Washington Letter

(By Our Own Correspondent) The immediate fate of the third party movement in the United States will in all likelihood be decided at a conference which opened here to-day of the national committee of the Conterence for Progressive Political Action. If it is decided to go ahead with a third party organization, then full plans will be made for a convention in January. If the decision is contrary, the conference may never be held. The indications at present are that a third party talk will arouse little enough enthusiasm.

"As intolerable as the action of the Kaiser in telling us where and how we could sail our ships" was the characterization given in the Senate yesterday by Senator Reed of Missouri to the pronouncement by Winston Churchill on the question of foreign debts. The gentleman from Missouri wanted to be shown how the United States could escape the undignified and unpaying role of goat in any game of debt cancellation that the powers might be foolish enough to indulge in. Mr. Reed was of opinion that direct or indirect interference by Great Britain in debt discussions between this country and France could not be tolerated. The Treasury Department on the other hand accepts Mr. Churchill's statement as "obvious and logical."

During the present session of Congress your correspondent has been getting his first glimpses of doings in the Senate and House of Representatives. One of the results of attendance at the sittings of these legislative bodies has been a vastly increased respect for the Legislative of our own much-abused Newfoundland. Let Newfoundlanders who are inclined to despise their native Assembly or be-Ittle the dignity of their Upper House first attend the sessions of the Senate or House in Washington and their feeling towards the home legislature will unquestionably become one of inlense pride, not merely because of the general decorum which oftener than not marks the proceedings of the Newfoundland Assembly as compared with the prevailing disorderliness of legislative proceedings in the Capitol, gut also because of the superior inbelligence which the average legislafor of the homeland displays in defiberations of a serious nature. This must surely seem an exaggeration to those who have not had the questionable privilege of witnessing sittings of the American House or Senate but it is a fact, for all that.

To describe a session of the House is not within the power of the ordinary individual. It might be anything from an enthusiastic club session to a gathering at the races. The members apparently do everything under the sun but listen to the unfortunate who happens to be trying to make a speech. The volume of "hot air" that is daily wasted in that chamber would ffice to keep the dirigible Los Angeles in the clouds indefinitely. In the Senate, while the rules are strictly "go as you please," a speaker has a much better chance of being heard because the din of other voices is necessarily greatly reduced by reason of habitually negligible attendances of

members.

On Monday of this week we went to the Senate to hear the discussion on the Muscle Shoals Bill. It was supposedly an important piece of legislation and the speech of the sitting was in progress. Out of the ninety odd members there were not present throughout the whole afternoon more than a score of senators, nor was this number to be found occupying their seats at any one time. The speaker who was doing his utmost to convince nobody in particular of the immense benefits that must accrue to the American people if the Government decided to operate Muscle Shoals, wandered about the chamber as he harangued the busts of dead and gone statesmen which adorned the walls. And if his efforts had nothing else to recommend them they at least had plenty of comedy. There was also earnestness discernable in his address and one of his remarks was that the thing he was so strenuously advocating would "give the country something that it needed par excellence."

As it was in the Senate with the members so was it with the officials. The reporters had not, evidently, to confine themselves to any particular space in which to catch the words of senatorial wisdom. Rather did they attach themselves with dog-like tenacity to the speaker and whither he moved they moved, which was usually all over the chamber. Mixing Rubber

and Water

dering the well-known water fing qualities of rubber, this would appear to be an impossibility; vet we are told by a writer in The India Rubber World (New York) that by the proper procedure rubber and water may be combined to form a smoth, creamy mixture. The rubber, of course, is not dissolved in the water, but its globules are 'dispersed' through the liquid, much as fat globules are dispersed in ordinary cream. This method of preparing rubber, we are informed, has great industrial ties, and is already used to some extent in current manufacturing processes. We read:

"What takes place when a mass of bber is dispersed in water is indicated by picturing the conditions as summer, was in command of the follows: Crude rubber may be con- nose clipper, Columbia. sidered to consist of massed minute shrunken globules with shriveled exteriors interlocked and cemented together by non-rubber substances. "It is comparable, by way of illus-

tration, with a mass of dried prunes. as in the case of the latter, the rubber globules can be pulled apart, separated and dispersed under condions which allow the entrance of water to swell the rubber globules and break the cohesive or binding force of the cementing non-rubber

Absorption of water is effected by means of a suitable water carrier mixed with the rubber. Glue or colfoidal clay functions effectively to convey the water into rubber and disperse the rubber globules under suitmechanical treatment. This reatment consists of working the rubber by mechanical pulling which permits the wet glue or clay to penetrate and loosen the grip of the mass-

rubber globules. "Very many successful water dispersions have been made experi-mentally of pure rubber and rubber compositions. Also a beginning has been made in actually applying water dispersions in the manufacture of certain lines of rubber goods. The preparation and use of water-dispersed rubber mixings is now in daily routine factory practice for certain proofed fabrics and surface coating St. Michael and All Angelsof adhesive tape. In the latter instance glue is incorporated with rubber and reclaim in the mixing:

"In certain eastern rubber factor ies water dispersions of rubber are being made and used in a number of routine manufacturing procedures.

"Manufacturing possibilities of water dispersions of rubber are evident leather shoe work now using 100 or more solvents containing rubber cements for which water dispersions may be substituted.

"In the paint manufacturing industry water dispersions have already shown startling results experimentally, eliminating turpentine.

"Water has been called the universal solvent, and it would seem to be no less universal as a dispersing medium. The development of this process will be followed with interest in many industries."



banana. The truth of this statement becomes at once apparent to the visitor who lands at any one of these countries. Outside the natives' huts he will see bunches hanging in the soon as it is fully grown), and should he drive through the country he will see plantations of the fruit on all sides and in all stages of growth, from tiny plants to full-grown "trees." Were he to inquire for what purpose a bare strip of land was being prepared, the answer would surely be-bananas!

Large plantations or pens as they are called, sometimes stretching for miles, are planted with the tiny shoots. These shoots increase rapidin size and grow in a palm-like shape. The light green leaves are about 12 inch broad and reach several feet in length. They are smooth and have uncut edges, but the wind soon splits them up, and they hang fringe-like from the central vein which gives the plant a bedraggled and untidy appearance.

Before very many months have passed the "tree" has reached a good height, and from the centre, at the end of a long stalk and surrounded by a fringe of little green fingers, the purple flower appears. As these fingers are bananas grow, the distance between them and the flower increases and the bunch grown heavy hangs upside down.

When the fruit in the pen is almost fully grown, a man, generally a Hindu, followed by a band of negroes walks through, looking over each bunch as he goes. When he sees a suitable one he catches hold of it and jerks "tree" and all to the ground. A negro then steps forward and with his machete cuts the bunch free and carries it to the roadsideand so they continue till all are

The fruit is transported to the docks by rail, and there it is sortedthe fat bunches for the American market and the "lean" or less fully grown for England. With as little delay as possible it is placed in the specially prepared holds of the ship and kept at an icy temperature during its two-weeks voyage across the Atlantic.

The captain of the ship informs the company by wireless of the number of bunches he has on board, and thus every banana is sold before its arrival in port. Special banana trains are waiting and the fruit is at once despatched to its various destinations and there stowed away in ripening rooms until it is fit to be offered to

Hard Liquor Figures

'The American people are drinking more "hard liquor" to-day than they did before the Volstead Act became the law of the land, says the Los Angeles Times. They consumed over 30,000,000 gallons more in 1923 than they did in 1917, the last year of unrestricted drinking in the United

These figures were not given out by enemies of prohibition, but by officers of the Internal Revenue Department who are attempting to enforce the Eighteenth Amendment. They are based on Government statistics and a nation-wide investigation of rum smuggling made by some of the keenest officials in the Government ser-

Before the coming of prohibition, acording to Government reports, we here in the United States drank 167,-740,325 gallons of foreign and domestic whiskies, brandies, gins and other ardent spirits, annually.

To-day, smugglers and bootleggers are providing our people with 195,-442,500 gallons of whiskey and gin alone. This is a calculation based on official estimates. Add to this amount 2,654,506 gallons released on permits and we have a grand total of 198,097,-006 gallons consumed."
