My letter, calling attention to hydraulic distribution, appeared in one of our city papers about sixteen years ago, after I had first acquainted the Municipal Council that the whole trouble of their not being able to keep the water constant up to the higher levels, all the time, was on account of hydraulic errors in the water system; for our water supply

Consequently the wastewater inspector is still needed, especially in winter, to try and keep the water as high as possible in the city mains by checking maximum discharge of water by citizens.

But minimum discharge or distribution based on a liberal supply of water for city needs, is approximate from ten to fifteen per cent. of maximum supply, and the reason hydraulic engineers and ohers recommend greater supply of water, is only or account of hydraulic errors, which make it only possible for the city to utilize any more than about twenty per cent, of maximum supply for city use, and under the most favorable circumstances our distribution will by getting shaky, give trouble before thirty per cent, is utilized. Therefor the greatest waste connected with thirty per cent. is utilized. Therefor the greatest waste connected with our water supply and distribution as now managed, is that seventy per cent. more or less of our full supply cannot be utilized for city requirements. The only control or check our Council has over distribution, is in the waste water inspector, a control if executed at its best, is imperfect to accomplish its purpose and is not dependable, leaving it

Water meters are used to prevent waste, which it does to a certain extent, but its only true merit is it is a just taxing machine; its use cannot correct hydraulic errors, which caus he water to fluctuate in the city wat r mains. By using right hydraulic ules, correct ratio of inlet and outlet of any size supply pipe for any al-itude of water can be got either for lriving turbines or for city distribuion. The former may need one or wo outlets, but the latter must be livided for streets and sub-divided for nouses. As distribution is extended, record is needed to be kept of what percentage is already given to supply vater and what is left for future use of maximum discharge, which for safe protection against fire can be set to any standard of percentage governed
