Dr. Duncan said that there would be no objection in particular to making the appointment at once, only that several parties had expressed the desire that the matter be left in abeyance.

Mr. Richards, however, cited other good reasons why the matter should be left in abeyance. He drew attention to the fact that Mr. Smith was simply the temporary appointee of the Warden of the County of Kent, and the Board had no assurance, that the County Council at their next assesses might see fit to differ with the Warden and appoint another man. By leaving the matter over, other applications might be received, and a saving of salary would be made up till the time when the Board should appoint the permanent choice of the whole County Council.

Dr. McKeough remarked that the best excuse for leaving the matter over lay in the fact that the Board could economize in the matter of the Inspector's salary. The Board had

over lay in the fact that the Board could economize in the matter of the Inspector's salary. The Board had been asked to economize as much as possible by the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the City Council, and as the appointment of the Inspector was not urgently needed, this had been the object of the members in leaving the matter in abeyance for the present.

Mr. Morley could not see how Mr. Smith would accept the temporary appointment of the Warden if he were not sure of getting a permanent appointment from the County Council.

Dr. McKeough—The point is this, if the present efficiency of the city schools is thoroughly up to the mark, I cannot see that it is urgently necessary that we should be in any rush to appoint an Inspector until the County makes a permanent choice. I cannot quite understand what the reason is for haste in making this appointment.

On being put to a vote, Mr. Brackin's motion carried and Dr. Duncan's amendment lost on a vote of four to three.

It was then moved by Mr. Brackin, seconded by Mr. Morley, that J. H. Smith be appointed parmanent Public School Inspector for the city of Chatham at a salary of \$400 per annum, his duties to commence with October 1.—Carried.

Mr. McLachlan stated during the course of the discussion that Mr. Colles had asked him to withdraw his application.

The Commission of Inquiry into the Quebec bridge disaster held sittings last week at Ottawa. Chief Engineer Schreiber, and Bridge Engineer Douglas, of the Railway Department testified that the Government officers did not supervise or inspect the superstructure of this bridge while under construction. Mr Douglas said that he examined the plans but only as he supposed for the pur pose of the tenders. Everything was left to the efficers and advisors of the bridge company. The Givernment bridge expert, says now that he had suspicions before the accident respecting the chord which seems to have been defective. But he was not asked to express an opinion, and when he objected to the consulting engineer's plan, he was overruled. This shows a remarkable want of vigilance on the part of the Government, seeing that the company which was allowed a free hand had not invested a quarter of a million on the enterprise while the Government was assuming a liability of seven

Within a few months we have had the collapse of the lift lock structure on the Trent Canal, the fall of the Laurier tower at Ottawa, and the Quebec bridge catastrophe, all in public works supposed to be under supervision of Government officers, all built according to plans approved of by the Government, and all paid for by the people of Canada.

Everyone is Busy-There is a Big Scarcity of Help

Mr. Alex. Gregorg, correspondent for Chatham and district for the Labor Gazette, sends the following report on local conditions for the month of September:

Labor conditions were fully as active as during the previous month, and very few were looking for work. A large number of immigrants arrived; those that wished to work had no trouble in finding employment; the only difficulty experienced being that of securing suitable accommodation. DEATH WAS **ACCIDENTAL**

Jury Returns Verdict in Matter of George Fry's Death

Elevator- Was In Good Working Order-Unfortunate Case

We, the jurers, are of opinion that George Henry Frye came to his death through accident, and from the evi-dence produced, no blame can be attached to anyone. We believe from the evidence produced and from our view of the place where the acci-dent occurred, that the elevator is in good working order and elevator

dent occurred, that the elevator is in good working order and elevator shart properly protected.

The following was the Coroner's jury, over which Dr. R. V. Bray presided: John Carpenter, Rebert Coyle, J. W. Dyer, Thomas Lafley, R. McNaugnton, Alfred Gienn, Waiter Lethbridge, George Jamieson, Alf. Stone, J. W. Webb, H. Fisher, F. H. Brisso and O. Dolsen.

The inquest was held yesterday morning in the undertaking rooms of Jahnke & Hinnegan. The evidence by each witness given was practically the same in each case, Dr. H. J. Sullivan, who was called to the scene of the accident, stated that he received a call from the Blonde mill at about 1.50 o'clock, and quickly responded to the same. On arriving on the scene he found the body of the decased lying on the floor of the elevator. He made a hurried examination and found that the heart was still beating, but very slowly. It continued to beat for a minute and a half after his very slowly. It continued to beat for a minute and a half after his arrival. He further stated that be found a large scalp wound on the back of the head, several ribs in the right side fractured, and the right chest severely crushed. The crush in the chest was sufficient to cause

death. death,

Benjamin Blonde said that the elevator gates were ordered by the Factory Inspector and the shaft was guarded by the rules laid down by the Inspector. The elevator was in good working order and there is no reason why the deceased should not have perfect control of the elevator while in it. He also said that he didn't expect men to use the elevator except for freight purposes. Deceased was ten feet from the cable which he should have used for its control. Frye had been in the em-ploy of the Blonde factory for some years and was considered a sober and industrious workman. Raiph Cousens, the men who heard the screams of the deceased, gave short evidence. He stopped the elevator and lowered it. The body of discus-ed was crushed up between the side of the elevator and the ceiling in

the second floor.



Restriction of Passports Must Be
Adhered Te.
Ottawa, Oct. 1.—A complete statement of Canada's argument against a continuation of the present large influx of Japanese immigrants into this country is being prepared by the Government for presentation to the Government of Japan.

No doubt a commission or commissioner will present the argument to the Mitado's Government at Tokio. It will be pointed out in this statement that when the treaty with Japan was signed by Canada there was an express understanding that the Japanese law restricting the issue of passports to intending emigrants to a limited number each year would continue to be enforced.

In the Japanese emigration laws it is expressly stated that any emigrant obtaming a passport under false representation is liable to a heavy fine in addition to the cancellation of the passport. The enforcement of this clause by Japan would have a large influence in stopping the influx of Japanese to British Columbia by way of the Hawaiian Islands.

Other points that will be emphasis-ed are that public opinion in this country, as shown by the utterances of public men in the press, and by the resolutions of the Labor Minister, if unanimously opposed to any large or sudden influx of Oriental immigra-tion, and that the present rate of im-migration, if continued, will result in unnecessary racial friction in British unnecessary racial friction in British Columbia, and will militate against the development of trade between Can-ada and Japan as desired by both





THE BLACK SCOURGE

That Fearful and Mystic Visitation of Olden Days.

IT FOLLOWED IN WAR'S WAKE.

In the Fourteenth Century It Swept the Whole of Europe, Killing 25,000,000 Three Years-The Pestilence In

The plague or pestilence, that mysterious and fearful visitation which has moved its hosts in the wake of armies to slay more than war itself, is supposed to have first originated among the dense masses of people who crowded together in the great cities of Asia and Egypt or who formed the encampments of Xerxes, Cyrus and Tamer ments of Xerres, Cyrus and Tamer-lane the Tartar. It probably sprang from the impurity which must have existed in the midst of such vast gath-erings and in part also from leaving the unburied dead upon the field of battle. At any rate, the germs of this fearful human poison have always been most active where conditions similar to those have prevailed. It similar to those have prevailed. It has always been war and the march of armies that have spread it broadcast over the world from time to time, and as war became less frequent and less worldwide the frequency and extent of these ravages have lessened also. The first recorded outbreak of the

plague in Europe occurred in the sixteenth century. It came from lower Egypt. This was the first lapping of the wave that reached into the east gain, there to stay its movemen far as the west was concerned, until 544 A. D., when the returning legions of the Emperor Justinian brought it again into the western world from the battlefields of Persia. Constantinople was the first place it attacked. Here in a single day as many as 10,000 persons are said to have fallen victims to it. But the plague did not stop with Constantinople. It had found a too congenial soil in Europe, which was little else than one great battlefield at the time. It was carried into Gaul, where it followed close in the wake of the Frankish armies, and from Gaut it moved into Italy, with the Lom-bards, and so devastated the country as to leave it entirely at the mercy of the invaders.

The various crusades, which extend-ed over a space of about 200 years, no doubt did much to hold the pestilence in Europe, for they served to keep open the channels of intercourse between the east and the west. Period epidemics were common during their continuance, and these seem to have culminated in the fourteenth century with what is known in history as the black death. The black death was more fatal to human life than any other single cause since the world be gan. The havec of war was nothing in comparison to it. It swept the whole of Europe, leaving in its path such misery and destitution as the world had never known. It killed in three years some 25,000,000 people. Such figures stagger the comprehension, but the records of the time cannot, but the records of the time cannot be doubted. The entire population of Europe is estimated to have been about 100,000,000, kept down as it was by the constant warfare, and of these at least a fourth perished.

at least a fourth perished.

The ravages of the plague in Italy, where it came in the track of the war of the Guelphs and Ghibellines, was particularly disastrous to mankind. It raged with terrible fury in Naples, where 60,000 persons are said to have died. It fell upon Pisa, and seven out of every ten perished. It utterly and forever destroyed the prosperity of Siena. Florence also suffered severely, while 100,000 of the inhabitants of while 100,000 of the inhabitants of n's a puzzle; she keeps Venice were literally wiped off the face of the earth. From Italy it D into France, where the mortality was almost as great. In Paris alone 50,000 people died from it. One of the worst features presented by the history of the black death was the cruel persecuthe black death was the cruei persecu-tion it aroused against the Jews. They were supposed to have infected the air in some mysterious manner, and they were accused of having poisoned the wells and springs. In Strassburg 2,000 of them were buried alive in their own burial ground.

The order of the Flagellanto arose at this time, coming from the belief that the sins of the world had at last that the sins of the world had at last brought down the wrath of heaven. It was the beginning of the so called hundred years' war that carried the black death into England, where in London its victims numbered 100,000. When at last the plague had worked its ravages it doubled back over its course to disappear in the east. Later on it appeared again in England, first among the soldiers of Richmond after the battle of Bosworth Field, and when the victorious army marched to London the plague went with them and when the victorious army marched to London the plague went with them to work its havor there. As long as it lasted the mortality was as great as that caused by the black death half a century before. Five thousand people died in five weeks, and then the plague left London as suddenly as it had appeared there to sweep over the rest of England.

In Scotland the plague of 1568 came immediately after the battle of Langside, when Queen Mary was dethroned, but no records of the mortality it occasioned seem to have been preserved. The plague visited London in 1675. This followed after the civil war which ended with the death of Charles II, but so many years intervened that it is impossible to trace any connection between the two events. In modern it is impossible to trace any connection between the two events. In modern wars danger from the plague seems gradually to have lessened perlups as a result of better sanitary conditions maintained by the armies of today.

Why Elephants Fear Mice.
It seems incredible that so small a harmless an animal as a mouse to frighten an elephant almost out of his senses. One little mouse in thay on which they are feeding will stampede an entire herd. In their native land there are little animals, known as chacanas, which feed on a small, sour berry of which elephants are very fond. ART OF SWEEPING.

There is a Wrong Way and There's Right Way to Do This Work. Every one does not know hew to weep a room. It requires skill, comsweep a room. It requires skin, com-bined with patience, to clean a room properly. The chief mistake made by a novice is to think she can hurry through it and to think the room will be clean if she takes long, heavy strokes with her broom. Short, light strokes which are firm will do the strokes which are firm will do the work as it should be done. It is always best to sweep a heavy brussels carpet or one of similar make once with the grain, then once across it, going over each three or four yards in this way-outil the entire carpet is swept. When a carpet is old and evenly worn this is hardly necessary, but if it is new or has any perceptible ridges this method should surely be followed. After going over a room Suspicion of Foul Play in Toronto

It is needless to say that in sweep ing as thoroughly as this every article which is movable should be removed first or dusted and carefully covered with old sheets. When buying heavy pleces of furniture be careful to select those that have good, easily moved casters, so the articles may be pushed about and the dust be kept from be-

hind and from underneath them.

It is a great mistake to neglect sweeping as thoroughly as this every two weeks. If you do, the dust becomes ground into a carpet and helps it to wear out. Besides, dust discolors it more than or quite as much as wear. Fortunately many houses of today are built with hardwood floors, so the burden of sweeping is greatly lessened, as rugs are difted, shaken or beaten out rugs are lifted, shaken or beaten out of doors. Hardwood floors, if swept with a hair brush instead of a broom, then rubbed with a little oil or simply pollshed with a waxing brush, can he kept in good condition with comparatively little labor.
