DAYLIGHT SAVING PASSES IN U. S., CANADIAN ACTION.

Washington, March 16—Daylight saving now awaits only President Wilson's approval.

House amendments to the daylight saving bill requiring all time-pieces to be advanced one hour beginning the last Sunday in March, were accepted today by the senate.

REVIEW OF BULLETIN NO. 436

"Blackheart," a trouble of potatoes that has recently attracted attention, was at first regarded as a malady originating in shipment only, and is undoubtedly most common when potatoes are held at too high temperatures in closed cars. It has been found, however, in extensive tests made by the Station at Geneva, that lack of ventilation, if long continued, will produce the same trouble even when the potatoes are held at low temperatures. As the temperature rises the volume of air needed to prevent blackheart increases. If the temperature is below 40° F. potatoes may be piled in bins and cellars to a depth of six feet without ventilation, probably for six months or more; and it is probable that no harm will result if the thermometer in the storage room indicates 45° for a few days, but a long period of storage followed by two weeks' exposure to a temperature of 50° or more is liable to result in the spoilage of most of the tubers below a depth of about three feet. Complete exclusion of the air will ruin potatoes at any temperature. If potatoes are to be stored at greater depths than six feet, no matter what the temperature, ventilators should be provided and so arranged that none of the potatoes should be more than six feet distant from an abundant supply of air.

Potato stores can obtain the bulletin describing this trouble (No. 436) by a post card request to the Station at Geneva.

Review of Bulletin 438.

Bulletin No. 438 of the Station at Geneva is devoted to a discussion of "quality" in milk, including food value, healthfulness, cleanliness and keeping quality as factors. The discussion is based largely on recent work of the experiment stations in New York, Illinois and Wisconsin, and the bulletin is printed and distributed by the stations in those States. It is probably the most condensed, yet most comprehensive, presentation of this exceedingly important subject now available. It should be studied with care by all those responsible for milk production and distribution on any large scale. New York dairymen, health officers or distributors can secure the bulletin, without expense, by a postal card request addressed to the Station at Geneva.

QUESTIONS FOR EXEMPTED MEN.

Case of each will be reviewed in order to ensure even administration of Service Act.

These questionnaires, following the practice employed in the United States, will be mailed to all exempted men, who must return them properly filled in, without delay or forfeit their certificate of exemption. Any change in address should be at once communicated

failure to receive questionnaire will be regarded as of the same effect as failure to return it properly filled in. The general public are invited to assist the Government, to the fullest possible extent, in the even administration of the Act.

synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take expurchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months out of three years; cultivate 50 acres adjacent a house worth \$300.

The acres of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, shrubby or any land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

HOW TO GROW POTATOES.

When three hundred and thirty-two years ago, Sir Walter Raleigh introduced the potato from this continent into Ireland, nobody could have foreseen or imagined the immense part that it would come to play in feeding the world. It was nearly eighty years before the Royal Society of England took notice of the cultivation of the potato as a cheap food in case of famine. In another eighty years, famine in Scotland brought the potato into extensive notice as a cheap article of food. Another thirty years, saw France taking notice of its value. Mr. W. T. Macoun, the Dominion Horticulturist, briefly explains all this in a hundred-page bulletin recently issued by the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, in which is also given complete and comprehensive information as to the cultivation of the potato. Mr. Macoun goes fully into his subject, dealing with the preparation of the soil, of the varieties of seedlings, of the manner and methods of planting, of protection against insect pests and diseases, of the time to plant of the districts best suited to the different varieties of the care that should be taken during growth, and of garnering, storing, and shipping. Particulars are also given of the results of experiments and tests made at the Experimental Farms and Stations throughout the Dominion. In short, pretty well everything in the shape of information that is of value to potato growers with many exact and interesting illustrations is to be found in this bulletin that can be had free on addressing the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.

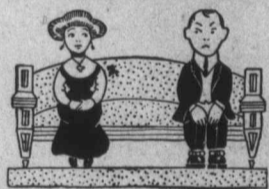

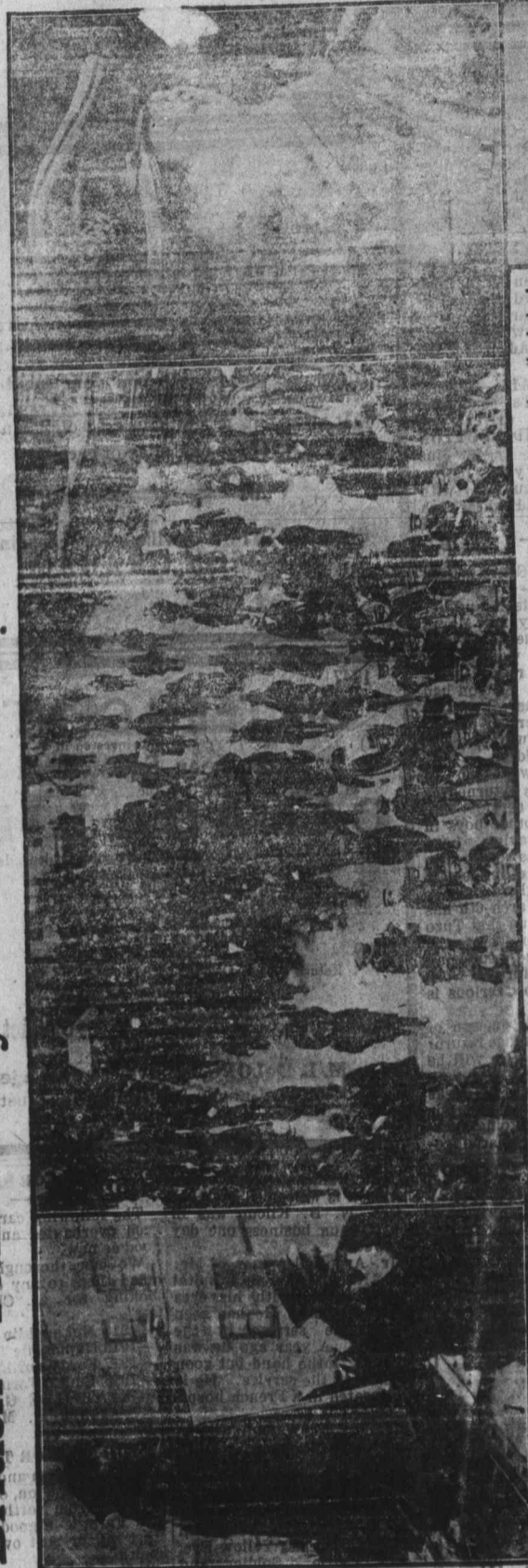

BRITISH CANADIAN HUSTLE IN U.S.A.

During one recent week in March, the British and Canadian Recruiting Mission dispatched to Canada 1,084 volunteers for the British and Canadian armies. During the absence of Brigadier-General W. A. White, C.M.G., Col. J. S. Dennis, of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, is in command of the recruiting programme in the United States. Brigadier-General White is making a tour through the south in an effort to stimulate interest in recruiting.

The pictures accompanying this article illustrate the campaign that is being carried on in New York by the Mission. Brigadier-General White and Colonel Dennis have started a whirlwind campaign for recruiting Britishers and Canadians in the United States covering the next two months



Their ambition is to secure 20,000 men from the United States. If possible, before the terms of the draft convention between the United States and Great Britain, become effective. During the eight months the Mission has been at work in the United States it has secured 22,000 volunteers for the British and Canadian armies, and has examined about 15,000 more. Brigadier-General White has made the point that if a Britisher or Canadian desires to aid the Allies he can do so by promptly volunteering, because the machinery of the British and Canadian armies for training men has been so well developed by three and a half years of experience that it can train a man and put him in the firing line in five months. This has actually been done in quite a number of cases. On the other hand, the United States Government, starting much later, has had its hands full in training the first contingent of the draft, numbering about 70,000 men, and the second draft will follow close upon the heels of the first.

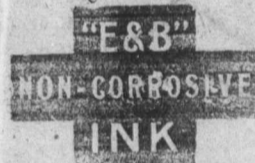

POULTRY ASSOCIATION 1918.

The sixth annual meeting of the Nova Scotia Poultry Association was held in the Class room of the Agricultural College on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock Jan. 19th 1918. About twenty delegates and others attended the meeting. Mr. F. E. Bath, President occupied the chair.

The Secretary read the minutes of the last meeting which were approved by the meeting. A report was also submitted to the meeting dealing with the Poultry shows held and some further suggestions were placed before the meeting to assist to make these shows a financial success.

Mr. Frank E. Jackson, North Sydney spoke at some length re the Poultry exhibit building at Sydney Exhibition. It had not been improved and the exhibitors decided to remain at home. The show was a failure as far as poultry was concerned.

Mr. H. H. Hull, Glace Bay, agreed with Mr. Jackson and said the exhibitors would stay away until such time as a new building would be put up and they were in earnest about their statement.

D. M. Brodie stated that the commissioners personally had made a promise to repair the Poultry building and had failed to keep their promise. They felt displeased at the poultrymen staying away but the poultry owners had to protect their own interests.

The President called on the delegates to report for their associations.

Mr. Frank Jackson reported that the North Sydney Association had held three shows before going in with the Glace Bay Association, and they now did not hold a show. They, however, imported 100 pullets which were sold to their members and purchased feed which was sold to the different members. Their interest was as keen as ever and they were always on the look out to help the industry.

H. H. Hull reported for the Glace Bay Club. He stated that their first show was held some years ago and they were still going strong. Their entries were small at first but have increased year by year. He explained how they managed to make ends meet. They used a wheel of fortune and sold the tickets on good stock purchased from the members. This stock went to persons who would next year be interested exhibitors and breeders.

Mr. Brodie, Glace Bay, stated that the members also held a banquet and held several social reunions during the year. They have the use of a hall and a reading room and the members use these as a club. Several are keeping trap-nest records and the local paper gives the members a column for poultry items. They have also bought feed and vegetables in quantities for their members.

Mr. Thos. McDonald reported for the Antigonish Club. Rain interfered with their show on two occasions. They, however, held a picnic during the summer which gave them funds to help out. The food situation was used as a help to get more members.

Mr. Osborne stated that he was pleased to report for their Club. The gate receipts were not up to what they should have been for such a good show. Elected Officers from Stellarton for the work of holding a show

Mr. Jackson endorsed all that Mr. Hull stated and said the present building was in no way suited for a poultry show building and further said it could not be repaired to suit a proper show place for the poultry. Prof. Cumming replied that he was of the opinion that we should draw up a plan of what we would require and submit it to the commission and he would see what could be done to provide better accommodation for the poultry. This was agreed on by the meeting. The secretary was instructed to prepare a plan of such a building.

Mr. E. C. Griffin reported for Kings Co. He stated they had held shows and had good shows but had always the same trouble to get the public to attend in order to help out the receipts and to bring the balance of the account on the right side of their ledger account. This year they planned to hold their show at Wolfville and hoped for a good attendance.

Some discussion took place in re the helping of the Halifax Club out on account of the great disaster of December 6th. It was decided that all exhibitors would write the Halifax Show Secretary stating that their prize money could be kept back which were due to those exhibitors. This was agreed to.

Mr. Brodie suggested that the work and scope of the Association should be enlarged. The poultry end of increased production was not getting its share of the attention given to other branches of live stock. If it was necessary application could be made to the "powers that be" for more help and more means to carry on the work. It was also suggested that a further campaign in conserving

the eggs produced should be carried on through the newspapers this season.

OUR PUZZLE PROBLEM.

Here is a new problem, and to use an Irish bull, it is an old one:

A farmer comes to town with 30 apples, which he sells three for a cent, getting, of course, 10 cents for them.

Another farmer, also with 30 apples, sells them two for a cent, getting 15 cents for his. They get 25 cents in all.

The next time they come in, with 30 apples each, they meet at the edge of the town and put their apples together, making 60 apples. One man having sold two for a cent, the other three for a cent, they decide to sell them five for 2 cents.

They do so, and when they are through, find out they have received but 24 cents.

The problem is, why did they not get as much for their apples selling them five for 2 cents as they did when they sold them separately, or, what becomes of the cent?



Military Service Act

Important Announcement to All EXEMPTED MEN and to the Public Generally

IN dealing with the very large number of claims for exemption brought forward for consideration in connection with Class 1, under the Military Service Act, it has occurred, as was inevitable, that as a result of false statements and difficulties put in the way of investigation, some individuals have secured exemption whose proper place is in the Army.

It is not the intention of the Government to allow these men to evade permanently their obligation to bear their part in the military defence of the Country and of the ideals for which we are fighting. To do so would defeat the purpose of the Act, and cause grave injustice to men in the second class necessarily called out to fill their places.

Exemptions Granted on False Grounds

It is, therefore, proposed to scrutinize carefully all exemptions granted to date in order to separate those which have been granted on false or insufficient grounds from those that are well founded.

With this object in view the various Registrars under the Military Service Act have been instructed to issue a series of questionnaires to exempted men. These questionnaires must be filled up correctly and returned promptly under penalty of forfeiture of exemption for failure to do so.

Exempted Men Who Have Changed Address

It is therefore important in their own interest that all exempted men who have changed their address since their exemption was granted and who have not already notified the Registrar of such change should notify him at once. Under the Regulations it is the duty of exempted men to keep the Registrar advised of any change of address, and failure to receive the questionnaire by reason of neglect of this duty must be treated as equivalent to failure to return the questionnaire after receipt.

Citizens Urged to Assist

In many instances information has been furnished by members of the public which has led to the cancellation of exemptions obtained by false or misleading statements. Further co-operation of this character is invited. The Government regard it as the Duty of all loyal citizens, not only to the Country, but to the men at the front, to assist in this way in securing reinforcements on a just and legal basis. Correspondence of this character will be treated as strictly confidential and will receive the fullest investigation.

"CLASS B" CALLED TO THE COLORS.

OTTAWA, March 29—Responding to a demand from the military authorities, the Military Service Council has decided to call up for service men in medical category "B" under the Military Service Act. Category "B" men are liable for overseas but not for combatant service. They are being called out because of the necessity of securing more men for railway construction and similar service. The official memorandum follows:—
"A military demand for men other railway work has arisen, and it has therefore become necessary to draft all men in medical category "B" in respect of whom no other grounds for exemption exist."

"The Military Service Council is therefore issuing instructions to registrars to take immediate steps to call up such men.
"Under the procedure heretofore adopted questions arising in regard to the exemption of men in medical category "B" on other grounds were postponed until men in the same medical category should be called up, and these men, as well as their employers and relatives will therefore be given an opportunity of presenting claims for their exemption."

"CRITICAL TIME IN IRELAND'S FORTUNES."

LONDON, March 22—"These are critical moments in the fortunes of Ireland," said Former Premier Asquith in an address today. "We hear disquieting reports, but one thing is most urgent, not only in the interests of Ireland and the British empire, but in the interests of the allied cause and the future of the world, reconciliation in Ireland."
"I refuse to believe that at this supreme moment British and Irish statesmanship is so bankrupt that it cannot find an honorable solution."

COMING IN CANADA.

Ottawa, March 16—It is practically certain that Sir Geo. Foster, minister of trade and commerce, will introduce a daylight saving bill in parliament this session, and it will become law if not too strenuously opposed by members from rural constituencies.
The adoption of daylight saving in the United States it is believed, will materially increase the chances of the bill being received with favor by the new parliament.

GLASS EYE THAT MOVES.

Capt. J. L. Aymard, a British army surgeon, describes in the Lancet an improved glass eye which can move. The chief drawbacks to the ordinary glass eye are that, being simply a convex shell of glass it tends to sink back into the socket and is fixed in a stony stare. Captain Aymard gets over these difficulties by placing in the socket of the eye a sphere of living cartilage or gristle taken without risk from the patient's ribs. It is all one operation. While one surgeon removes the destroyed eye, another surgeon removes the pieces of cartilage from near the patient's breast bone. Two pieces are made into a little globe, which is placed in the socket, and the thin outer covering of the eye, the conjunctiva, is sewn over to hold it in place. The ordinary glass eye shell is inserted over this and is prevented from sinking backwards. Some movement of the eye by the wearer is said to be possible.

Wonderful results in the treatment of leprosy by the use of an oil extracted from a obscure East Indian plant known as "chaulmoogra," have been obtained by the French Government in Tahiti and other Polynesia possessions, according to Dr Felix Gautier, of the French Government Medical Service in Polynesia who arrived lately at San Francisco from Tahiti. By the use of this oil, coupled with tonic medicines, which keep the patient from becoming weakened by the ravages of the disease, some lepers have been permitted to leave the segregation colonies.
