#### A Tiny Railway.

How many of us know that up in the Eskdale of Cumberland is the most absurd-looking railway con-

This "toy" line, of seven miles or so, was built more than forty years ago to carry iron ore to Ravenglass, on the coast, where this tiny system joined a "real" railway.

After some years, the iron mines were closed, and the little system hecame a wreck During the Great War a few enterprising men took over the Eskdale Railway and relaid the original rails in a 15in. gauge. Model engines and rolling-stock were provided, and, lo! seven miles of delightful dale scenery was opened for passenger traffic.

The tiny locomotives only measure about three feet six inches to the top of the funnel, and the whole outfit consists of five tiny engines, about twenty-five passenger cars. Yet so powerful are the little "locos," that they can do twelve miles an hour on the level, with a load of nearly fifteen tons in all.
