WITHDRAWAL OF THE GREEK FLEET FROM THE ASSASSIN'S TRAIL

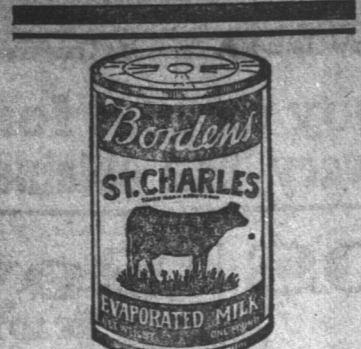
ROME, Sept. 6. The withdrawal of the Greek fleet from the waters adjacent to the Italian coast has been announced by the Greek Government. The fleet, which was ordered to proceed to the Gulf of Volo, news of which was interpreted here to-day as an attempt to create the impression abroad that the Greek Government was planning further naval operations. It is stated that the Italian Government has accepted the withdrawal of the Greek fleet as absolutely pacific.

ITALIANS CONFISCATE ARMS. CORFU, Sept. 6.

The Italian occupation authorities have ordered the confiscation of the arms of all nationalities resident in the island, including members of the Italian colony. British subjects may use their weapons in their own homes. The town is quiet and orderly and the inhabitants are anxiously awaiting how long the occupation will last. No Greek ships are arriving and it is impossible to proceed directly to Athens.

ORDER BEING RE- STORED IN TOKIO.

TOKIO, Sept. 6. Tokio and Yokohama separated by only a few miles of water to-day lie crushed by the overpowering forces of the earthquake, or a series of them, that came with scant warning Saturday last and brought crashing down the homes and business places of those great cities. All round for

miles other cities, towns and villages have been dashed from their foundations and what upheavals of earth failed to accomplish was completed by fire and tidal waves. While some entire sections of Japan's capital have been thrown into indescribable ruin, a very considerable section of the city remains. Not so with Yokohama, refugees from which are beginning to find their way into Tokio with the first real news of the disaster

in that city. Terrific destruction levelled that city from end to end they tell, and their descriptions of the clutter of dead and dying in the streets and waterways is horrifying. Adding to the horror of the situation whole sections of the city were isolated when great gaps opened in the ground, absolutely shutting off those within the area from escape from the flames. Another distressing feature is the fact that thousands are known to have been forced to lie injured among the ruins and die lingering deaths either from fire or from their injuries.

GREECE TO BOYCOTT ITALIAN FIRMS.

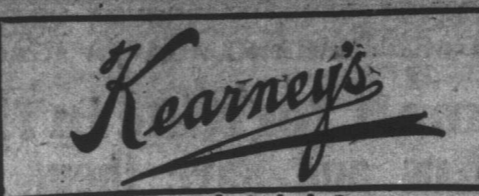

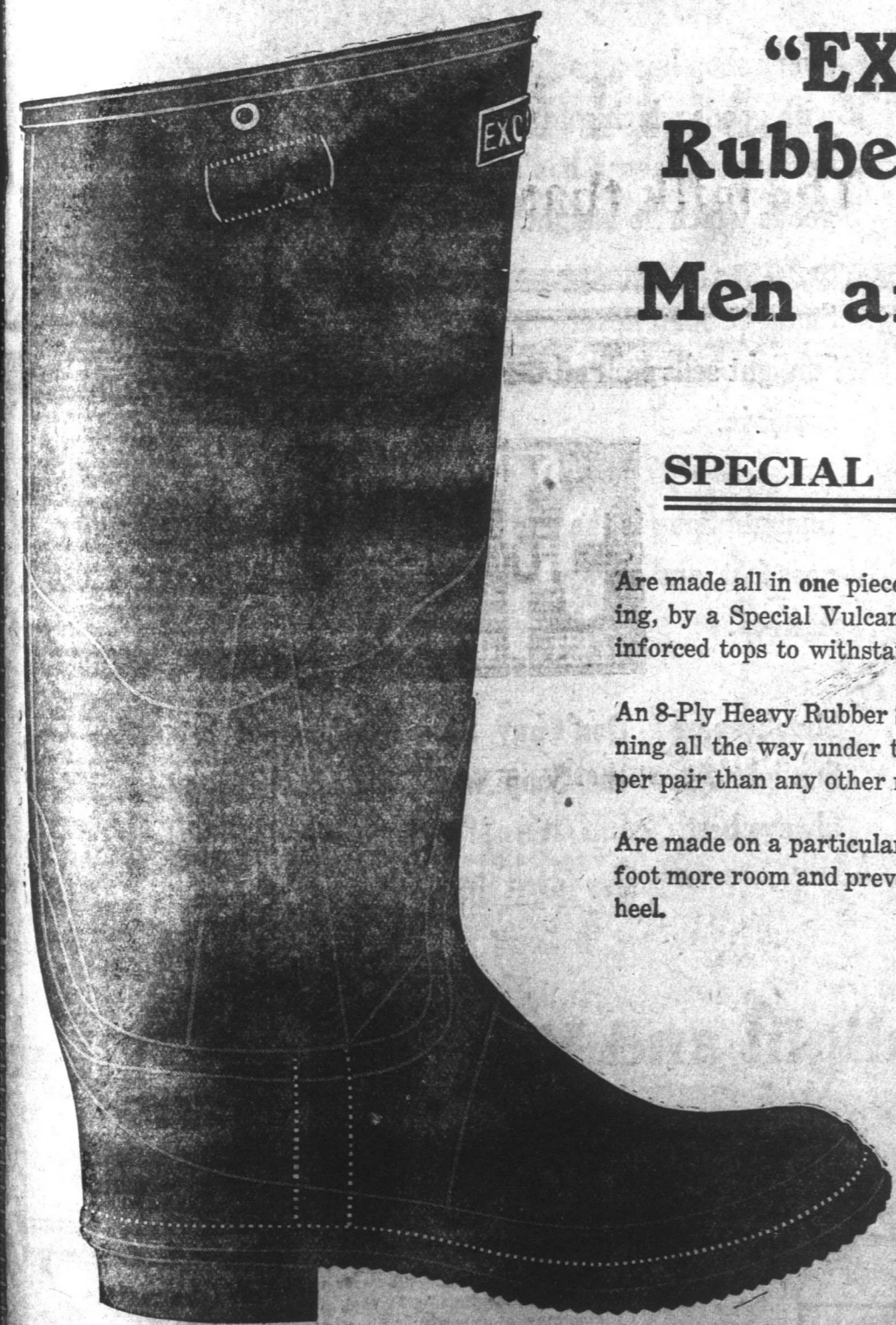

SCHR. RAIDED FOR LIQUOR.

HALIFAX, Sept. 6. The Digby County schr. Lucille B. was raided off the Massachusetts Coast by fifteen armed men in three boats, who made off with 1,200 cases of the liquor cargo of the Lucille B. The raided schr. was commanded by Capt. Leblanc of Wedgeport, Yarmouth County, who was on shore attending to business at the time of the raid. The news was given by the mate under oath, when he called the vessel into Meteghan this p.m. The captain was left ashore.

SALVATION ARMY RELIEF EFFORT

TORONTO, Sept. 6. The Salvation Army has organized a great three-day effort throughout Canada East territory as part of a huge general scheme for Japanese Relief, inaugurated by Gen. Booth, from headquarters in London.

WAYNE MINERS RETURN TO WORK

CALGARY, Alta, Sept. 6. Coal miners at Wayne at a mass meeting decided to return to work immediately and now only ten Drumheller mines are idle.

A LITTLE PROGRESS MADE.

HARRISBURG, Sept. 6. Governor Pinchot and leaders of the miners union re-assembled yesterday in an effort to come to terms on the anthracite problem. The miners union officials moderated the original scope of their organization's demands by agreeing that a ten per cent wage increase for contract miners might do. They continued to ask more for day workers, and this operators were most unwilling to accept.

HAWAIIAN VOLCANO ACTIVE

HAWAII, Sept. 6. The Kilauea volcano resumed activity to-day, molten lava hurrying skyward with loud reports to heights of a hundred and fifty feet in the air and streaming down the mountainside.

NEWFOUNDLANDER DIES FROM BURNS.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 6. Thos. McCarthy the young man who was badly burned in the Royal Hotel boiler room Aug. 26th, died in hospital this afternoon as a result of his injuries. He was a native of Nfld.

ISLAND OF TEN THOUSAND INHABITANTS DISAPPEARS.

PEKING, Sept. 6. The police of Chiba at the Northeast corner of Tokio Bay report a new island off Izu Peninsula, while they

say the Island of Oshima, which contained an active volcano, is invisible, and is feared to have gone down with 10,000 or more inhabitants. There is still no news from Bonin Islands and catastrophic changes there are feared.

EXPRESS TRAINS COLLIDE NEAR HANOVER.

BERLIN, Sept. 6. Ten persons are known to have been killed and fifteen injured in a collision to-day between the Berlin-Amsterdam express train and the Dresden-Amsterdam express near Hanover. The coaches of the later train were demolished.

BIG RAW SILK THEFT.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6. Theft of three hundred thousand dollars worth of raw silk from a vestry Street warehouse was discovered to-day, when the goods were missed and a hole found between the warehouse and an adjacent building through which they were probably were taken by robbers.

LEAGUE COUNCIL'S PLAN OF SETTLEMENT.

GENEVA, Sept. 6. The Council of the League of Nations adjourned to-day agreeing to send minutes of its meeting to the Council of Ambassadors and thus hasten a solution of the Grasco-Italian crisis. It was decided to discuss the competency of the League at a later date. Before adjournment Signor Salandra, Italy's chief representative announced his intention to abstain from voting without committing himself on the question of competency of the League. Paul Hymans, Belgium's representative, said that he had great sympathy for Italy but that he must in consequence declare he could not accept the Italian views on the question of competency. Sweden's representative agreed with the Belgian stand.

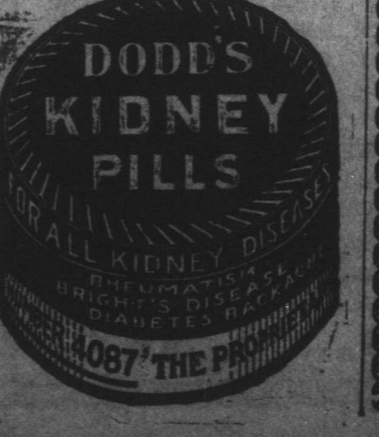

Denmark's Claims to Greenland.

ARE OPPOSED BY NORWAY.
COPENHAGEN—Denmark thought its title to Greenland was without blemish after the United States agreed to waive all claims to the Arctic island as part of the consideration in the purchase of the Danish West Indies. But the interest of Norway in the "land which Eric the Red" discovered has suddenly revived after centuries of inactivity. The controversy between the two Scandinavian countries over the ownership of the east coast of Greenland has become so acute that Denmark now has a commission, headed by former Minister Th. Zahle, travelling over the Arctic island for the purpose of making a report upon which negotiations with Norway may be based.
Many Danes think Norway is opposing Denmark merely for the purpose of holding its claims upon Greenland as a club which can be used in forcing better terms out of Denmark in a new commercial treaty which is to be negotiated in the near future. The chief argument used by Norway is that its fisheries might be affected adversely by recognizing Danish sovereignty over the eastern coast of Greenland.
There are only about 12,000 inhabitants in Greenland, and of these only about 800 are Europeans, mostly Danes. The island is chiefly famous as a jumping off place for explorers in search of the North Pole and as the source of icebergs which imperil shipping on the North Atlantic coast. Its trade is a monopoly of the Danish state, which enforces prohibition. The total import and export trade of Greenland is only slightly more than \$1,000,000 a year, and has declined since fish fats of various sorts are in less demand.
Norwegian claims upon Greenland date from the explorations of "Eric the Red" and Leif Eriksson in the eleventh century, when the latter of these intrepid Norsemen is supposed to have discovered the American mainland. In the fifteenth century Norway abandoned all communication with Greenland, and later in the eighteenth century Denmark began commercial relations with the island and established its colony there.
Denmark's colony before 1921 was only about the size of New York state, but the entire island over which it now is asserting its control is sixteen times larger. The season is so short in summer that even the small amount of tillable land near the coast can produce only potatoes and other vegetables which do not require much heat.

Soviets Cultivate Mohammedans.

Wary of Offending Powerful Oriental Religion.
Riga, Aug. 29. (Star-Tribune Cable. Copyright.)—Despite the continued persecution of the Russian Orthodox, the Greek church and the Roman Catholic church in Russia, the Soviet Government is careful not to offend Mohammedans living in Russia. The anti-religious campaign which resulted in the death of many of the Russian Orthodox and Greek church and also Roman Catholic priests, as yet has not condemned one Mohammedan priest to death. The latest move of the Bolshevik Government to cultivate the support of Mohammedans is announced by official Soviet press bureaus.
With elaborate ceremonies the Bolsheviks have delivered an ancient copy of the Koran—Immanuel Kersan—to high priests of Mohammedanism in middle Asia. This holy book of Islam was captured by the Russian General Abramoff, decades ago, when Russia overpowered Asia. Until the Soviets' spectacular gift this week, it was held in the museum at Petrograd.
Mass meetings were held in the Mohammedan mosques at Makama and Shirka asking the Soviets to admit Moslems from Syria and Mesopotamia to "religious freedom" in Russia.

Old Country Soccer.

(Montreal Star.)

would seem that there is a general desire to know just what's what on the other side, now that Old England has got into the same stride as those who were ahead by a fortnight with their programme. One can get some idea of the excitement prevalent in the Old Country when the following Canadian press sends a message dealing with the football situation much as it would were the matter of strictly political or financial value. We have not yet reached the stage here when Soccer is held the hold much in the same way as the "rippe," or say, as you like to call it, but the approach is very speedily. We are equipped as yet from a strict organization point of view. Our annual meetings are mainly taken up with a shattering in parts of the common, useless debate, futile findings, it provides evidence that the game is alive. "That," is just what we need as said. And that it is, while not making a distinction against the "rippers," the delegates who have gathered at the D.F.A. annual meetings in the past, that they tackle work before them at Fort William business men, not as tourists with the best guide in their hip pocket. The kick-off in England provided the usual crop of surprises. Surprise has expressed that Newcastle had been walloped Arsenal as badly, yet really it was only what was to be expected, but was clinched about the verdict of the cables from Birmingham 3, Aston Villa 0 and kicked off. Liverpool are out to set a world's record, and you need not be in the least dismayed because of that apex when West Liverpool put it over the Merseyside

possibility of losing the commercial value of the player they descended from the clouds to mother earth—in a financial sense—and talked practical politics. John Chapman has got the cheque. You keep an eye upon Manchester United. And follow also the doings of Cardiff City. Thus early they have disposed of Bolton Wanderers and Sunderland. The fixture list must have been very badly arranged, all the same, when it involved a journey by Sunderland from Roker to Ninian Park after a gruelling game on Saturday. Here, however, is the message from the other side which reflects, innocently enough, certainly not intentionally, the prevailing industrial condition on the other side.

"From all reports to hand from soccer club headquarters, the past four months have been most 'unproductive of captures,' with the result that for the season which has just opened it is a case of relying on the 'old guard' again. Several reasons have been advanced for the slump in transfers, 'the chief' and a most feasible being that the football league, with its 88 clubs, embraces practically all the professional talent in the country, and wherever they turn in the search for new blood, managers find themselves poaching on their neighbors' reserve. Moreover, clubs are not nearly so willing to part with tried men as they were during the boom, and fix transfer fees with the idea of retaining them. Consequently fees for even moderate players remain up in the clouds, and even the richest clubs hesitate, therefore, waiting a four-figure cheque for a doubtful acquisition. This was reflected in the agenda of the football league management

committee which met last week and were called upon to deal with a long list of applications from unemployed players for reduction of fees. "Despite the wide range of talent which the football league embraces, however, there is still a dearth of real England players. There is hardly a club began the season without grave misgivings as to its centre forward position, and unless the opening months ease the situation the task of international selectors will be anything but easy when they come to pick the side to meet Ireland on October 20.

"Unfortunately—and this considerably increases the seriousness of the centre forward difficulty—much the same position prevails with regard to inside men. To describe some of last year's international forward lines as ineffective would be to put it very mildly. What is wanted is a re-incarnation of G. O. Smith, or even Vivien Woodward, and then we should find inside forwards in scores.

"Amongst the few changes that have taken place two stand out as worthy of note. Perhaps the most interesting is the severance of Jack Marshall, Scottish international full back, from Middlesbrough. Preston North End have been in negotiation for him, but if it is not quite settled yet then he will go to Lancashire.

"The other is Norwich City's capture in securing the signature of Albert Sturges, the Sheffield United captain and international full back, who had been with the club for years.

One Tree is Used, Five Trees Burn.

Twenty Years Will See the End of Ontario's Forests.

Port Arthur, Ont., Aug. 30. (Can. Press)—"Forest fires in Ontario during the past summer have destroyed five to ten times the amount of timber put to use by all the mills in the province," declared Robson Black, manager of the Canadian Forestry Association, at the head of the lakes yesterday arranging details of a three months' campaign in Northern Ontario in the interests of fire prevention.

Mr. Black states he had the report of one company that lost 500,000 cords of pulpwood, due directly to carelessness of prospectors setting fires in the woods. One other company lost 50,000,000 feet of pine. Perhaps the most serious loss of any was that in which an Ontario firm lost in one week's fire enough pine to keep the company's mill going for 50 years.

"We have come to the point where we have got to face the fact with regard to forest fire prevention. At the present rate of waste the forests of Ontario will be depleted in

twenty years," said Mr. Black. "If fires continue at the rate of this summer, Ontario is going to face a large exodus of population attached to the wood users. It will mean that scores of towns in the province will cease to exist as towns which are now dependent on the product of the forest for existence."

Govt. is Urged to Ask Release.

BREEDING CATTLE QUESTION SORELY EMBARRASSES BRITISH MINISTRY.

LONDON.—The British Government finds itself sorely embarrassed over the question of the import of Canadian breeding cattle. The Government considers itself pledged to Canada to remove the embargo on such cattle yet the removal is vehemently opposed by practically the unanimous opinion of British Agricultural interests. Lord Bledisloe who was chairman of the Agricultural Advisory Committee appointed by the Government in connection with forthcoming Empire Conference, resigned his position because he is opposed by the Government on this matter.

Russian Colonist Revealed Fortune.

Dying Confession Led to Family Being Traced.

Sir Arthur Griffith Boscawen, who was the minister who actually gave the pledge to Canada, follows with the same suggestion that the Government should beg for release from its bond. He says: "It is clear that I was completely misinformed as to agricultural opinions of the subject of breeding cattle. Canadians have always expressed themselves as most unwilling to ask for anything which would hurt our farmers here."

London, Aug. 30.—From Moscow comes reports that a Russian colonist, fatally injured in Canada, in his dying confession to a priest revealed to him that he had a fortune hidden away.

The Russian turned over this money to the priest, who forwarded it to the Vatican.

The authorities at Rome discovered the dead man's family in Russia, and sent them the money that had been left, amounting to many millions of rubles.

The family was identified through a Canadian photograph of the missing son.

Household Notes.

If you have some cold boiled potatoes on hand, heat a little bacon fat in a frying pan, chop the potatoes quite fine, add to the fat and stir well. These can be seasoned to taste, browned on both sides and folded like an omelet.
