"Strik,e and you get no back pay" was the summary warning handed out by Mayor MacBride last night to the garbage collectors of the city, who threatened to quit on Saturday night next, after the council awarded a four year contract for the garbage collection to George Tutt. Arrangements were made for the employment upon the streets or the sewers depart-ment of all men thrown out of work by this contract, but the garbagemen, who were present in council chamber, withdrew after it had been awarded, and after a brief consultation sent

word to Ald. Bragg, chairman of the buildings and gounds committee, that they intended to quit this week. His Worship the Mayor then delivered himself of his ultimatum. The buildings and grounds committee was authorized to make temporary arrangements for the collection of garbage, although the majority were optimistic that the collectors would agree to continue their work until May 1st. .

A new by-law regulating the collection of garbage was passed, providing for the use of standard receptacles, the separation of food refuse from ashes and other garbage, and making other regulations, as follows:-Citizens must provide two receptacles, one for garbage and food refuse, and the other for ashes and similar refuse. The receptacles must be of a size to handle convenient ly by one man, and must be placed in a convenient place for collection





## The Income War Tax Act

Forms giving particulars of income for the year 1917, must be filled in and filed on or before the 31st March, 1918

Section 4 of the Act provides that all persons resident or ordinarily resident in Canada, shall pay a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of those single and widows and widowers without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons. It also provides that all Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created, shall pay the normal tax upon income exceeding \$3000.

The Forms provided by the Department of Finance to be filled in with particulars of the 1917 income of all those whose incomes are liable under the Act, and by Trustees, Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, with information required of them, may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.


