

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

Sir George Foster Denies That Canada is Unfairly Treated.

OTTAWA, Aug. 31 .- Sir George Foster this morning gave out a mem-orandum denying stories that conracts for large quantities of portable houses for army purposes were being placed in the United States which might be made in Canada. He says his is "but one sample of many others which from day to day are started on the rounds and give very much trou-ble and a good deal of heartburning, and which when followed up are found to be equally without foundation. "On the other hand, it is necessary to keep in mind that the allied gov ernments must be allowed to do their own purchasing as the conditions of the war and of finances make it possible. The immense amount and ur-gency of delivery of war orders must also be taken into account in comparison with the capacity for production and in regard to the amount and need for delivery."
