There were symptoms of a "big shiver" at a house where a marriage took place on Saturday night, and there would probably have been a "high old time" had not the crowd been dispersed by the Chief Constable.

A young woman, daughter of Samuel Lambert, near Halloway, was so badly beaten by her step mother a few days ago that she died. A coroner's jury returned a verdict of wilful murder against the old vixen.

A young lady at Ingersoll having been frightened by Slippery Jack, some of the papers circulated a report that she had died from the shock to her nervous system. The Chronicle contradicts the report, and says she is quite well again.

A doctor and a dentist of St. Mary's have been quarrelling and the doctor got the worst of it. The druggist threw a stool at him, while the industrious clerk busied himself in squirting coal oil from a syringe over the doctor's good clothes.

SUN STRUCK.—On the 2nd inst., Mr. David Barclay, of Guelph township, while returning from the blacksmith's shop at Mardan, received a sun stroke, which affected him so badly that he was deranged for twenty-four hours or so afterwards. We hear that he is now in a fair way of recovery.

OIL ACCIDENT.—A girl about 11 years of age, residing in Dunwich, was pouring some oil on the wood in the stove to make it kindle more readily, when the flame extended to the oil in the can, causing it to explode and scatter over her clothes, setting them on fire. She was so badly burned that she died the next morning.

A NICE PRESENT.—At a recent meeting of the Board of School Trustees in Galt, John Davidson, Esq., presented them as a gift with a deed of half an acre of land attached to the Grammar School. The Reporter speaks in glowing terms of how that institution is flourishing, and predicts that there will be a daily attendance of 150 pupils next season.

TURKISH PRIZE.—We are requested to state that the Messrs. Sharpe, with their accustomed liberality, will continue this year their contribution of \$20 to the prize fund for the best 4 acres of Turkeys. To this sum the South Wellington Agricultural Society will add \$15, same as last year. Intending competitors must make their entries with the Secretary by the 30th of July.

INHUMAN.—A ten mile trot for a purse of \$400 was among the races at St. Catharines on Dominion Day, and three horses started off at a rattling pace, making the second and third miles in 2.57, while the sun was roasting hot. When they had gone five miles two dropped off, and the remaining one walked or rather staggered over the remaining five miles. FATAL ACCIDENT IN NELSON.—On Monday last a pair of horses belonging to Mr. Robt. Elliott, of Trafalgar, were being driven along a road in the township of Nelson, one of the whippetrees fell down, and the horses taking fright ran away, throwing Mrs. Robert Elliott, Mrs. Wm. Elliott, and an infant out of the waggon. The child died on the following day. The women who were taken to Mrs. Zimmerman's house, were severely injured, but at last accounts were progressing favorably.

THE HALTON BATTALION.—The 20th Battalion of volunteers, Col. Chisholm, left for home on Thursday morning, after having completed their sixteen days' annual drill. The number of men who turned out amounted to 430 rank and file. On the 1st of July they had a field day and fought a battle with an imaginary enemy. The various movements were executed in such a manner as to show that they had greatly improved in Battalion drill since they had been exercised together. On the preceding day they were inspected by the Deputy Adjutant General, Col. Durie, and Brigade Major Villiers, in heavy marching order, and each man with 40 rounds of ball cartridge in his pouch. ## THE GRAND TRUNK.—At the meeting of the Bond and Stockholders of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, on the 18th of June—one of the largest meetings ever held at the London Tavern—the resolutions passed were of the most sweeping character. They were to the effect that the Board should furnish forthwith a list of the registered proprietors—which had been refused even to members of the Board of Directors—that the present Directors should retire, and that a committee of proprietors, consisting of Mr. Creak, Mr. Ritter, Mr. Hartridge, Mr. Handyside, Mr. Staples, Mr. Haig, Mr. Lewis Paine, with power to add to their numbers, be appointed to carry out the resolutions passed. Other changes equally great will doubtless be recommended by the committee and the new Board of Directors to be chosen.

## CANADIAN ROUTE FROM EUROPE TO CHINA.—A new route from Great Britain to Australia has recently been proposed by Mr. A. G. Dallas. Mr. Dallas suggests the establishment of a steamship line from Wellington, New Zealand, via Tahiti, to Victoria, Vancouver Island, and a railway through Columbia to Canada. By adopting this route Great Britain would be placed in postal communication, through her own territory, not only with Japan, China, and the eastern Archipelago, but with New Zealand and Australia, securing the unlimited supply of coal obtainable in Vancouver Island, together with its spacious harbors and boundless forests, adapted for shipbuilding, which give it a preponderating advantage over both San Francisco and Panama.

## A Singular Libel Case.

A few days ago the cable conveyed the intelligence that the proprietors of the London Telegraph had been mulcted in the sum of £900, being the amount of damages found for a plaintiff who sued them for libel. The case grew out of the trial Rish Allah, who was accused last year of murdering his ward in Brussels. The Telegraph sent a special correspondent to Brussels for the purpose of describing the incidents of the trial, and it so happened that this gentleman conceived a violent antipathy to the prisoner, and thought it his duty to argue the case against him in his letter day by day. The prisoner was triumphantly acquitted and his innocence made clearly apparent, and no sooner was he free than he instituted proceedings against the Telegraph to recover damages for the injury thus done to him. In charging the jury the Lord Chief Justice said "that the slightest comparison of the correspondent's letters with the official report of the trial would prove conclusively that the writer was not actually present at the trial." The proprietors of the Telegraph did not make known who their correspondent was, but it was generally understood that it was Mr. Sala, who does most of the descriptive writing for that journal, and who is known to be rather fond of rendering his narratives more picturesque by sometimes indulging in flights of fancy at the expense of strict veracity.

## The Democratic Convention.

The Democratic Convention assembled at New York on Saturday and was called to order by Mr. Belmont, who made a short speech and nominated General Henry S. Palmer, of Wisconsin, for temporary Chairman. The nomination was ratified and Palmer took the chair. He made a short speech, urging harmony and wisdom in the councils. Rev. Mr. Morgan made prayer. The resolution was adopted, that during temporary organization the rules of the House of Representatives of 1860 be governing rules of this body. Mr. E. O. Perrin was appointed temporary secretary. The committee on Permanent Organization and Credentials were appointed. The members of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Convention were invited to seats in the Convention. The Declaration of Independence was then read and the Convention adjourned till Monday morning at ten o'clock. The Soldiers' and Sailors' Convention met at Cooper Institute which was handsomely decorated. The delegates marched from the headquarters to the Convention, attracting great attention. After entering the chair, Messrs. Chase, McClellan, Grant, Slocum, Hancock, Johnson and others were repeatedly cheered. Gen. McQuade called the Convention to order, saying that they had met to co-operate with the Democratic Convention in putting down Radicalism. Gen. McClelland was nominated and chosen temporary chairman, and made a short speech commendatory of Republican principles. General Edw. D. Campbell made a series of resolutions, strongly censuring the Radicals for their course, and calling upon the Democratic Convention to nominate a candidate whom the soldiers can support consistently with their action during the war.

## TRAIN AGAIN IN TROUBLE.—Mr. George Francis Train was again before the Insolvent Court yesterday, for adjourned hearing of his petition for discharge. Mr. Dowse, Q. C., on behalf of the Ebbw Vale Company, objected to the discharge on the ground that Mr. Train did not yet give an account of what had become of the iron to the amount of £1,175, which he had purchased from them. Another case of opposition was that Mr. Train, in his schedule, gave no clue to the nature of the settlements which have been made upon his wife of £15,000 in gold in New York, by Mr. James McHenry, and of premises valued at £12,000 and £500 situated in Melbourne and Sandridge, Australia, respectively. Mr. Levy, junior counsel for Mr. Train, was heard in support of his position, but the insolvent complained that Mr. Heron, his senior counsel was absent, and that it was impossible that he could reply to Mr. Dowse's argument, not having heard them. Judge Miller said he would adjourn the case until Saturday, to allow Mr. Heron opportunity for reading a note of the arguments. Thereupon, Mr. Dillon an advertising agent, who had gone bail for Mr. Train's appearance in the sum of £1,000, prayed to be discharged from his recognizances. After a lengthened discussion, the learned judge released Mr. Dillon from the obligations of his bond, and remitted Mr. Train to the Marshalsea Prison until Saturday morning. An ingenious Englishman, not long ago, announced in the papers of the French department of Manche, that he would send two beautiful engraved and colored portraits of the Queen of England to any person enclosing him the modest sum of sixpence. Receiving several thousand letters enclosing sixpences, he sent to each of his correspondents two postage stamps exhibiting the august lineaments of Her Majesty.

A proposal comes from Ireland to abolish Sunday work in newspaper offices, by "having Monday morning's paper printed on Saturday night." It is the "printers of Cork connected with the various newspaper offices of the city" to have hit upon this mode of meeting a difficulty, and they appeal for support to the public, whom they ask to forego the reading of Sunday telegrams till noon the following day.

WARNING TO BATHERS.—On Sunday Dr. Riddell of Toronto, held an inquest upon the body of a man named Pettigrew who was drowned at an early hour that morning, while bathing in the river Don. From the evidence of several, who had seen deceased sinking, it was learned that he had been in a state of heavy perspiration immediately before jumping into the water, when he sank apparently without an effort to swim. The latter change of temperature had produced a spasm of the body which prevented any effort by deceased. The jury returned a verdict of "accidental death by drowning."

**Emigration from Great Britain.**  
The emigration last year from the United Kingdom was less than any year since 1862, being only 195,953, which was 8,929 less than the preceding year, and 15,882 less than the average of the four previous years. Of the 195,953, 55,494 were English, 88,622 Irish, 12,866 Scotch, and 31,193 foreigners. 159,275 went to the United States; the Irish being rather less than one half of the whole number, and nine-tenths of the whole number leaving Ireland. In fact, of the 159,275 emigrants who went to the United States from the United Kingdom, there were 79,571 Irish. The remainder of the Irish emigrants were divided pretty equally between British North America and Australia. The amount remitted by emigrants in order to aid their friends to emigrate, was, from the United States, £540,884, 11s. 3d.; from Canada and New Brunswick, £2,145, 5s. 9d.; making a total of £2,686, 10s. 12d. The only colonies which promoted immigration by means of public funds were, Victoria, New South Wales, and South Australia. During the year, 741 single women were sent to the colonies, of whom 266 were selected by Miss Rye. The remittances have recently been increased. The number of persons sent out to New South Wales during the year was 670. The number assisted to South Australia was only 349. At present no passages to that colony are granted, but £30,000 has been voted by the Legislature for that purpose. The other South Pacific Colonies have ceased to supply funds in aid of emigration.

**MARRIAGE OF THE EMPEROR OF CHINA.**—An Oriental spectacle, reminding one of some of the scenes described in sacred history, and the marriage of Ahasuerus, was witnessed at Peking on March 27th. The young Emperor of China having reached the age of fourteen, the time had come when a wife had to be chosen for him. One hundred and twenty young girls, ranging from 11 to 19 years old, were admitted to the palace on the previous evening as candidates. Seven were chosen from the number, who had to submit to an examination before the Empress-mother—whose business it is to make the choice. 
