



They suggest that the cause of the decline in the Labrador fishery should be investigated; that the possibilities of developing markets on the east coast of South America should be looked into; that better prices might be obtained by better grading of produce; and that the question of export of fresh fish, improvement in cod-oil and the supply of bait should be inquired into. They suggest also that in future scientific investigation into the fishery might be usefully undertaken jointly by the Government of Newfoundland and Canada; and they indorse a suggestion put before them that, when opportunity permits the Home Government should co-operate with the Newfoundland Government in making a thorough survey of

the Labrador fishery grounds.

After reviewing what has been done with the forests up to the present, the Commissioners say:— "The forests of Newfoundland, like

its fisheries, should be permanent assets if measures are taken— (a) to lay down scientific regula-tions as to the conditions on

which cutting is permiss-(b) to guard against forest fires.

The licences already issued contain no regulations as to the methods of cutting to be employed, or as to periodic replanting. Whilst the larger odic replanting. Whilst the larger operators may, and no doubt do, lay down certain rules to suit their own convenience, experience elsewhere shows that Government control on such a question is essential. We venture to suggest that the Newfoundland Government should devote its early attention to this question. The conditions of existing licences should not in the public interest, be allowed to bar the path to a much needed rebar the path to a much needed re-

In referring to the ravages of the forest by fires, to the statement that much of the damage is done by sparks from railway engines, and the complaint that the law is not properly enforced, the Commissioners remark that "the fitting of a suitable sparkarrester is easy and inexpensive, so that there is little excuse for negligence in this matter.



#### THE IMPORTANCE OF WELL KEPT HANDS.

A well kept hand is a great asset to girl or woman, for many people sider the hand more indicative of haracter than the face. A reason able amount of self-respet and pride in one's personal appearance should prompt one to give the hands scru-pulous care, that they may always lock well kept. But in giving this care, do not imagine that it is neces cd, almost claw-like in shape, nor is it in good taste to have them fairly glistening with polish. A soft white hand, with nails long and tapering usually indicative of the inc tence of its possessor; in fact, it usually shows a tendency towards idleness and a squandering of much good

orn, smooth and firm; the nails are from dirt, cut round and fairly se, and the quicks pushed back. he nail is designed to act as a re-forcement to the finger and to proteet the top, and it but diminishes the usefulness of the finger when the nail is too long.

With a stiff nail-brush, the hands

and nails should be scrubbed at least once a day. It is best to use lukewarm water in cleansing them during the entire year, and they should be well dried to keep them from chapping. In wiping the hands, the motion should be towards the finger tips. If the hands have a tendency to chap or to redness keep ready a tips. If the hands have a tendency to chap or to redness, keep ready a solution composed of equal parts of rose water and glycerine and immediately after washing them, before they are quite dry, rub in a few drops. Glycerine does not agree with every skin. For those with which it does not, a honey solution, mutton tallow or a good skin food cream may be used, rubbing it over the hands while they are still damp. Any excess fat remaining on the skin surface may be wiped off with a towel. After drying the hands, gently push back the cuticle of each nail with the towel. Sometimes skin irritation and chapped hands are caused by the soap used, for the same soap does not agree with all skins.—Voman's World for March. World for March.



#### American Assaulted for Talking English.

Savannah, Ga., March 28.—Becaus he spoke English on a train on which stores. he was travelling from Berlin to ant engineer on the steamer City of Macon, son of Paul E. Twiggs of Savannah, was badly beaten by German passengers, according to a letter write ten by him to his father.

Young Twiggs was on a sightseeing spoke German while the City of Macon-was discharging her cargo of co ton at Bremen. After several day in Berlin they decided to return t their ship, which was due to sail i a few days on the return to the Unite

Trouble began almost immediately after the two young men had boarde the train in Berlin. Twiggs unable to speak German, was conversing with his companion in English. He says he noticed hostile looks directed at him by German passengers and finally they threatened to throw him off. His companion explained to the passengers that Twiggs was an American and was speaking English because he knew no German and that he was peaceably discussing his own af-





Geneva. March 24 .- A summary of what purports to be the conditions ipon which the Austrian garrison at Phzemysl offered to surrender to the Russians is printed by the Tribune. The following stipulations are said to have been made:

"First-Full honours of war for the

"Second-Special treatment for the prisoners providing that officers shall be paroled and that none of the troops shall be sent to Siberia.

"Third-The right to transport to Austria those killed and wounded during recent attacks.


"Fourth-Complete liberty for the civil population with the right to leave or stay in the city.

"The defenders of the fortress marched out of Przemysl to Russian headquarters with colors flying" says the Tribune in its account of the surrender.
