## Ottawa Weekly Letter.

### The Cowan Case

How A Conservative Got a Timber Limit.—The Example Furnished by Mr. Oliver.—What the Minister Did Not Know About It.

**\$74,000 TAKE OFF**

That Amount Was Paid to Brother-in-law Burrows.—And to Mr. A. W. Fraser, now Government Candidate in Ottawa.—But the Government Got Only \$6,000.

### A STORY OF HOGS

Minister Who Was Made to See.—Paid Three or Four Times What the Law Allowed.

### SASKATCHEWAN ELECTION

Another Blow to the Laurier Government.

Another Province Probably Captured by Conservatives.

OTTAWA, August 15th, 1908.

When Mr. Oliver and his colleagues in the Ministry were accused of improper disposal of timber limits to their friends they said Conservatives were allowed the same chance to buy. One case in proof was given over and over again. They said that William Cowan of Prince Albert, a Conservative, got a valuable limit just the same as Mr. Burrows, brother-in-law of the Minister in charge.

### MR. OLIVER'S RETORT.

Mr. Oliver made the most of this solitary case. "This was not a case of awarding berths to political favorites," he said, "it was a question of open competition," and then the Minister said he could prove it by birth No. 1047 for 250 square miles north of Prince Albert. Mr. Oliver explained, "One tender was for \$2,510 by Macdonald Bros., the other for \$5,000 by William Cowan of Prince Albert. William Cowan is not a member of the Liberal party or a supporter of this Government. He was the Conservative candidate against the present Judge Lacombe in the provincial elections of 1905."

Mr. Aime asked if the Minister could tell who Mr. Cowan's associates. Mr. Oliver answered: "I have no idea in the world, and it does not make any difference. Mr. Cowan got in the highest tender for this limit and he got it, and he was not a friend of this Government." Again Mr. Oliver said: "The point I want to make is that in the case of a limit which our friends oppose declare to be especially valuable and have instance of one of the cases in which there was an improper if not a corrupt transaction on the part of this Government, it is one of their own friends who got it."

### WHAT WAS NOT TOLD.

No doubt Mr. Cowan has obtained this limit and is a Conservative, and the bid in his name was the highest. But Mr. Oliver did not know the circumstances or else was wilfully deceiving the House. If the minister could have furnished the evidence in the Public Accounts committee given by the man who wrote the Cowan tender, he would not have mentioned this case. For this is one of the very worst of the Burrows' deals. It was put through when Mr. Oliver was minister, and Mr. Oliver's brother-in-law, with an associate who is now the Government candidate in Ottawa, gets \$74,000 take-off out of it.

### MEMBERS WHO KNEW.

When Mr. Oliver said he had the slightest idea who were connected with Mr. Cowan, there were three members who knew all about it. One was Mr. Oliver, the minister who sold the limit, and whose brother-in-law arranged the bid and got the take-off. Another was Mr. J. G. Tarriff, who was Commissioner of Lands when the deal went through and who opened the tender and took out Mr. Burrows' cheque. But these three members kept silent while Mr. Oliver provided the House with mis-information.

### BELOW THE SURFACE.

But an examination of the papers and an inquiry in the Public Accounts Committee showed the matter in a new light. Mr. Cowan did not write his own tender. He did not furnish the cheque. The tender was written by A. W. Fraser, the Ottawa politician, who is now the Government candidate in that city, and who has been mixed up with the Imperial Pulp Company and Mr. Burrows in a dozen Western timber deals, and has carried through several of his own. Mr. Fraser was before the committee, and testified that he had written the

## LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS

At the meeting of the board on Friday last, all the shares issued for 1908-10 are, per se.

The Steamer Ladbroke has set down her passengers round to 4 days and 14 hours.

The first official passenger train to travel over the G. T. F. Westward, went out from Prince George on Friday with 20 American soldiers on board.

The advertisement of the International Exhibition is held in this city on the 26th, September and following days will be found in this issue. Read it and make up your arrangements accordingly.

The early Thursday morning on the ground floor of Hays & Lewis' great hardware store in King Street and Toronto, caused loss of \$100,000 to stock and \$25,000 to the building, both fully covered by insurance.

Three men were killed at Eight Mile, on the 25th, while standing on a side track. One was a passenger clerk and was getting a gang of men. They supposed that a certain train would take the main line but instead the train came down the siding and before the men could get clear of the tracks all three were killed.

A large beam belonging to Mr. Charles Owen, Georgetown, was blown by the Friday morning. The beam was full of hay and also contained some farming implements, a knitting machine, and other things which were lost. The beam of hay was only saved by the most strenuous work.

Saturday, Mrs. Martin wife of the Postmaster of Montserrat, was fatally burned while preparing dinner. In some way her clothing caught fire about the kitchen stove, and she ran out. The wind fanned the flames before help arrived so she was badly burned that she died in a couple of hours.

Windspeed advice of the 25th report remarkable changes in the temperature in 24 hours. On the 25th, the temperature changed from 90 to almost the freezing point. Two degrees of frost were registered at Red Deer and 23 at Edmonton, with 25 at Banfield and 25 at the station.

A Windspeed dispatch of the 25th says: Magnificent harvest weather prevails, and throughout should be general next week. About 60 per cent. of the crop has been cut, according to advice received by the Ogilvie Flour Mills Company. The prevailing opinion on the grain exchange this morning is that the grade will average about No. 1 Northern, though there is bound to be considerable No. 2 Northern.

Lord Lovat, who came over from Scotland to be present at the Quebec Tercentenary celebration as a representative of the Fraser family, has presented to the Dominion of Canada a beautiful painting representing his distinguished ancestor, then Capt. Fraser, leading the Highlanders at the capture of Quebec, 1759. The picture was hung at the Archives Building at Ottawa Saturday.

The remains of Hugh Jennings, formerly of Byam's Road, who died at Bridgewater, N.S., were brought to the Island yesterday. The casket which was forwarded to Pender's Station by train. Deceased had been living with members of his family in the States; but desired to be buried here where he had spent the greater part of his life. R. I. P. Obituary notice later.

Advice from Wigan, England, says: The worst fears have been realized in an explosion which occurred in Wigan on Saturday. The exploded column numbered about 70, and it is impossible that any of them can have survived. Efforts are, however, continuing. Thirty bodies were discovered yesterday in the wreckage; but the bodies from the burning coal prevented the remaining bodies from reaching other that are undoubtedly lying far down in the mine.

Advice of the 25th from Victoria, B. C. says: Numerous settlements are now being threatened and several lumber camps have already been destroyed. In the Yukon district a territory twenty square miles in extent and the game are fast advancing. The eastern side of Bowen Island is all ablaze and the fate of eighty odd persons in the vicinity is unknown. Some of the richest lumber lands in the province have been swept away by the fire, which can only be checked now by heavy rain.

A dispatch of the 19th from Mexico City says: The great fire which has been raging in the city since Tuesday for forty-three days has killed all attempts to extinguish it, and it is now greater in volume than ever before. From a hole eight inches in diameter, the wall has slipped into a volcano, with a crater 100 metres across. It is estimated that the flames reach a height of five hundred feet, while the black column of smoke continues into the clouds. The report received today from the statistics sent to the scene by the Mexican Government estimated the amount of oil consumed at 10,000 gallons a minute.

The Foster meeting at Montserrat last evening was one of the grandest ever held in this Province. The large new hall, just fitted up by the owner, Mr. D. L. McKinnon, was crowded to the door, and many were unable to gain admission. There must have been over sixteen hundred people in the hall; and on the extensive stage about one hundred and fifty ladies occupied seats. The best of order prevailed and the magnificent demonstration closed with ringing cheers, again and again repeated. This splendid demonstration surely shows how the political wind blows in King's County.

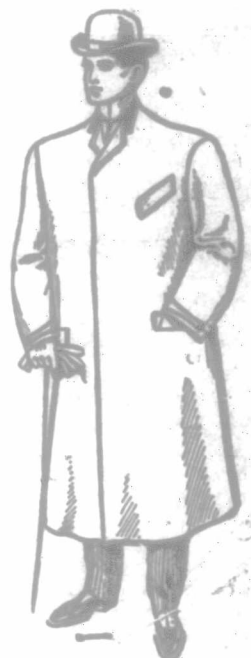

This means to be a pretty fair price for winter, even if there had been no law fixing the limit, and if the minister and his chief assistant officer had not decided at the beginning that no compensation was due.

SASKATCHEWAN SPEAKS.

The Laurier Government has received another notice to quit. While the election in Saskatchewan is still disputed, it is admitted that the local Liberal Government is in great peril. The majority of two to one in the last House has been swept away. Premier Scott appears to be the only candidate who has occupied defeat.

THE GOVERNMENT CANNOT STAND.

Nearly all the constituencies where the election was independent of honest officers and immigration officials, and can defy the power of the federal government, have gone Conservative. In the west districts, where foreign settlers have not yet secured titles to their lands, in places where seed grain was distributed by the Dominion Government, among the European strangers whom government interpreters could persuade, the ministerial party did better. But it seems obvious that the Scott Government must go.

A BLOW TO LAURIER.

This means that the power of the Laurier administration is broken in the west. The Saskatchewan election was brought on for a particular purpose before its time, and in advance of the federal contest. It was hoped that a provincial victory would help the Conservative forces of the Laurier Government. For this reason the whole power of the Dominion administration was exerted. Every federal officer was made an election campaigner. The province was invaded by gangs of organizers and machine operators from outside. Every unfair advantage was to be taken, such as the holding of the man of importance, the expenditure of money, the expenditure of public money, and the expenditure of the patronage of the two governments.

The Saskatchewan Elections.

The privilege of the Liberal party to have another severe blow in Saskatchewan when, instead of carrying the province by two to one, as predicted, the loss of Premier Scott's government hangs in the balance. Worse than that, those of the four ministers were defeated, and Premier Scott himself carried by a great majority. At the same time the Liberal party was elected in Manitoba by a majority of 1,000, and in Ontario by a majority of 1,000.
