Just what Canada will get from the Underwood Bill, she will find out when it is finally adopted and comes into force. We are frankly skeptical about Canada getting very much of value.

It was certainly the part of wisdom—taking the most commercial view of the matter possible and forgetting all about the intention to 'annex Canada' or make of her 'an adjunct to the United States'—to wait and see what the Democrats would do for nothing before buying Reciprocity of the Republicans.

Electric Cooking.

The Children of the Nation.

The question: "What was to be the future of the nation," meant, "What was to be the future of the children of the people?" says Sir Victor Horsley. It was a terrible fact that between the children of the upper classes and the children of the poorer classes in England there was a great physical contrast. Boys in the public schools of 14 or 15 years of age were five inches broader in the chest than the children in the industrial schools. That was an enormous difference. It was not confined to this country. A French physiologist had written a most illuminating document which showed what Dr. Arkie, in Liverpool, had shown that this contrast between the upper and lower class children was to be found in France, Germany, America, Sweden, and Italy. But what was responsible for this non-development in children. The drink trade; there was no question about it. The Department Committee in their report on physical deterioration, pointed to the drink question as occupying a prominent place amongst the causes of degeneration. He had not referred to the number of debilitated children who were not fit to go to school, reported upon by the Commission. Who was responsible for them? Liverpool magistrates had proved that the debilitated child was scarce because he had suffered hardships and cruelty which were to be attributed to the liquor trade.—Alliance News.

STEAM BATH FOR TUB

Hoods Fit Over One End and Form Enclosed Chamber

From Germany, where the number of medicinal baths is legion, comes an invention that enables the average man to take a steam or hot air bath at home. A hood, with a hole at the top of the head to come through its over one end of the tub and forms an enclosed chamber to hold the steam in. The user sits on a seat which



hangs over that end of the tub and a tube connected with the hot water spigot leads under him. This tube lies along the bottom of the tub and has a wide, flat nozzle, turned upward. As the hot water flows out the steam that arises envelops the body of the person in the hood and has the same effect as the steam room of a Turkish bath. The discharge pipe of the tub is left open, so the water can run out without filling the receptacle.

GIANTIC RUDDER

Be Huge That It Has a Door For Men to Get Inside It

A rudder with a doorway into its interior is a feature of the mammoth Cunard liner "Australia." The pipe which connects the rudder to the ship is 4 feet in length and larger than the heaviest projectile made for modern artillery. A special appliance was constructed in the ship to lift it into position. When delivered at the builder's yard the rudder was in three parts. After they had been connected and laid upon the ground, the distance that had to be walked round the complete rudder was over 100 feet.

MYSTERIOUS AIRCRAFT

The People of Cardiff Have an Unusual Sight

Cardiff was startled by the appearance over the city of an aircraft. It was exactly 8.40 when the craft was sighted, and a crowd assembled outside the Glamorgan County Police Station watching its quick progress. Coming from the direction of Whitechurch and the Rhondda, it flew at between seventy and eighty miles an hour and disappeared in the gloom in the direction of the Bristol Channel over Penarth. The altitude was between 1,000 and 1,500 feet, and the craft carried a strong light.
