ACCEPTED FROM WESTMOUNT BAPTISTS

The Rev. Dr. O. C. S. Wallace Will Succeed the Rev. Dr. Gates

The Rev. Dr. O. C. S. Wallace, who has been pastor of the First Baptist Church of Baltimore, for the last four years, has accepted the call of the Westmount Baptist Church, to become its pastor as Successor to the Rev. Dr. Gates who resigned in April 1912. Dr. Wallace announced his resignation to his Baltimore Church yesterday. A formal acceptance of the invitation from the Westmount Church was received here on Saturday. The new pastorate will begin in September. It is understood too, that a new church home for the congregations is one of the considerations in the accepting of the call.

Dr. Wallace was for ten years (1895 to 1905), Chancellor of McMaster University, Toronto. During his term of office Castle Memorial buildings, and a start made on the big science hall. Previous to that time he was pastor of the Bloor Street Baptist Church, Toronto. Mrs. Wallace was for a number of years Principal of Moulton Lady's College, Toronto.

The new pastor of Westmount Baptist Church is one of the leading orators of the denomination, and his acceptance of the call means much for Baptist work in the city.

William Percival Left Nearly \$60,000.00 to Charity

London, Ont., May 14 - The will of William Percival, one of London's oldest citizens, who died some weeks ago, has been probated and disposed of the \$60,000 estate almost entirely to charity.

Mr. Percival, after providing for the maintenance of his sister, Miss Margaret Percival, orders that the estate be disposed of and that the entire proceeds be paid to G. Fred Bargin, or his successor, as director or directress of the new orphan houses of Ashley Down, Bristol, England.

Miss Percival will continue to have possession of his residence until the time of her death and will be paid certain specified amounts half yearly.

There are no bequests for other relatives, his sister being the only person to benefit from the estate.

Another Railway

The following bill is before the legislature. - An act to amend chapter 111, Acts of 1911, entitled, "An Act to Incorporate the Blomidon Railway Company, Limited."

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows:

1. Section 1, of chapter 111, of the Acts of 1911, is hereby amended by adding after the word "Canada" in line eighteen thereof, the following words: - "and from a point on said railway at or near Canaan, to Kentville, in said County of Kings, via Sheffield Mills, Centerville, Billtown, Lakeville, Welsford, Somerset, Berwick and Cambridge and from Kentville, aforesaid to Avonport in said county, via the Gaspereau Valley, and from Avonport, aforesaid, via Hortonville, Grand Pré and Wolfville, to connect with said line from Kentville to Gaspereau Valley."

To Poison Cutworms

To a bushel of dry bran add one pound of arsenate of Paris green, and mix it thoroughly into a mash with eight gallons of water, in which has been stirred half a gallon of sorghum, or other cheap molasses. After the mash has stood several hours, scatter it in lumps about the size of a marble over the fields where injury is beginning to appear, and about the bases of the plants set out. Apply late in the day. Apply a second time if necessary.

Nova Scotia is not the only province in the Dominion that has been experiencing cold and backward weather. Reports from all sections of Western Ontario tell of damage to early fruit by the frost, although the apple crop has not been seriously hurt. In South Alberta on the 8th, inst., snow covered a large portion of the seeded area, and snow had fallen steadily for forty-eight hours.

Serious Strike at Halifax

The tramway strike which began at Halifax Friday last assumed a very serious aspect before the day was over. Eight men were locked up at the police station and two strike breakers there, for protection, after street scenes such as never before were witnessed in Halifax, was the way the slate stood at midnight of the first day's strike. Late in the afternoon the strike-breakers and strike sympathizers came into collision; when motormen were assaulted, car windows smashed, and firearms and pick handles flourished, and windows of the car barns and tramway offices smashed and the operation of cars stopped.

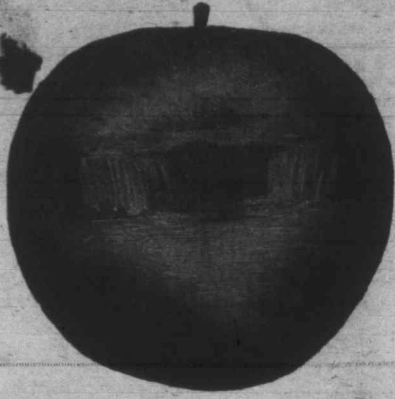
One notable feature was the fact that in Friday's disturbance the strikers themselves had no part. Their hands were free from it. The trouble was directly caused altogether because of an accident from a car manned by a strike-breaker and the inexcusable conduct of a host of strike sympathizers and a vast concourse of boys, while to some extent the temporary inability of the police to meet the emergency was responsible for the continuation of the unfortunate occurrences. Indirectly the cause of the trouble was the importation of professional strike-breakers from Montreal.

Monday's Herald reports that there is no rift in the cloud of the Tramway strike trouble. The company have declined an offer from the men to go back to work on condition that there be no discrimination and that the wage question be arbitrated upon. The company reply that they are ready to receive applications from men competent as motormen and conductors, and that priority would be given to old employees, while the Montreal scale of wages would be paid which, it appears, is from 1/2 to 2 cents higher than the present Halifax rate.

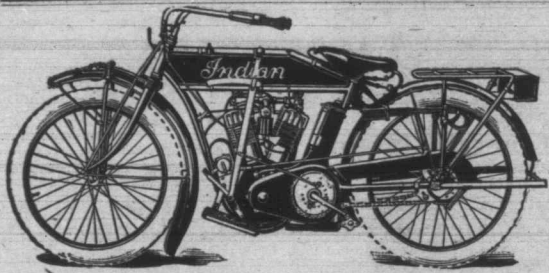

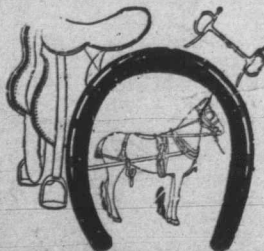

Household Recipes

Salmon Bisque

Drain the oil from one-third of a can of salmon, remove bone and skin, rub through a sieve, add slowly one quart of scalded milk, one-third teaspoon of salt and a little pepper. Rub to a paste four table-spoons of flour with two of butter. Add a tablespoon of the hot milk to the butter and flour paste, and when it is smooth add the paste to the milk. Boil up just a minute, serve piping hot. Crab meat on lobster may be used in the same way.

Bisque should always be served in soup plates, but clear thin soups are daintier in bouillon cups.

Clean Up Your Yard

"Clean Up," ought to be the keynote of this month. All filth and especially stable cleanings are the prolific breeding grounds of the pestilential house fly, the most efficient vehicle of disease known to modern science.

To successfully war on the house-fly the people must advance in a solid phalanx against it. It will not avail much if one man cleans up his premises and his next door neighbor leaves his garbage and rotten boxes and barrels lying about or his stable debris in the backyard. All must clean up at the same time and see to it that the premises stay clean.

If your neighbor does not clean up, the local Board of Health will attend to his case, if you take the trouble to telephone a complaint.

Let lime be used freely on all stables and filthy places.—Ex.

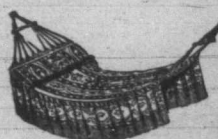
