LIGHT UPON THE LAKE

ELECTRIC BUOYS SET BETWEEN CHICAGO AND THE FAIR. Addition to the Navy Department Exhibit Completed—New System for Lighting the Harbors of Lake Cities—Chain of Thirteen Floating Lamps Anchored by 2,200-Pound Sinkers—Connected by a Tach Cable Which Lies Thirty Feet Deep.

It is the greatest thing of the kind in the world. It is seven miles long, has thirteen lights that can be seen ten miles, weighs 98,000 pounds, cost \$50,000, and Uncle Sam pays the bill. So says Capt. W. Wolcott Marks, about the Navy Department's exhibit at the World's Fair.

The exhibit consists of a system of electric light buoys from Chicago Harbor to the steamboat pier at Jackson Park, purchased by the government for Staten Island, where it will be located from a point east of the Park station to a point east of Hyde Park, and north to the breakwater of the lake front.

Each buoy consists of a cylindrical float, 100 pounds in weight, and is supported by a 2,200-pound sinker at the bottom. Each buoy is surrounded by an electric light of 100 candle-power and is supposed to be visible ten miles in clear weather.

On a number of volts to a lamp. Fifteen hundred volts of electricity furnished by the Exposition will be conducted to the lamps through the cable. This cable enters the buoy at the bottom and ends in a concrete pier near the top.

#### PLAIN WORDS WELL HANDLED.

The Secret of the Greatest Success in Literature. Nothing is more astonishing in literature than the meager variety of words to be found in the production of great writers. The same words recur time and again in Shakespeare. His noblest flights of fancy and his finest outbreaks of passion are expressed in simple terms that are daily in use in every intelligent American household. Addison, a prince of writers of graceful prose English, employs few words that the average school child does not understand and cannot define. The simplicity of the language in the "Pilgrim's Progress" is proverbial, yet it is sufficient to portray emotions ranging from the agonies of remorse to the raptures of the redeemed. The phraseology of Swift and Goldsmith, except when technical subjects are under discussion, is almost as limited. The Bible is largely a repetition of a few simple words.

Mastery of language consists in the proper arrangement of words rather than in a multiplicity of words. The use of simple terms is evidence of the highest art. It is the sole way, indeed, as a rule, in which the firmest and wisest impressions can be made. To attain such a command of speech depends in large measure upon the possession of imaginative faculties. Metaphor is frequently a substitute, not only for large words, but for many words. The use of metaphors depicts, and by its peculiar measure makes necessary the employment of terms that are readily understood. It should not be forgotten, also, that there are few pursuits that demand a varied vocabulary. Many of the technical terms used by a lawyer are of little practical worth to a physician, or a merchant, and vice versa. It is a questionable also if the English language is not worse for the multitude of unnecessary adjectives that have crept into it from one source and another. "Junius" looked upon adjectives as if they were personal enemies. Macaulay used them under protest. There is a peculiar force in the familiar observation of Thomas Hobbes—"Words are wise men's counters—they do but reckon by them—but they are the money of fools."

#### PARADOX OF THE NORTH POLE.

At the North Pole it is impossible to move in Any Direction but south. In the North Pole there is only one direction—south. One could go south in as many ways as there are points on the compass card, but every one of these ways is south, east and west have vanished. The hour of the day is a paradoxical conception, for that point is the meeting place of every meridian, and the time of all holds good, so that it is always any hour one cares to mention. Unpredictability is hence impossible—but the question grows complex, and its practical solution concerns few.

#### People Who Fall Safely.

A fall, as a rule, injures a drunken man more than a sober one, because the controlling power of the mind being rendered nil through intoxication, the body falls as an inert mass, and thus the chances of injury are lessened, for, strange though it may appear, it is no less a fact that the most numerous cases of injury arising from a fall are caused by the effort, voluntary or otherwise, to avert the consequences, thus straining the muscles and tendons. Very rarely are injurious effects from a fall known in a human being, for the same simple reason—the mind has no influence over the action of the body. And it is a remarkable and well-known fact to those who have to deal with such cases, adds the Boston Herald, that whatever injuries the Boston Herald, that whatever injuries the mind having more to do with retarding or assisting nature's efforts than is generally known or realized.

#### What Language Did Christ Speak?

A fascinating problem that has long engaged the attention of philosophers is the determination of what language was spoken by Christ—whether it was a dialect of Hebrew or a Hellenistic form of Greek. The controversy that arose as the result of the varying conjectures of biblical scholars is revived by the publication of Alexander Gardner's little book entitled "A Short Proof That Greek was the Language of Christ." Mr. Gardner takes issue with Renan and other illustrious semitic students and declares that in Christ's time Hebrew was a dead language, and the version of the Scriptures with which the people of Palestine were familiar was in Greek.

#### The Chinook Winds.

It is only within a few years, one might almost say months, that the wide effect of the warm, moist effect of the Pacific winds called Chinooks has been known in British Columbia and Alaska. These winds, corresponding exactly to those that make England a fertile country in the latitude of Labrador, keep the snow melted from the plain at the eastern base of the Rockies, and they encourage a magnificent growth of root crops, cabbage, oats and grass a thousand miles north of New York. Wheat does not do well and berries are small, though little attempt has been made to cultivate fruit. The winters are biting cold, but dry, and the summer, though short, is so hot that the vegetation comes out of the earth with a rush.

#### Excelsior Beneficial.

Farmers intelligently exchanging farm products for commercial feeds, even at the same price per ton, may secure not only an increase in feed, but also a gain in fertility. Market conditions do not recognize differences in the fertilizing constituents of feeds.

#### Sweet Corn Profitable.

Corn, other than sweet, is the best crop a farmer can raise, but it finds easier corn far more profitable to raise, easier to handle and quicker turned into cash

#### THERE IS MONEY IN IT.

If Your Poultry Do Not Pay Well Let the Women Take Charge—Then See the Change. When it has been proved over and over again that there is money to be made in keeping poultry, why is it that so few farmers get any of that money? I suppose there is a good many reasons, but none of them are good ones. Occasionally a farmer finds that the poultry paid pretty well, so he resolves to extend the business, and the way he goes about it is to double the number of hens, but not to duplicate the accommodations for them. The houses, rather crowded before, is now packed full, the hens being compelled to roost on everything available. When the house is full the result? The house gets full of lice as soon as spring opens; the hens do not lay well, nor hatch well; disease attacks them, and disgust with the whole business causes the farmer to neglect them more than ever. Now if this same man had increased his stock of cows or pigs, or sheep, he would have provided accommodations suited to the increased number. The woman would not have been guilty of such foolishness as trying to crowd two animals into a space not too big for one. If he had used the same judgment in providing extra room for the extra number of hens kept, he would have found a profit in keeping them. Another reason why some farmers fail to make the hens profitable is that they do not half feed them. They have the ridiculous idea that the hens should "get their own living" by eating "bugs" in summer, and what grain they can pick up in the barn yard in winter. The idea of feeding them as regularly as "hogs" in summer, and what grain they can pick up in the barn yard in winter, is a very good one. When they throw the hens a quart or so of corn and see how quickly it disappears, the cost of feeding them assumes large proportions. The remedy for this is, to let the wife or daughter have entire charge of the hens; give them a good house to keep them in and all the feed they ask for, with the understanding that the feed is to be paid for at market price and all money received from the sale of poultry and eggs to be divided on the investment as hens.—Stockman and Farmer.

#### Farm Notes.

Timothy hay and oats are expensive feeds. It does not follow because a farmer raises these crops that he should feed them, when other products, equally useful, may be purchased at a less cost per pound of actual nutriment.

#### To Grow the Finest Tomatoes.

Very little hand hoeing is necessary if you make your rows straight and keep the weeds down by thorough hoe cultivation. It may be well to pick off a few of the blossoms, thereby insuring larger, finer fruit, but I have never found anything but harm result from leaf pruning. The sun will scald the fruit badly, both in the North and in the South, and the largest, finest specimens are invariably made under thick leaves. The fruit rots badly when it rests on the ground, but we have found stakes in leaf pruning, the wire resembling a potato vine. But the best sort of tomato comes are coming also to possess this quality in great measure. The best varieties, well tested at present, both for winter and market use, are the Early Essex, Matchless and Ignomina. Climax, larger than the others. I have used Paris green in solution to kill the worms and found it effectual. This was done when the fruit was very small and the fruit wiped as crated.

#### That East Indian Statue.

I was much amused at the freedom with which a group of Dalmatian officers, named the statue of an East Indian Princess. It was life-like in its costume, olive pallor of complexion and attitude of leaning over a table as if reading an English journal which lay there. The girls felt of the rich texture of the blue silk robe, criticised the yellow damask satin scarf, the flowered silk trousers and embroidered shoes, and pronounced it a darling just as it lifted its eyes in well-bred astonishment and asked in fairly good English, "Can I of service be to you, ladies?" The girls giggled and retreated, and I would have given money to have seen the thoughts of that East Indian statue.

#### LAPPS BECOMING EXTINCT.

Yet They Show Eight Generations of a Family at the World's Fair. When the next world's fair is held it is not probable there will be any Laplanders present. Ten years ago there were 27,000 Laplanders. Now there are only 11,000. Death and amalgamation are making away with them as a distinctive branch of the human family. Ethnologically this may be the truth. It doesn't seem to agree very well with our idea of the Laplanders. Bull says he is 113 years old. His son, Bals Bull, he says, is 90 years of age. Bals Hygd Bull, the grandson, is 78. Bals Hygd Bull has a daughter 59 years old, and her son is 41. The grandson of Bals Hygd Bull has a son 29 years old. The daughter of this 29-year-old Bull is 14, and she has a little girl 9 years old. Thus, it appears, according to old King Bull, that eight generations of this family are living. Old King Bull, however, is a tough nut. It will not do to judge the Laplanders by him. He has located "a cave" not far from Lapland, on the Midway, and he has tried several times to drink all of the beer in that cave. The last time the Laplanders were invited to some gathering on the Midway old King Bull had such a head on him he would trust himself outside of the village. The Lapps were anxious to see old King Bull said they might if he would take care of them; he would trust them with Reilly, but with nobody else. Reilly is a young Columbia man from Dubuque. His beat is the Lapland village, and he has completely won the old chief's confidence. Reilly chaperoned the Lapps for a ride on the electric railway. And in the party were the five red-checked, dark-haired, bright-eyed, Dalmatian maidens who belong to the highest nobility in Lapland, and who came to the fair to wear hair ornaments, play the guitar and embroider as they do where the sun never sets in summer.

#### These Nomads of the North Look Rugged.

They may be long-lived as old King Bull claims. But they are the Indians of the North Pole region. They are being driven out of existence, just as are the North American aborigines. Settling by more civilized people is forcing the Lapps farther and farther to the north. It is taking possession of their lakes and their reindeer pastures. Some of the Lapps accept the changed conditions and lose their identity. Others cling to the life of their forefathers, maintain the purity of the blood and fall back into the mountains of the north. Of this latter class are old King Bull and his colony brought to the world's fair. They have with them their belongings, even to seventy tons of moose to feed the reindeer during the stay.—Correspondent St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
