### White Pole Idea for Street Cars

Will Stop Only at White-painted Poles, in Future.

NEW YORK, May 25. A hydro airplane, marked No. 826, was picked up at sea vesterday off Scotland Lightship by the steam pilot boat New York. The hydro airplane was upside down when it was found and there were no traces of any occupants. According to one of the pilots of the New York, the plane had evidently been abandoned or had washed out to sea. It was without wings or engines and has evidently been in the water for some time. They expressed the opinion that it may have been an amateur experimental plane, which had floated away before more than the body had been completed. Officials here of the Navy Hydroplane Station say there was no record of any plane bearing the number 826 in any of their stations in the vicinity of New York.





### Produce and Provisions.

From Saturday's Trade Review.) CODFISH.—Trade in codfish is very dull both at home and abroad. The exports this week amounted to only 2,227 qtls. to West Indies and New York. The quantity held in Oporto from Niid. this week was 57,806 qtls. with 11,457 qtls. sumption. The holdings in Nfid. have now been reduced to about 150,000 qtls., the greater portion of which is held in the outports North and will come forward next week to St. John's,

CODOIL.—The export of Common oil this week was 27,189 gals., all to New York. \$305 per ton has been paid in the local market for this kind of oil all the Spring, dealers do not expect that this price will keep up. The manufacturers of leather have been active in making sure of their supply for the Summer since March, and this was the chief factor in keeping up the price. A lull now appears to be setting in and it is not likely that this season's common oil prices will be as well sustained as they have been all the Spring. There is only a small quantity of 1919 oil now on

COD LIVER OIL. - Manufacturers should not hesitate to go in for refining oil the coming season, especially those who already have the outfit and understand the business. We believe that the price will be satisfactory next August and the following months, though not of course anything like the prices that prevailed during the war. If the price is around \$2 per gallon, which it is expected it will be, this will pay manufacturers at the lower prices for which livers will be selling this year. With Common Cod Oil under \$300 a tun, it will pay better those who have the outfit to refine their oil.

PORK.—There has been no change in the Pork market during the week. Mess is \$49 per barrel wholesale, Fat Back and S. Clear, \$46.00, Family Mess, \$55.50, Short Mess, \$57, and Ham Butt, \$56.00. Production is increasing in the United States and export to European countries is falling off, therefore Pork products of all kinds are steadily accumulating on Packer's hands. During the War the U. S. Government encouraged the production of Pork and now that the distribution is hampered by the cause above referred to, it is natural that prices should continue to weaken. If t was not for the large American onsumption due to prosperity, prices show greater decline. The

tocks on hand are ample. BEEF .- The higher grades of Beef show no change in prices, but the cheaper kinds which have been neglected for some months by the conuming public, show a weakening tendency. Boneless is down \$29 per barrel wholesale, Special Family, \$37.50, Extra Flank, \$35, and Pate, \$37.00. It is thought that prices of both Beef and Pork will likely prevail at about present levels during the Summer. nearly the whole list of food com modities, it is recognized that Beef is about the best value in food stuffs at the present time, we fail to understand why pork prices do not correspond to the decline in barrelled beef. FLOUR .-- 8,494 barrels were imported this week. Local prices are \$17.25 wholesale for leading brands, and \$16.75 to \$17 for under grades. The total recent advance per bushel made in Canada on wheat was 35 cts. or \$1.55 per barrel, the full effect which has not yet taken place on flour here, but when it does in a few weeks, flour here will be \$18 a barrel wholesale for leading grades. Fishermen flour charged to Summer's account will therefore not be much un-

SUGAR.—The latest report from Cuba shows that the crop has been reduced by about 250,000 tons and the Raws have advanced 21/2 cents, making White Granulated about 281/2 cents. There is no longer any prospect of getting 25 cent sugar this Summer owing to this late advance in raws. During the week 1500 barrels and 500 bags were imported to St. John's. The stocks on hand are sufficient to keep the trade going till next arrivals.

MOLASSES .- The 'Russel M Zinck' arrived here this week from Barbados beth Fearn" also arrived with 525 puncheons, 92 barrels and 125 half barrels, total about 930 puncheons, which added to 1486 which had arrived up to May 15th the grand total will be 2416 puncheons. This is only about one-fourth of our yearly supply and so far only 500 puncheons are said to have been secured to order. The price of Fancy in puncheons is \$1.90 er gallon, and Choice \$1.75.

POTATOES .- The general price in st. John's this week for imported poatoes is \$14 per barrel, but it appears hat the crest has not been reached The Minister of Agrculture, whose ables have been scouring Canada for seed potatoes, showed Prade Review a telegram from St. ohn, N.B., where he located some on Tuesday, saying that the dealer who ad them was willing to fill an orde for 500 barrels. 



### The Woodford-Squires Charges.

The following correspondence has taken place between the members of the Opposition in the Legislature and His Excellency the Governor, and speaks for itself :-

St. John's, Nfld. May 21st, 1920. His Excellency Sir Chas. Alextnder Harris, K.C.M.G., K.C.V.O., &c., Governor of Newfoundland.

Your Excellency:-Referring to the allegation of misconduct on the part of Your Excellency's Prime Minister and others in connection with the recent Election Petition against the return of Mr. Wm. Woodford, we regret that the circumstances compel us to have to again address Your Excellency on the sub-

Your Excellency will call to mind that shortly before the opening of the Legislature you received from us a statement in writing detailing the facts, asking that the charges against your Prime Minister be investigated. and pointing out how undersirable it position of Leader of the House whilst these charges remained unrefuted.

It is now five weeks since an official pronouncement was caused to be pub lished informing the public that Your Excellency was appointing a Commis sion to inquire into that matter; that this Commission would be presided over by the Chief Justice and would act without delay. Your Excellency's Attorney General replied intimating that the course outlined with regard to the Commission was being followed. It is some weeks since announcement was made that the Commission would conrist of the Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Kent and Hon. R. K. Bishop. About ten days ago in answer to an enquiry by the Leader of the Opposition, the Attorney General informed the House that the matter was progressing, and that he could see no reason why the Commission could not sit in the course of the following week. On Wednesday last, in answer to the Opposition, the Attorney General announced that the Commission which had been issued proved abortive, as the Judges, while prepared to take evidence as to the facts were unwilling to make any finding on these facts. Upon being further interrogated yesterday your Attorney General stated that no Codemission had been issu ed at all! that the matter had never got any farther than the preparation of several d'afts of a Commission none of which had ever been adopted and none of which, was now in ex-

These briefly are the facts. Whilst emphasizing as strongly as sible that this matter cannot, in public interest, be allowed to drop, we have to respectfully direct Your Excellency's attention to the position nat it will be impossible to select a Commission outside the Judges vill be satisfactory.
