CHURCH'S ETHAN ALLEN is a highly-finished and very stylish Stallion, with powerful muscular development, evenly balanced and well proportioned, and has stout, clean, hard bone and good feet. His trotting action is very fine, and he moves, both when jogging and when at full speed, with the pure, even, well-balanced gait that is characteristic of the Ethan Allen family, and with the vim and resolution that is peculiar to the Abdallah family.

His action is so true and perfect that he does not require weights to balance his action, or boots to protect him from interfering.

Standing to the height of 16 hards, wrapped above his black legs in a bright bay garb of silken sheen, presenting a 1200 pound form of great range, of beautiful finish and symmetry—a truly classic form in which are seen the lines of beauty and all the marks of speed, power, endurance, courage, kindness and intelligence. He is, indeed, a king of his species, and a crowning tribute to the breeder's art.

Bright bay Stallion, black points, star in forehead, white on near hind foot; 16 hands high; weighs 1200 pounds. Foaled first day of June, 1881; raised by HENRY A. CHURCH, of the Village of Dunham, Province of Quebec. Sired by Star Ethan, son of Daniel Lambert; cam, Church Maid. His sire, Star Ethan; dam out of Churchill horse, he by Vermont Black Hawk.

Star Ethan is not only a fast trotter himself, but has proved himself to be a remarkable sire of tast trotters. His dam, the Church Maid, upposed to be out of a St. Lawrence mare and English Stallion, is a trotter herself, for her limited opportunities. Never having been trained on a track yet she has shown wonderful speed and endurance; trotted on Knights' race course, in the Summer of 1885-after having had three colts and not being fitted—a quarter of a mile in 40 seconds, a 2.40 clip, being the last quarter of the mile made in 2.50. In her younger days has shown a trial in 2.36. She is a wonderful mare, though 16 years old. Competent horsemen claim with one season's training she would trot her mile in 2.30. Perfectly sound in every way, and bids fair to live many years.

Mr. Wallace, speaking of Sherman Morgan in the first volume of the American Trotting Register, says: "This was probably the best son of the original Morgan, and was the sire of the famous Black Hawk; Justin Morgan, foaled in 1793, and progenitor of the Morgan family of trotters, by True Briton, also called Beautiful Bay, claimed to be the son of the theroughbred horse, Imp. Traveller, but most probably was the son of Lloyd's Traveller, (2561,) son of Imp. Traveller.

A careful and critical examination of the trotting records show that ALLEN more than double as many fast trotters had descended from Vermon Black Hawk, in the male line, than from all other Stallions of the Morgan family combined. This was the more remarkable, as it is one of the oldest families of American trotters, and many hundreds o Stallions of the family had to be used in the stud. In fact it is clearly manifest that Black Hawk was as marked a departure from the Morgan family, especially in speed producing qualities, as Rysdyk's Hambletonian was from the Abdallah family. Both of these great sires really introduced new and distinctive characteristics into their respective families.

More than one-third of all the fast trotters of the Black Hawk brancl of the Morgan family are descendants in the direct male line of his son, Ethan Allen, who was not only a prepotent trotting sire, but was

Sixteen of these seventy have won five races or more, and less than ten, making in all twenty-seven that have won five or more races each.

One of the most significant facts appearing by the above table, is that Daniel Lambert has already sired nine trotters that have already trotted fifty or more recorded races each, and we have good reason to believe that there are two more, that, if fully identified under their different aliases, should be added to the list. The nearest approach to this record is that of Volunteer, who has sired six performers of fifty or more recorded races each. No other horse that ever lived has sired more than three.

The facts stated in the above tables are derived exclusively from published authoritative sources, namely, "Chester's Complete Trotting and Pacing Record," with very few additions from the summaries in "Wallace's Monthly."

We know of quite a number of the get of Daniel Lambert, with records and that have won races, not published in either of the above works, and therefore not included in these tables.

The table shows that Lambert has to his credit, already, twenty-six with records of 2.30, or better, of which one (Fred) is doubtful, and fifty-nine with records of 2.40 or better, all but four of which are winners.

The three living sires which approach most nearly to Daniel Lambert, in these respects, are Gen. Knox, Volunteer and Happy Medium, which compare as follows:
