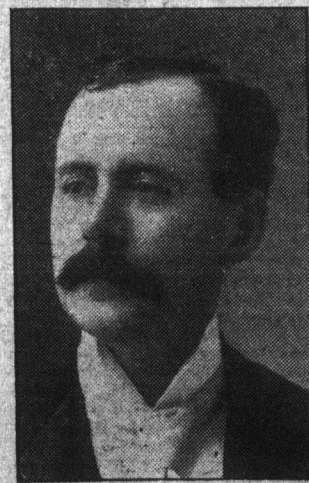
A POPULAR SALESMAN

THE RETAIL MERCHANTS

They Express their Opinion in Reference to Impurified Gas

May Hold a Banquet—A First of July Celebration in View

A meeting of Retail Merchants' Association was held last night in the Board of Trade rooms, and was very largely attended. That the association will have a successful season and interesting meetings are a certainty. A committee has been appointed to map out the program for the succeeding meetings.

When the meeting was called to order last night there were only three present, but before it had been concluded there was an assembly of fourteen. The minutes of the meeting held in May were read and signed. The following accounts were read and ordered to be paid.—Daily News, \$1.25, and Secretary W. A. Winterstein, for postage, etc., \$6.25.

The gas question, which was to have been discussed, was dealt with very leniently, as The Planet had made mention of the fact that purified gas would be turned on to-day. It was decided that in case the Gas Company fail to purify the gas served to the citizens of Chatham before Oct. 10th next, the secretary forward them a copy of the following resolution:

That the Retail Merchants' Association of the city of Chatham, view with alarm the numerous delays in installing gas purifiers, and respectfully ask that all possible speed be made in their installation, and respectfully demand that the Board of Health take immediate action.

The credit list was read and revised. Several names were taken off and others were put on. The resolution "That no member of the Association shall advertise on any printed card or program, nor permit his or their firm name to appear on any subscription list for charitable institutions," was read, and the following was added to it: "Nor purchase tickets for concerts, raffles, socials or excursions."

The financial statement of the Provincial organization was read, and it was found that there had been 142 organizations with a membership of 5,233.

The question of making the meetings of the association a success was thoroughly discussed. A committee, composed of Messrs. Poile, Westman and Winterstein, was appointed to arrange a program for the next meeting, and it is their intention to bring up some subject of interest and also to get a speaker to give a talk on some topic of interest to the merchants. President George W. Cowan brought up the subject of having an annual banquet and that it take place in December. A supper should be served and a good program given. This idea was endorsed by everyone present, and it is quite likely that it will be carried out. Mr. Westman stated that it was necessary for the association to discuss something of interest in order to get the merchants to attend. He also brought up the subject of holding a demonstration on the 1st of July, and that it should be up to the retail merchants to make it a success, and in this way keep the people of Chatham at home on the holiday. This should be the day for the merchants to make a demonstration, and it is their intention to bring something worth while to the city of Chatham.

THE QUEBEC BRIDGE.

The Commission of Inquiry into the Quebec bridge disaster held sittings last week at Ottawa. Chief Engineer Schreiber, and Bridge Engineer Douglas, of the Railway Department, testified that the Government officers did not supervise or inspect the superstructure of this bridge while under construction. Mr. Douglas said that he examined the plans but only as he supposed for the purpose of the tenders. Everything was left to the officers and advisors of the bridge company. The Government bridge expert, says now that he had suspicions before the accident respecting the chord which seems to have been defective. But he was not asked to express an opinion, and when he objected to the consulting engineer's plan, he was overruled. This shows a remarkable want of vigilance on the part of the Government, seeing that the company which was allowed a free hand had not invested a quarter of a million on the enterprise while the Government was assuming a liability of seven to ten millions. The Statute clearly required Government approval of the plans and departmental inspection of the work.

Within a few months we have had the collapse of the lift lock structure on the Trent Canal, the fall of the Laurier tower at Ottawa, and the Quebec bridge catastrophe, all in public works supposed to be under supervision of Government officers, all built according to plans approved of by the Government, and all paid for by the people of Canada.

THE LOCAL CONDITIONS

Mr. Alex. Gregory Reports to Gazette on Trades and Labor

Everyone is Busy—There is a Big Scarcity of Help

Mr. Alex. Gregory, correspondent for Chatham and district for the Labor Gazette, sends the following report on local conditions for the month of September:

Labor conditions were fully as active as during the previous month, and very few were looking for work. A large number of immigrants arrived; those that wished to work had no trouble in finding employment; the only difficulty experienced being that of securing suitable accommodation. A large number of building permits were issued, and although none of them were for large amounts, they were well distributed amongst the different contractors, thereby giving work to a large number of mechanics and laborers. The Chatham, Windsor and Lake Erie Electric Railway Company has its rails laid to the city, but so far has not been able to arrive at a satisfactory understanding with the Canadian Pacific or Grand Trunk Railway Companies with reference to crossings. There have been no changes in rates of wages.

CONDITION OF LOCAL INDUSTRIES.

Agriculture—The hay crop was somewhat light, and potatoes will be scarce, owing to the continued dry weather. Prices are expected to be very high, unless shippers import them.

Railroad Construction and Employment—The Grand Trunk Railway Company is busy raising the roadbed of its line through the City.

TRADES.

Building—Bricklayers, plasterers, carpenters and joiners have been very busy. Painters had a large amount of work under contract. Builders' laborers reported no time lost.

Mechanics, Engineering and Shipbuilding—Moulders reported trade good. Machinists were busy, some working overtime. Electrical workers were very busy, owing largely to many of the residents taking advantage of the reduced cost of placing electric lights in their homes before September 15, after which date the prices will be increased. The electricians reported trade somewhat slack.

Woodworking and Finishing—Carriage body builders, and cutter makers are very busy.

Printing—Printers reported busy conditions, with some scarcity of help. Pressmen had steady employment.

Clothing—Tailors reported employment less active than during the corresponding period of 1906.

Food and Tobacco Preparation—Bakers and confectioners were busy. Butchers reported country trade very brisk. Cigar makers reported trade fair.

Miscellaneous—Barbers experienced active conditions, notwithstanding the recent increase in the rates.

Transport—The Grand Trunk Railway Company's trackmen were busy raising the company's roadbed. Teamsters and expressmen were busy.

Unskilled—This class was fully employed, many having engaged with farmers.

DISTRICT NOTES.

Dresden—On August 2nd a by-law for the building of a new school and the laying of new street pavements, was defeated. There have been no new developments in the old district. Very little building of any kind has been constructed throughout the district.

The guests were not numerous, but select, and the presents were both beautiful and useful. A most enjoyable time was spent. In the evening the majority of the guests drove with the happy pair to the station, from which, amid showers of rice and good wishes, they took their departure for their future home in Bay City.

DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

Jury Returns Verdict in Matter of George Fry's Death

Elevator Was In Good Working Order—Unfortunate Case

We, the jurors, are of opinion that George Henry Fry came to his death through accident, and from the evidence produced, no blame can be attached to anyone. We believe from the evidence produced and from our view of the place where the accident occurred, that the elevator is in good working order and elevator shaft properly protected.

The following was the Coroner's jury, over which Dr. R. V. Bray presided: John Carpenter, Robert Coyle, J. W. Dyer, Thomas Lally, R. McNaughton, Alfred Glenn, Walter Lethbridge, George Jamieson, Alf. Stone, J. W. Webb, H. Fisher, P. H. Briscoe and O. Dolson.

The inquest was held yesterday morning in the undertaking rooms of Jahnke & Hinnegan. The evidence by each witness given was practically the same in each case. Dr. H. J. Sullivan, who was called to the scene of the accident, stated that he received a call from the Blonde mill at about 1:50 o'clock, and quickly responded to the same. On arriving on the scene he found the body of the deceased lying on the floor of the elevator. He made a hurried examination and found that the heart was still beating, but very slowly. It continued to beat for a minute and a half after his arrival. He further stated that he found a large scalp wound on the back of the head, several ribs in the right side fractured, and the right chest severely crushed. The crush in the chest was sufficient to cause death.

Bonnie Hildebrand said that the elevator gates were closed by the Factory Inspector and the shaft was guarded by the rules laid down by the Inspector. The elevator was in good working order and there is no reason why the deceased should not have perfect control of the elevator while in it. He also said that he didn't expect man to use the elevator except for freight purposes.

Deceased was ten feet from the cable which he should have used for its control. Fry had been in the employ of the Blonde factory for some years and was considered a sober and industrious workman. Ralph Consens, the man who heard the screams of the deceased, gave short evidence. He stopped the elevator and lowered it. The body of deceased was crushed up between the side of the elevator and the ceiling in the second floor.

The funeral will take place to-day from the Baptist church, Wallaceburg, at 2:30 o'clock. The remains were taken to the "Borg" yesterday morning. Rev. W. G. Matthews and Rev. Mr. Guntz will conduct the ceremony. The funeral will be under the direction of the Sydenham Valley Lodge of the I. O. O. F.

APPEAL TO THE MIKADO.

Restriction of Passports Must Be Adhered To.

Ottawa, Oct. 1.—A complete statement of Canada's argument against a continuation of the present large influx of Japanese immigrants into this country is being prepared by the Government for presentation to the Government of Japan.

No doubt a commission or commissioner will present the argument to the Mikado's Government at Tokyo. It will be pointed out in this statement that when the treaty with Japan was signed by Canada there was an express understanding that the Japanese law restricting the issue of passports to intending emigrants to a limited number each year would continue to be enforced.

In the Japanese immigration law it is expressed that any immigrant obtaining a passport under false representation is liable to a heavy fine in addition to the cancellation of the passport. The enforcement of this clause by Japan would have a large influence in stopping the influx of Japanese to British Columbia by way of the Hawaiian Islands.

Other points that will be emphasized are that public opinion in this country, as shown by the utterances of public men in the press, and by the resolutions of the Labor Minister, is unanimously opposed to any large or sudden influx of Oriental immigration, and that the present rate of immigration, if continued, will result in unnecessary racial friction in British Columbia, and will militate against the development of trade between Canada and Japan as desired by both Governments.

FOUGHT WITH SWORDS.

Affair of Honor in Old Style Excites French Colony.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 1.—Contrary to expectations the duel between Dr. Dupuy and Dr. Miquelon, which was fought in the rink at the Hotel Miquelon.

It was believed that the differences had been settled in court, but the opposing factions clamored for satisfaction in the ancient French style and the two men, who were a law-abiding citizen and a Frenchman, gathered in the rink. Swords were chosen as the weapons. After ten minutes of fierce fighting the editor received a bad thrust of the sword in the right breast. His second, Dr. Thibault, seeing the condition of his friend's wound, declared Miquelon unable to continue the fight.

The duel was the result of an article in The Revel, questioning the honor of Dr. and Mrs. Dupuy.

It is reported that Miquelon was compelled to accept another challenge to a duel from Leclerc, a prominent shipowner of St. Pierre.

GRAIN SHIPMENTS.

Show Big Falling Off as Compared With Last Year.

Ottawa, Oct. 1.—The Department of Trade and Commerce has received from Mr. C. C. C. of Winnipeg, a statement of the shipments of grain by vessels from Port William and Port Arthur from the opening of navigation, April 23, 1907, to Aug. 31, 1907, and also for the crop year of 1906, which is from Sept. 1, 1906, to Aug. 31, 1907.

From April 23 to Aug. 31 last, there was carried in Canadian vessels from these ports 20,721,617 bushels, and in foreign vessels 5,238,069 bushels, making a total of 25,959,686 bushels of wheat.

For the crop year 1906, Canadian vessels carried 51,719,952 bushels. There was in store on Aug. 31, 1906, 507,574 bushels, and on Aug. 31, 1907, 6,460,919 bushels, an increase of 5,953,345 bushels of wheat.

Grampian Breaks the Record. Montreal, Oct. 1.—Having broken the record from Glasgow to Quebec and Montreal, the new Allan liner Grampian arrived last night in charge of Capt. Outram, the only Canadian in charge of an Allan steamship.

The Grampian is a 10,000-ton ship, part of the Corsican, which has made three trips to the St. Lawrence. She left Glasgow a week ago Saturday at 6 p. m. and reached Quebec Sunday afternoon at 2.30, making the voyage under eight days.

The new vessel has accommodation for 125 first-class, 232 second and 1,493 steerage passengers. These with a crew of 210 would make 2,068 souls on board. Her cargo carrying capacity is 7,000 tons.

Gave Life to Save Wife. Rome, N. Y., Oct. 1.—Mr. and Mrs. William S. S. of New London, eight miles west of here, were drowned in the Erie Canal yesterday. A man fishing some distance away saw the woman run out of the house near the canal and jump in. She was immediately followed by her husband, who attempted to rescue her, but failed.

A Customs Record. Ottawa, Oct. 1.—The customs receipts of the Dominion for the first months since March amounted to \$2,402,785, which is an increase of \$6,418,290 over last year. The revenue for September alone was \$5,203,633, an increase of \$546,225, and far and away the best showing on record.

Two Killed in Wreck. St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 1.—The fast train on the Frisco road known as the Meteor, due in St. Louis at 11.30 a. m., was derailed and wrecked near Dixon yesterday morning. Two employees were killed, one seriously injured, and the passengers were badly bruised.

Judge to Resign. Quebec, Oct. 1.—Hon. Judge Larue, who has graced the Quebec judiciary during the past 21 years, will shortly resign owing to ill-health.

Germany Uneasy. London, Oct. 1.—Great uneasiness prevails in German commercial circles at the prospect of a preference to Britain by Australia.

Horse's Kicks Fatal. Smith's Falls, Oct. 1.—Edward Lamb, hostler of the Union Hotel, died on Saturday from kicks by a horse.

MOTION IS RESCINDED

Board of Education Decide to Retain Kindergarten Teachers

Staff will Remain as announced in the Former Draft

The Board of Education at their meeting last night rescinded the motion carried at a previous session by which the kindergarten staffs of the Public Schools was to be cut down.

Mr. McGeehan stated that he had learned that it was impossible for the kindergartens to carry on their work properly with the proposed reduction to the staffs. There had been a decided increase in attendance at the kindergartens, and this had made the task of the teachers all the more difficult. His committee advised that the former motion be rescinded, and that the staffs be as formerly drafted up—one directress and one assistant.

Mr. McLachlan stated that he had since learned that the staffs were crippled in their work, and when the matter was formerly brought up he had not thoroughly understood all the points. He was now, in fact, drafting up, and he moved, seconded by Mr. Richards, that the staffs be left as per the former draft—one directress and one assistant.—Carried.

Mr. Brackin called for the yeas and nays, which were as follows: Yeas—Duncan, McGeehan, McLachlan, Richards, Somerville, McKeough—6.

Nays—Brackin and Morley—2.

It was moved by Mr. McGeehan, seconded by Dr. Duncan, that Miss Jean Angus be appointed a temporary teacher at Central School.—Carried.

Mr. Morley stated that the fence at the Collegiate Institute had been sold for \$15, and that its removal much improved the appearance of the property. The man who had taken it away—Geo. Bartlett—however, had neglected to fill in the post holes as per agreement. This would be attended to, however, by the committee. He moved that the Property committee be empowered to purchase seed for the lawn and have the holes filled in with earth.—Carried.

Mr. Morley also reported that he had instructed Park Bros. to install new grates in the furnaces at the C. C. I., and had sold the old grates as scrap iron. This action was ratified by the Board.

It was moved by Mr. McGeehan, seconded by Mr. Richards, that four more typewriters be rented for the C. C. I.—Carried.

Mr. Morley moved, seconded by Mr. Brackin, that a grant of \$10 be made to the C. C. I. for the purpose of advertising sports at that institution.—Carried.

Will Park wrote on behalf of the family of the late Inspector Robert Park, thanking the members of the Board for their many kindnesses during the recent bereavement of that family.—Received.

Canadian Clergy Swindled.

New York, Oct. 2.—Israel Salniko, a young Russian Jew, pretending conversion to Christianity and missionary worker to proselyte the Jews from Judaism for the Christian Church, was exposed by Dr. Daniel H. Overton, pastor of the Greene Avenue Presbyterian Church, Brooklyn, and Rev. Hickman Denning, rector of Trinity Cathedral, Cleveland, last week, as being a rank fraud and swindler, having victimized clergymen and congregationalists, Catholics and Protestants, out of many thousands of dollars in Boston, Montreal, Cleveland and other cities, including Toronto, by begging contributions and taking up church collections.

Finding the police here after him he skipped out. From papers found in abandoned luggage he swindled clergymen and congregations in Toronto out of nearly nine hundred dollars.

Intercolonial Wins.

Montreal, Oct. 2.—The arbitrators appointed to settle the differences between the Grand Trunk and Intercolonial Railroads regarding running rights to the latter over the Grand Trunk from St. Roch Junction, have announced their award.

The Intercolonial claimed that traffic originating on the Grand Trunk System west of Montreal destined for points on the Intercolonial was being forwarded elsewhere than via Montreal.

The award upholds the contentions of the Intercolonial and holds that the Grand Trunk committed a breach of contract, and an accounting has been tendered to ascertain the damage.

more enthusiasm into the work of the church, but it will include in its program much of the work at present done in other cities by Canadian Clubs and Y. M. C. A's. So it will be seen that it is working in a worthy cause, and should receive support and encouragement.

Hon. R. F. Sutherland, Speaker of the House of Commons, was the speaker last evening, and he gave an eloquent, interesting and highly instructive address. Mr. Sutherland is a natural orator of seemingly unlimited ability. His address showed that he is a man of deep thought, which he has the ability of applying in a most practical way. The choice of a speaker for the first meeting could not have been more fortunate.

Mr. Sutherland's subject was, "Church and State," and the theme which ran through his entire speech was man's responsibility to the church and to the state. He introduced this thought early in his address by lauding the formation of the association which he was addressing, and pointing out the responsibilities which rest upon every man in the congregation in making the present undertaking successful.

He had no use for the shriller, if every man in the audience would only perform his part, the effect upon the work of the church would be marvellous.

He then went on to point out what the Presbyterian Church stands for—Education, Liberty, Tolerance, Moderation and Unity.

In reference to the second of these he said there never was a time when the church should be more liberal than the present. Money and workers are badly needed in the Great Northwest, and liberality in spreading the gospel through this country means of great deal in the building up of Canada.

In reference to Unity, he compared the church to the state, and went on to illustrate in a most eloquent manner how that the one principle of Unity brought about the present happy conditions which exist in the confederation of the Dominion of Canada. Branching off for a moment on to matters of public interest, he repeated the words of a well known writer, that in order to establish a nation three things are necessary—a fertile soil, busy workers and easy transportation. Canada at the present time has all three of these, and what is now needed is capital and population, to continue the growth and prosperity. The church should, in reference to the immigration question, bring these new-comers under the very best influences if Canada is to attain to her highest mark.

In speaking of the duties of the Men's Association he gave some very valuable words of advice. One of the most effective duties, if properly carried out, is the encouragement of the pastor. Those who indulge in criticism in many cases, he said, are those who are the least practical workers. Criticism, when it is honest, is right and useful, but indiscriminate criticism should be discouraged and eliminated from every feature of private and public life. Many a useful man has been forced out of city councils through unreasonable criticism which is not reasonable, fair and just, is to be commended, but unjust criticism should be abandoned.

The speaker then spoke of the musical side of the services, encouraging the men present to put forth every effort and reasonable expense to uphold the hands of the pastor by providing the church with the best procurable music. Music is not only beautiful and pleasant, but it also has a practical side in church work. The social side was also referred to, and the speaker closed his remarks with a last appeal for the men to provide their church with and to perform their part with energy and enthusiasm.

At the conclusion of the address a vote of thanks was passed to the speaker, and Mr. F. D. Laurie and Mr. Geo. Wanda gave short addresses on different departments which had been added to the scope of the work of the Association. During the evening solos were rendered by J. W. Wilson and R. W. Angus. Frank Phelps acted as accompanist, and also played for the different hymns which were sung.

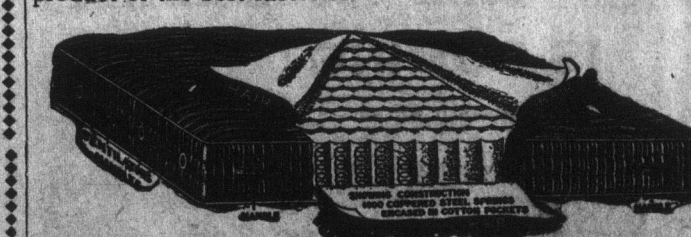

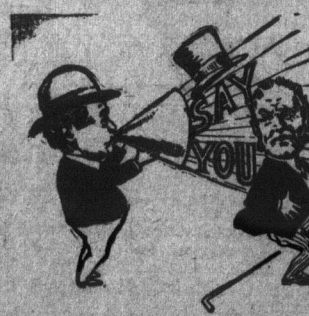

ART OF SWEEPING.

There is a Wrong Way and There's a Right Way to Do This Work.

Every one does not know how to sweep a room.

It requires skill, combined with patience, to clean a room properly.

The chief mistake made by a novice is to think she can hurry through it and to think the room will be clean if she takes long, heavy strokes with her broom.

Short, light strokes which are firm will do the work as it should be done.

It is always best to sweep a heavy Brussels carpet or one of similar make once with the grain, then once across it, going over each three or four yards in this way until the entire carpet is swept.

When a carpet is old and evenly worn this is hardly necessary, but if it is new or has any perceptible ridges this method should surely be followed.

After going over a room thoroughly allow the dust to settle, and in ten or fifteen minutes give it a final brushing, sweeping it lightly, and nothing is more satisfactory than a sweeper or dampened broom.

Tea leaves scattered over the carpet are good. They should be squeezed as dry as possible and sprinkled over the carpet before the final sweep.

Another good plan is to sprinkle the floor before starting to sweep with dry table salt. The salt seems to brighten the colors of a faded carpet as well as to aid in removing dust.

When the second sweeping is over use a whisk broom in the corners and around the edges. After the walls are dusted and the carpet clean it is well to wipe off the surface of the carpet with a cloth dipped in salt and water which has been wrung out as dry as possible. The cloth used for the purpose must be frequently rinsed in fresh water and then dipped into the salted water again and wrung out as before. Then, some folks like to go over the carpet with ammonia water, but I prefer the salt, as salt keeps out moths.

It is needless to say that in sweeping as thoroughly as this every article which is movable should be removed first or dusted and carefully covered with old sheets. When buying heavy pieces of furniture be sure to select those that have good, easily moved casters, so that they may be pushed behind and the dust be kept from behind and from underneath them.

It is a great mistake to neglect sweeping as thoroughly as this every two weeks. If you do, the dust becomes ground into a carpet and helps it to wear out. Besides, dust discolors more than or quite as much as wear.

Fortunately many houses of today are built with hardwood floors, so the burden of sweeping is greatly lessened, as rugs are lifted, shaken or beaten out of doors. Hardwood floors, if swept with a hair brush instead of a broom, then rubbed with a little oil or simply polished with a waxing brush, can be kept in good condition with comparatively little labor.

HINTS FOR THE HAIR.

When there is dryness of the scalp the application of warm olive oil to the head prior to washing is recommended. If possible this should be done twenty-four hours before the hair is shampooed, the oil being both rubbed into the scalp and also allowed to saturate the roots. This has the effect of strengthening it, and in the case of weak and falling hair it will do much to prevent the distressing loss which is so often the effect of shampooing.

The yolk of an egg as a hair wash is an old and tried specific, but many women nowadays believe in adding to it the juice of a lemon, while as many days I would have and suffer great distress in my throat.
