# STRIKE

Government Acts Promptly to Assist in Keeping Order in Cobalt.

Hon. W. J. Hanna had a telegram from P. J. Finlan, mayor of Cobalt, and Foreland Reeves, chairman of the committee, yesterday, asking, on account of the strike, if the provincial secretary could prevent the express companies from carrying liquor to the station until the strike be settled. The hotelkeepers at Haileybury and Latchford, it was stated, had promised not to sel any liquor in packages. The government, Mr. Hanna said, had taken the matter up with the T. & N. O. railway commission and the express companies operating, and had urged that no express packages whatever containing liquor be forwarded pend-

ing the settlement of the strike.

The government also gave instructions to the license commissioners in the district to see to it that the hotels at New Liskeard and Latchford do not sell any package liquor.
Should the hotels be found contributing to drunkenness the commissioners are so to report, and the licenses will







TRADE WITH AUSTRALIA. Returns Show Imports From Canada

Increased by \$350,00. OTTAWA, July 9.—The department of trade and commerce has received a report from J. S. Larke and D. H. Ross, Canadian trade agents in Sydney and Melbourne, Australia, re-

This year's harvest in Australia will probably be below the average owing to the dry weather. Good prospects for developing a good leather trade with Australia are reported, provided Canadian firms will devote sufficient attention to the Australian market. Canada's trade with Australia shows satisfactory increase. Australian imports from Canada last year totaled £303,751, an increase over the pre-ceeding year of over \$350,000. The increase was principally in textiles drugs. apples, paper, spirits and vegetables. On the other hand, Canadian exports to Australia decreased in lumber, agricultural implements and fish. Canada's imports from Australia totaled last year £72,688, an increase of about £30,000 over the preceding The principal increases were in meats, butter, wool, tin and coa-Canada imported butter to the value of over \$15,000 last year from Austral-

Dominion Report Made Public-Plums and Cherries Have Suffered.

OTTAWA, July 9 .- (Special.)-The Dominion fruit crop just reported gives the yield prospects for the year of which the following is a summary: June weather favorable on the

whole

Effects of May frosts now apparent but tree fruits have not suffered much, except plums and cherries. Prospects for apples encouraging. Pear crop a medium to full yield.

General outlook for plums hopeful, but Japan plums have deteriorated. British Columbia and Prince Edward Island crops will suffer. Cherries a fair crop. Sweet variety very light.

Grapes making good growth every-The lateness of the season has dislocated the small fruit trade mos seriously. Reports indicate:

Strawberries: A very short crop. Raspberries: General outlook light crop. Currants, especially, red, yielding well where bushes are protected from worm. There is less risk in growing the currant than any other of the small fruits.

Gooseberries: A medium to full Blackberries: A medium crop.
The late spring has very seriously educed the aggregate of tomatoes. One correspondent reports the loss of 500,000 plants.

APPLE CROP IN STATES.

NEW YORK, July 9.—It is claimed that there will be practically no apples at all in Missouri, Kansas and Indi-ana, but very few in Virginia, and only a small yield along the Hudson. The Oregon crop will be about half the average, but never is a competitor with eastern fruit. Michigan will have about 15 per cent, of an average yield, while it is expected that Western New York will have in the neighborhood of 80 to 90 per cent. of an average out-

Already the buyers are driving thru Western New York making offers for the output. The prevailing price to-day is \$3 for the fruit as it comes from the trees, but very few sales have been made at this price. Larger growers are holding off for \$4 and upwards.



residence for the business man. The air is baimy and pure. The surrounding country is the best of farm ands, where well-fed Clydesdales, shorthorns, Shropshires and grades graze in contentment. To travel out from the dusty smoky city on the evening train affords a delightful relief from the cobwebs of business and worry and gives the business man a fuller taste of the joy of living. House rents are so high in the city that a person may easily live here, pay rent and railway fare and do it cneaper than in the city. The run is only one hour from the Union Station, which is less than some runs on the Toront; street car lines.

Cheap Living. Living here is well supplied by the obliging merchants of the town at a cheap rate. House rent is low, a good house being secured for \$5 per month. 


