TROUBLE ENOUGH NOW

City Won't Try to Reroute Car Lines.

An attempt was made by Controller Church at the meeting of the board of control yesterday to have an application made to the railway board to put Winchester cars back on to Yonge-street, but the motion was voted down.
"If the board of control tries to reroute the car lines it will get itself into all kinds of trouble," said the mayor.
The controller also wanted information as to the closing of York-street in the viaduct. He asked for a return from the city engineer, corporation counsel and property commissioner re the closing of York-street by the viaduct plans, showing who was responsible for the same and who authorized it, and why the board of control and council were not advised of the same.
The controller ordered the information for him.
The mayor told him that D'Arcy Scott and Mr. Mountain, the railway commission's engineers, had ordered that way, and that they made a great many orders without the agreement of the city.
Controller Church moved that the city solicitor be required to furnish information as to what steps had been taken to improve the telephone service in Toronto, and the motion was passed.

WON'T BE OBJECTIONABLE

And Will Cheaper Coke, Say Promoters.

When seen yesterday C. H. Kirkham and Robert Mann, who are trying to secure 100 acres of land in Ashbridge's marsh for the establishment of a coke factory, declared that their plant, if constructed, would not be, at its worst, as malodorous as an ordinary gas-house. Their plant would not be for the manufacture of alkali products, such as were made at the plant of the Semt-Solney Company in Syracuse and which created such objectionable gases. Their plant would produce cheap coke here in Toronto.
"The whole project would not be financed in Canada, they said. A large percentage, if not all, of the capital would come from the United States.
Etiquette and precedence carry considerable weight among the school trustees, and Dr. Conboy has both in his favor. The others, Trustees Brown, Shaw and Hodgson, have all had the honor of filling the presiding officer's chair.
Unless there is a sudden upheaval the indications are that the trustees whose terms expire on Dec. 31, will, with one exception, have a walkover. The exception is in ward five, where W. P. Dunlop is in the field as rival to W. O. McTaggart.
The other trustees, whose terms are about to expire, are James W. Jackson, Dr. Miller, Alex. C. Lewis, R. B. Fairbairn and James Ellis.
Some pre-election thunder is forecast among the pros for to-morrow night's meeting of the board.

WORKMAN FATALLY HURT

Another Man Sustains Sprained Back—Were Working on Houses on Spadina-Road.
James Ball, 33 Condor-avenue, received injuries from which he died 20 minutes later, and Albert Plumtree, 10s Pears-avenue, severely sprained his back when the scaffold upon which they were at work at Spadina-road and Millbrook-street at noon yesterday collapsed.
They were employed by Earl & Astow, contractors, 79 Duggan-avenue, and were working on a scaffold at the third story of a row of houses. The boards of this were only inch lumber, and one of them broke. The men fell 40 feet. Ball's skull was fractured and he died before A. W. Miles' motor ambulance arrived. It conveyed the other injured man to Grace Hospital. His injuries are not serious.
Ball lived with his mother and sisters. The body was removed to the morgue. An inquest will be held.

GIDEONS WANT MORE MONEY

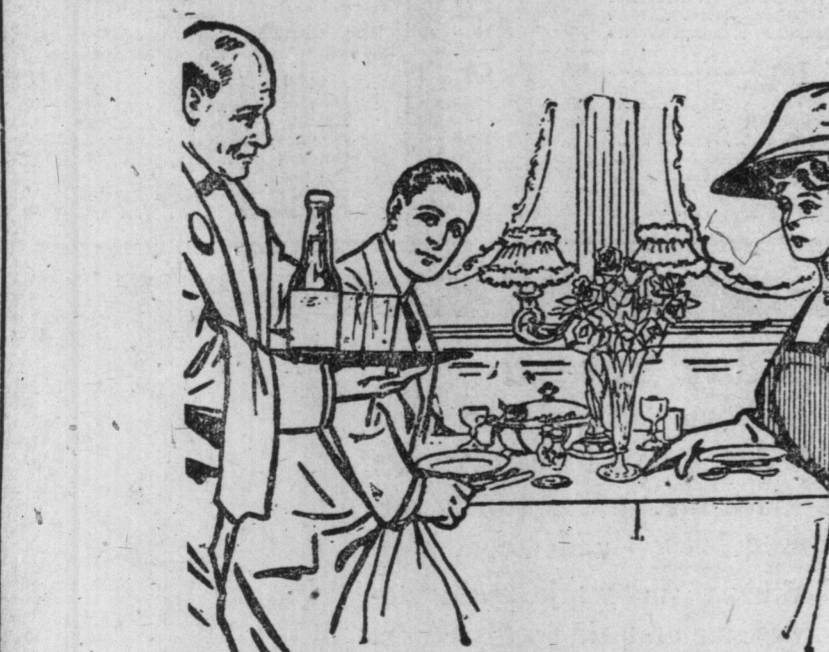
Secretary Douglas of the Gideons, the Christian Commercial Travelers' Association, is issuing an appeal for a \$5000 fund.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Dec. 19.—(Special.)—Thieves early to-day entered the jewelry store of Harry Laws, Welland, and nearly 60 watches and many rings were taken. They practically cleaned out the store, leaving no clue to their identity. The border is being guarded to prevent the escape of the thieves to the States.
Local authorities will ask the government to investigate the methods pursued by contractors in bringing foreign laborers into Canada.
The request results from a number of foreigners picked up by the local police during the week, who told of having been paid paltry sums for several months' work after the contractors deducted transportation charges from the wages.

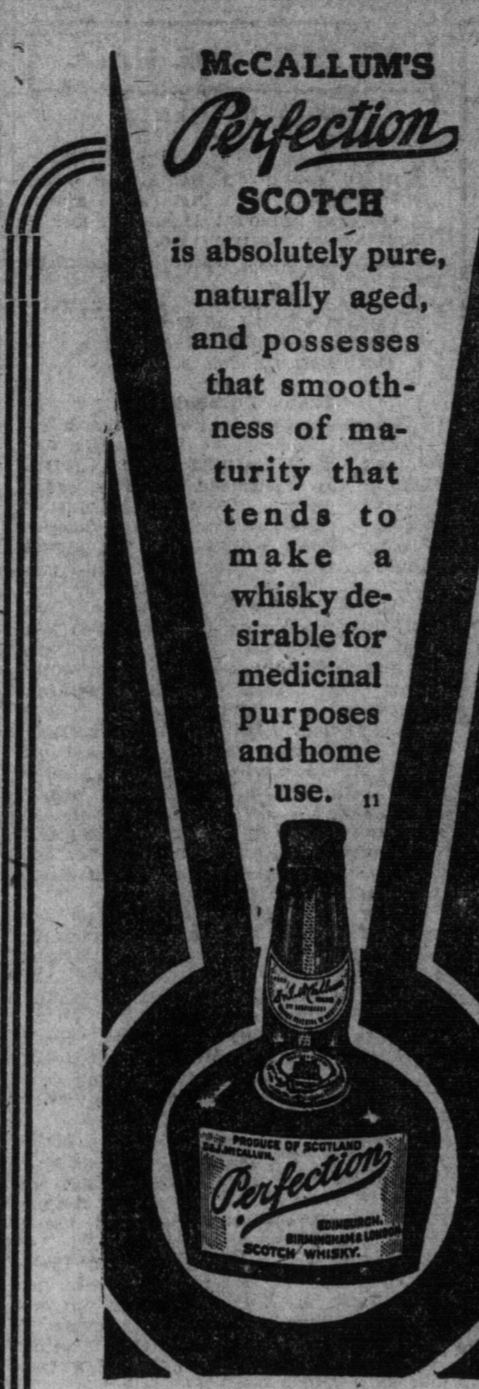

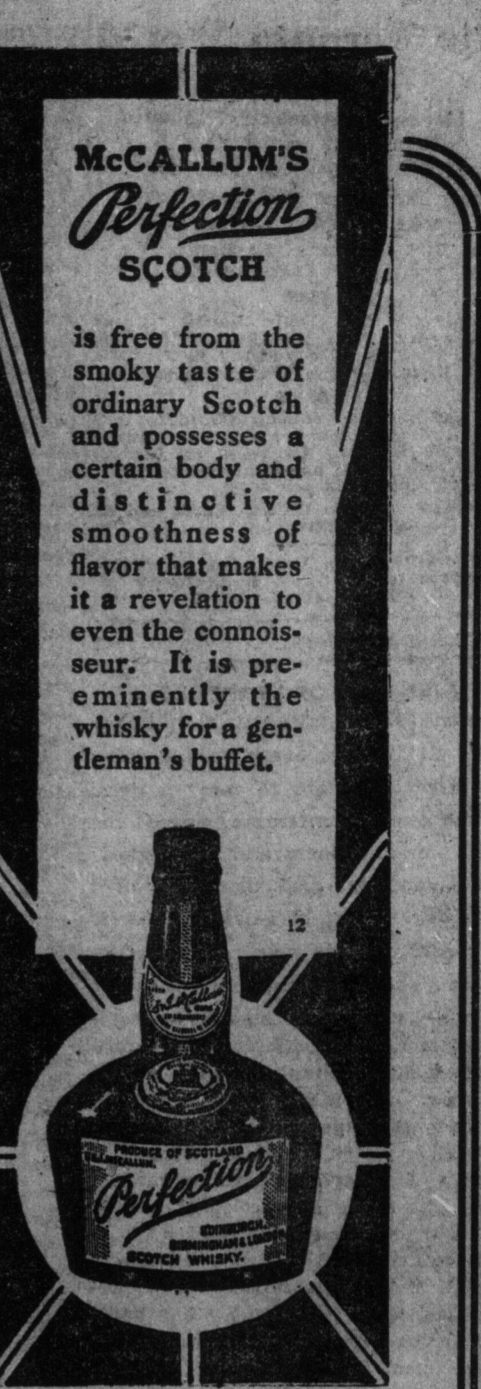

STREET RAILWAY WILL ABIDE BY BOARD'S ORDER

For Time Being, But Will Appeal—Effective as Soon as Schedules Are Ready.

An agreement has been reached between the Toronto Railway Company and the Ontario Railway Board. The board's orders will be carried out. This conclusion was arrived at yesterday afternoon at a meeting arranged between Chairman Leitch and the legal representatives of the city and railway company.

"FLYING POST" WILL NOT FLY AFTER MAY NEXT Postmaster-General So Decrees On Ground That It is Too Expensive.

OTTAWA, Dec. 19.—(Special.)—Exit the "Flying Post." The manner of its going is decreed in an announcement issued to-night by the postoffice department. It points out that last May the late government entered into a contract with the Grand Trunk Railway Co. for a special train to leave Toronto at 2.55 in the morning and reach London at 8.31 a.m. This was an entirely new departure in railway mail service and costs the country some \$40,000 a year.

NORTH TORONTO, Dec. 19.—(Special.)—There is very little perceptible improvement in the condition of the town streets during the last few days notwithstanding the freezing up of the ground and nothing can be done to help out the situation in the mind of the engineer until the frost sets in sufficiently strong to permit of the wearing of them down. A lot of loss and delay has been occasioned in town this fall and a number of buildings would have been practically finished, and now half done if the material necessary could have been forwarded.

Wants Damages From C.P.R. W. H. Tustin, flour and feed dealer of this city, is bringing suit against the C. P. R. for \$500 damages, before Judge Morgan and a jury in the county civil court. Plaintiff claims a C. P. R. engine struck and killed his horse and ruined his wagon and harness. A driver of Tustin's was unloading hay from a box car into the wagon near a siding. A string of box cars obstructed the driver's view of the oncoming engine, and it appears he was in the box car at the time the crash came. The case was adjourned.

To get over this difficulty a detour is made, according to the plans shown to the east, but this will sooner or later prove to be a big hardship and some way ought to be evolved right now for the carrying thru of the Avenue-road car line, when it does come in a straight line. All the good work of the North Toronto Council will be greatly minimized if a solution of the difficulty is not found.

MYSTERIOUS BILLY SMITH Murdered Boxer a Canadian by Birth—Some of His Battles.
