CHURCH'S ETHAN ALLEN is a highly-finished and very stylish Stallion, with powerful muscular development, evenly balanced and well proportioned, and has stout, clean, hard bone and good feet. His trotting action is very fine, and he moves, both when jogging and when at full speed, with the pure, even, well-balanced gait that is characteristic of the Ethan Allen family, and with the vim and resolution that is peculiar to the Abdallah family.

His action is so true and perfect that he does not require weights to balance his action, or boots to protect him from interfering.

Standing to the height of 16 hands, wrapped above his black legs in a bright bay garb of silken sheen, presenting a 1200 pound form of great range, of beautiful finish and symmetry—a truly classic form in which are seen the lines of beauty and all the marks of speed, power, endurance, courage, kindness and intelligence. He is, indeed, a king of his species, and a crowning tribute to the breeder's art.

Bright bay Stallion, black points, star in forehead, white on near hind foot; 16 hands high; weighs 1200 pounds. Foaled first day of June, 1831; raised by HENRY A. CHURCH, of the Village of Dunham, Province of Quebec. Sired by Star Ethan, son of Daniel Lambert; dam, Church Maid. His sire, Star Ethan; dam out of Churchill horse, he by Vermont Black Hawk.

Star Ethan is not only a fast trotter himself, but has proved himself to be a remarkable sire of fast trotters. His dam, the Church Maid, supposed to be out of a St. Lawrence mare and English Stallion, is a trotter herself, for her limited opportunities. Never having been trained on a track yet she has shown wonderful speed and endurance; trotted on Knights' race course, in the Summer of 1885—after having had three colts and not being fitted—a quarter of a mile in 40 seconds, a 2.40 clip, being the last quarter of the mile made in 2.50. In her younger days has shown a trial in 2.36. She is a wonderful mare, although 16 years old. Competent horsemen claim with one season's training she would trot her mile in 2.30. Perfectly sound in every way, and bids fair to live many years.

His grandsire, Daniel Lambert, No. 102, sired by Ethan Allen (43;) record 2.25 in harness and 2.15 with running mate.

First dam Fanny Cook, by old Abdallah, sire of Rysdyk's Hambletonian.

Second dam by Stockholm's American Star, sire of 'he celebrated Seeley's American Star.

Third dam by Red Bird, son of Bishop's Hambletonian; he by Imp. Messenger.

Ethan Allen, (sire of Billy Barr, record of 2.23 $\frac{3}{4}$; Hotspur, 2.24; Pocahontas 2.26 $\frac{3}{4}$; Fanny Allen, 2.28 $\frac{1}{4}$; Fanny Lee, 2.29 $\frac{1}{4}$, and Warwick 2.29 $\frac{1}{4}$), by Vermont Black Hawk, son of Sherman Morgan, one of the best sons of Justin Morgan, founder of the Morgan family of trotters.

Dam, a grey mare that produced several trotters, and believed to be a Messenger.

Vermont Black Hawk, sire of Ethan Allen, record 2.25 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 2.15 with running mate; Lancet, 2.27 $\frac{1}{4}$; and Belle of Saratoga, 2.29; Young America, pacer, 2.23; by Sherman Morgan, son of Justin Morgan.

Dam, a mare of unknown breeding.

Sherman Morgan, by Justin Morgan. Dam, a fine and highly finished saddle mare, bought in Cranston, R. I., by Mr. Sherman, and claimed by Mr. Wallace to have been a Narragansett pacer.

Mr. Wallace, speaking of Sherman Morgan in the first volume of the American Trotting Register, says: "This was probably the best son of the original Morgan, and was the sire of the famous Black Hawk; Justin Morgan, foaled in 1793, and progenitor of the Morgan family of trotters, by True Briton, also called Beautiful Bay, claimed to be the son of the thoroughbred horse, Imp. Traveller, but most probably was the son of Lloyd's Traveller, (2561,) son of Imp. Traveller.

Dam claimed by some to have been a grandson of Imp. Wildair, and by others by the Lindsey Arabian.

Mr. Wallace says: "There is a strong probability that some of the blood of this famous Arabian flows in the veins of the Morgan family.

First Dam by Imp. Sour Krout. Second Dam, by Imp. Whirligig. Third Dam, Old Shammerkin, by Imp. Wildair. Fourth Dam, Imp. Cub mare, by Cub. &c., with nine more thoroughbred crosses, the thirteenth Dam being the Layton Barb mare.

For extended pedigree of Imp. Messenger and English Mambrino, see Almont No. 1; Stockholm's American Star, by Duroc, son of Imp. Diomed.

First Dam, Amanda, by Grey Diomed, thoroughbred son of Imp. Medley. Second Dam, by Virginia Cade, son of Partner, he by Imp. Traveller, out of Imp. Mare Selina, by the Godolphin Arabian. Virginia Cade's Dam was the Imp. Mare Kitty Fisher, by Cade, and her dam by Cullen Arabian, &c. Third Dam, by Independence, son of Young Fearnought, son of Imp. Fearnought. Fourth Dam, by Imp. Badger, son of Lord Chedworth's Bosphorous.

Stockholm's American Star won a two-mile race at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., about 1828, and sired Seeley's American Star, from whom many fast and game trotters have descended.

Red Bird, by Bishop's Hambletonian, son of Imp. Messenger.

Dam, Doct. White's famous brood mare, by Old Red Bird, son of McCarty's Cub, he by Yorick, son of Imp. Traveller, out of a thoroughbred mare, by Taylor's Silver Legs.

Daniel Lambert, as a begetter of speed and game quality, has no known rival, living or dead, except Blue Bull; his get, too, have great style and finish. Statistics published in Wilkes' Spirit of the Times show that of the great number of trotters that have appeared on the turf (some 20,000) only about 200 are recorded as having trotted 50 races or more each. Of these over 50 are of straight Morgan descent by their sires; by far more than belong to any other family. The dams of but 85 of these trotters are known, of which 25 are Morgan.

Lambert is the sire of nine of these notable trotters; Volunteer six. No other Stallion, living or dead, over three.

Perhaps nothing would show more the game quality of the Black Hawks, and the useful qualities of all Morgans, than this crucial test of the race-course. The Morgan horse is proverbially the family

horse, useful in all ways, cheerful, intelligent and faithful, bright and trappy to drive, ready and enduring to work, patterned after the Arabian in form, speed and endurance. He has the right to the proud distinction of the perfect horse.

Daniel Lambert, the distinguished sire of trotting horses, was foaled in 1858; is a golden chestnut star, one white hind foot, and in 1884 had sired 25 in the charmed circle of 2.30 and under list and many more in nearly 2.30. Since that date quite a number have been added to the list. He is a most wonderful horse. His service fee for the year 1884 was \$500 to warrant a foal, at Andover, Mass., supposed to be the only Stallion in the world whose service fee at that time was \$500.

Besides the 2.30 list of 25, his grandsons, H. B. Winship and Frank, with running mates, got records of 2.06 and 2.08½; also Billy D., 2.14½; old Ethan Lambert's sire got 2.25½ and 2.15 with mate; and so, in this way of going, the Lamberts exceed all others.

No one denies but Daniel Lambert is prepotent and transmits with wonderful certainty. Most any one can pick out a Lambert. His son Abraham is a trotter and sire of trotters. His son Aristos is a trotter and sire of trotters. His son Benjamin Franklin is a trotter and sire of trotters. His son Aurora is a trotter and sire of trotters. His son Star Ethan, is a trotter and sire of trotters. His son Lambertus is a trotter, put in the stud last year. His son Motion is a trotter, put in the stud last year; and so might go on, but it is useless to do so, for Daniel Lambert is so well known, his reputation so great, that no words can make him different from what he is—a great and noble horse, in fact, a king among horses.

A careful and critical examination of the trotting records show that more than double as many fast trotters had descended from Vermont Black Hawk, in the male line, than from all other Stallions of the Morgan family combined. This was the more remarkable, as it is one of the oldest families of American trotters, and many hundreds of Stallions of the family had to be used in the stud. In fact it is clearly manifest that Black Hawk was as marked a departure from the Morgan family, especially in speed producing qualities, as Rysdyk's Hambletonian was from the Abdallah family. Both of these great sires really introduced new and distinctive characteristics into their respective families.

More than one-third of all the fast trotters of the Black Hawk branch of the Morgan family are descendants in the direct male line of his son, Ethan Allen, who was not only a prepotent trotting sire, but was

ful, bright and himself much the fastest of the get of Vermont Black Hawk, and one of the purest gaited and best balanced trotters that ever lived. Ethan Allen stands with reference to the Black Hawk family as does Alexander's Abdallah to the Hambletonian, both being far in advance of any other son of their respective sires, in transmitting with uniformity to their descendants speed and the capacity to reproduce speed for successive generations. The records prove that about eighty trotters, with records of 2.30 or better, have descended from Ethan Allen and that nearly thirty of these, being over one-third of the whole number, were sired by his son Daniel Lambert.

Daniel Lambert is not and never has been a sensational sire. His progress has been so steady and uniform that the public expect each season to see some new ones of his get to drop into the 2.30 list, and in this he has never disappointed his friends. Nothing has equalled the bitter and persistent attacks made upon him by rival and jealous owners, except his ability to rise above their criticism and disapprove their unfounded assertions.

As a uniform producer of a high rate of speed, he stands without a rival, and that the unprejudiced horsemen of this country recognize this fact is best attested by the great and widespread demand for his sons and daughters.

Lambert's power to impart trotting speed is not confined to himself alone. The chief glory of a sire is that his descendants shall go on improving from generation to generation, until some son or grandson shall arise who will be greater than the father or grandfather.

From present indications this will be the case with CHURCH'S ETHAN ALLEN.

Of the above nine, all have Morgan dams (6 Black Hawks) except Ella Doe, whose dam was Columbus.

Sixteen of these seventy have won five races or more, and less than ten, making in all twenty-seven that have won five or more races each.

One of the most significant facts appearing by the above table, is that Daniel Lambert has already sired nine trotters that have already trotted fifty or more recorded races each, and we have good reason to believe that there are two more, that, if fully identified under their different aliases, should be added to the list. The nearest approach to this record is that of Volunteer, who has sired six performers of fifty or more recorded races each. No other horse that ever lived has sired more than three.

The facts stated in the above tables are derived exclusively from published authoritative sources, namely, "Chester's Complete Trotting and Pacing Record," with very few additions from the summaries in "Wallace's Monthly."

We know of quite a number of the get of Daniel Lambert, with records and that have won races, not published in either of the above works, and therefore not included in these tables.

The table shows that Lambert has to his credit, already, twenty-six with records of 2.30, or better, of which one (Fred) is doubtful, and fifty-nine with records of 2.40 or better, all but four of which are winners.

The three living sires which approach most nearly to Daniel Lambert, in these respects, are Gen. Knox, Volunteer and Happy Medium, which compare as follows :
