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The Pacific Scandal.

Exciting Developments. Yet more delay, more shirking. It is six weeks this time—until Parliament meets, so that the Committee may receive "further instructions."

When the Committee met on Thursday the Chairman read a letter from the Premier, declining the suggestion to telegraph to the home authorities. Mr. Macdonald's motion, that witnesses could not be examined except on oath, and that therefore application must be made to the House of Commons for instructions before proceeding further, was carried by three to two; and a motion to adjourn until the 13th August was made by Mr. Blanchet, and carried.

There is now positive proof of Mr. Huntington's main allegation. The Globe publishes to-day four columns of a most startling and instructive correspondence between Sir Hugh Allan and three others—Mr. C. M. Smith, of Chicago, Mr. McMullen, and an American gentleman of high position, whose name is withheld for the present. In these letters Sir Hugh again and again states that he has had about three hundred thousand dollars to pay in order to get the charter, and finally states the precise amount at \$366,500.

The draft of the proposed Spanish Federal Constitution provides that the President shall hold office for four years, and not be eligible for re-election; the Deputies cannot accept office as Ministers; the Cortes is to hold two sessions each year, the members to receive salaries; the public powers are divided into the judiciary, legislative, and executive departments, and European Spain is divided into eleven States, and Cuba, Porto Rico, and the Philippine Islands are constituted territories.
