The general outbreak; which firing of the mine was to signalize, was quiekly suppressed, and the city soon became quiet.

INTERNATIONAL COPYRIGHT.

Great men have their special griev nces as well as little men, and the author who counts the remuneration for his labours by thousands of dollars, or it may be, pounds, often thinks he has as much cause for being querulous as the more humble individual who gives to his readers a leading article, or a local paragraph (the best he has got) and finds some time afterwards, that a cotemporary has copied them without giving "the usual credit." Of course, authors of books have an advantage; they can secure their copyright so that they shall be chief partakers of the benefits which may accrue from publication in their own country; something which it would the climax of absurdity for writers whose articles live but a day to think of. No publisher in Britain, for instance, would dare to bring out a new work by a British author unless a special agreement had been entered into; but the price of a copy, part of which must go to the original publisher, is all that the English writer of any work can claim from any publisher in America, unless a sense of honour should prompt him to give more. If it did. what he gave might then assume the name of generosity, since there is no law that binds him to disburse a sin gle penny for the privilege of publish-A few years ago it was a matter of but slight importance to American authors that there was no internation al copyright law on any of the Statute books; they lost little or nothing, bethere were but few of their works deemed worthy of republication on the other side of the Atlantic. Before "Uncle Tom's Cabin" created a world-wide sensation writers in Britain alone were reasonable complainants, but the immense popularity of that work caused edition after edition to be issued, not only in England, but in the written language of every Eu-ropean country and the authoress derived no pecuniary benefit beyond what she received from the American publishers. The United States boast of, at least, one true poet, Longfellow His poetry, though of a peculiar order, and his verse, though of a peculiar measure, is much admired by many readers. His poems have been republished in England for the last thenty years, and we are assured on good authority, that had an international copyright treaty been in force between the two nations, Longfellow would have been the richer by forty thousand pounds sterling.

It is, in plain terms, folly in one sense of that word, for any American ablishing house to give a writer on the other side of the Atlantic anything for his copyright. The large houses will not, and the smaller ones need not do it. For, suppose that one of the minor publishing firms paid an anthor for advance sheets of a work that was likely to live long, and be in the sublime simplicity of this prayer, active demand, what would they gain? which far excels in comprehensivenes Nothing, for perhaps the Harpers' and suppliant eloquence anything that would be down on them for a departure the tongue of man every uttered, would ture from the common practice of literary piracy, and probably in twentyfour hours after the issue of the first

Starvation in Labrador.




