

For men discharged up to 1st April, 1917-\$35.00. For men discharged between 1st April, 1917, and 1st April,

1918-\$45.00. For men discharged on or after 1st April, 1918-\$60.00.

2. A War Service Gratuity, in place of Post Dis. charge Pay, to be graduated up to six months' Pay and Allowances, exclusive of subsistence or allowances in lieu of rations and quarter, For men who have served in an actual theatre of war, or were on the strength of some recognized overseas establishment on Nov. 11th, 1918, the Gratuity is graded as follows:-

For three years' service or over-183 days' pay and allowances.

For two years' service and under three years - 153 days' pay and allowances. For one years' service and

under two years — 122 days' pay and allowances. For less than one year's service-92 days' pay and allowances.

For men who have served overseas, and were discharged prior to November 11th. 1918. without having been in actual theatre of war, and for men who have served in Newfound. land only, the Gratuity is graded as follows:-For three years' service or

For two years' service and under three years-61 days' pay and allowances.

For one year's service and under two years-31 days' pay

and allowances. In the case of an Officer or man without dependents whose pay and allowances, as above described, are less than \$70.00 for a 31 day period, a consolidated rate of \$70.00 will be

## Dried Fish.

here, but those far-sighted merchants who have foretold conditions in the past seem to be of one mind on the subject. Soft cured codfish in Newcoundland has reached a very low evel, and stocks are not selling. With heavy stocks of hard-cured codfish on hand, merchants and shippers in St. John's are reported to have little immediate business in sight. The European situation is none too hopeful at present, for Norwegian codfish is already in many markets and it has found a demand where other supplies have not. There are indications that some Norwegian cod, perhaps a heavy supply, will be exported to this country within the next few months. Supplies of codfish, haddock, hake and pollock are generally light in New York and holders are not making any concessions in prices because of their inability to procure desirable lots to replace those now on the spot. Most grades offering through this market are held at the quoted prices of a few weeks ago, and, despite the weakness in the West Indies there is no cutting of prices as yet. Newfoundland and American Porto Rico are held at \$70 and \$71 for medium, while large have reached \$78 in some instances, but not for this market. Cuban codfish remains at the the levels of a few weeks ago, with few offerings. There is a supply of haddock available, but little hake and pollock. On these latter grades prices are held firm.—N.Y. Fishing Gaettze.



two men of genius can be. But Scott, although canny like all his countrymen, was a very lavish spender of money. He made prodigious sums by his writings, but during the years of his greatest prosperity, say 1811 to 1825, he spent it faster than he made it, and was often paid for his work

The amount he spent upon Abbotsthe land on which it stands was acquired piecemeal at ridiculous cost, telity will quickly drop. The grand baronial residence was built at fabulous expense, and then Scott set himself to fill it with antiquarian and historical relics, for which he gave any price which was asked. The place became a show where he entertained the greatest men of Europe with princely hospitality. The story of his later terrible financial embarrassment and his heroic struggle to pay his debts is too well known to need recapitulation.

Goerge Morland, whose "Interior of a Stable" is one of the treasures of the National Gallery, was a terrible spendthrift. Dealers literally sat upon the doorstep whilst he painted and carried off the canvases wet from the easel, and for a time he made a very big income. But he livved lavishly, kept a dozen horses, was surrounded by a horde of sponging comrades, and, after being imprisoned several times for debt, died miserably at an early age.

Lawrence was in most respects the very opposite of Morland, being a man of polished and gentle manners, but he was equally capable of earning fabulous fees and also of spending his income foolishly. He was always in pecuniary straits, although half the aristocracy were clambering up his steps to sit for one of his gorgeous canvases. He could never resist any thing which he thought beautiful, and it is said that on drawings by the old masters he spent no less than






