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NOTICE TO PROPRIETORS OF STORES AND OTHERS.

The following is published for the information of all concerned:— Under and by virtue of the power and authority contained under Section 145 of the St. John's Municipal Act, 1902, and the sub-section thereof, it is hereby resolved that on and after the publication of these Regulations all persons are prohibited from depositing, throwing, or scatter-ing anywhere on the public streets, within the Municipality, any offensive matter, in the form of loose paper or

pieces thereof. Also resolved, that proprietors of stores, shops, etc., are prohibited from depositing on the streets of the City any sweepings from their stores, shops, etc., from Saturday afternoon until the following Monday morning.

Parties offending against these Regulations shall be subject to a penalty not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), or imprisonment not exceeding thinty days.

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
