TWO STREET CARS COLLIDE

Forty-Four Passengers Just After Midnight This Morning Receive a Severe Shaking Up.

MOTORMAN E. KEARNS BADLY HURT

Conductor P. O'Connor's Arm Injured—Due to a Misunderstanding of No. 653's Moving.

At 12:03 this morning a bad smash-up took place at Woodbine-avenue between eastbound street car No. 653 and westbound car No. 615.

No. 615 was backing up to go on the Y, but Motorman Kearns, on No. 653, thought it was continuing on the line, and went ahead. A collision resulted.

There were 45 passengers on No. 653 and 9 on No. 615. All were badly shaken up and frightened.

Motorman E. Kearns, 1-2 Shuter-street, was badly hurt internally, and had to be taken home in a cab.

Conductor P. O'Connor of No. 615 had his arm severely injured. Dr. Brown attended to the injured.

This is the only accident the Street Railway had on Dominion Day.

DUWHICK AT GALT.

James H. Buck upset from a canoe and sinks.

Galt, July 1.—A fatal canoe accident happened on the Grand River here about 2 o'clock this afternoon, resulting in the drowning of James H. Buck, a young man, aged about 18 years, employed as a trimmer by A. J. Galt, 4 Young Buck and a relative, named Gamble of Palmerston of about his own age, who was visiting him. The boat was on a fishing trip up the river this afternoon. They informed the boathouse keeper that they understood rowing, but never handled a canoe. As the latter was the only thing of the kind available at the time, they took it, but apparently came to grief shortly afterwards. When about 100 yards north of the C.P.R. bridge, an alarm was given to George Rosenberg, by three young fellows in a row-boat, that the men in the canoe were drowning. Rosenberg, who is a corporation employe, and an expert swimmer and diver, hastened to their rescue and managed, single-handed, to land Gamble, who was clinging to the capsized canoe. Buck was in sight at the time in water 10 feet deep, trying to make the shore. Rosenberg returned to the scene after landing Gamble, but could not locate Buck, who had sunk for the last time. Rosenberg says that Buck had stayed with the canoe or had the three men in the rowboat, who gave the alarm, had rendered assistance. Instead of rowing away from the scene altogether, as the frightened, Buck's life would have been saved. The body had not been recovered.

ACCIDENT AT BROCKVILLE.

Wharf Collapses and Throws Many Children Into Water.

Brockville, July 1.—The A.O.U.W. held a picnic, etc., at St. Lawrence Park, a few miles up the river from here, today. The crowd congregated on the wharf to take the boat for home after the celebration, and the old wharf collapsed under their weight, precipitating the nearly everybody into the river. Fortunately the water was not very deep, and everyone was rescued, not much the worse for the ducking, except two ladies, who were injured by falling timbers, but not seriously. There were many children on the wharf at the time of the accident, and it is a wonder there were no fatalities.

mark, Prince Frederick, Prince Charles of Denmark and their wives and by the foreign attaches.

The Duke of Connaught and Lord Roberts, the Commander-in-Chief, surrounded by brilliant staffs, rode behind the Prince of Wales party.

The line of troops completely filled thousands of spectators filled the stands or stood behind the line.

Among the interested onlookers were Prince "Edgy" and the other children of the Prince and Princess of Wales. All the colonial premiers, Indian princes and other guests of the nation were present, and out of the ranks and members of the House of Commons without end.

Princess Alexandra Veterans.

The troops quickly marched past the Queen's carriage, the Prince of Wales receiving the salute. The Queen then drove slowly and out of the lines, and the Prince of Wales closely inspected the troops and dismounted and conferred medals and crosses on those who had merited the honor. Shaking hands with the recipients of the Victoria Cross.

Then followed the most picturesque feature of the day. The Duke of Connaught, at the head of the troops and facing the Prince of Wales, gave the command: "The parade will give three cheers for the King." He himself started the "hip" and in a moment the refrain was taken up, and there rose cheers such as London seldom hears, the sound of which must have reached almost to the royal sick room half a mile away. Helms, caps and campaign hats rose in waving confusion at the bayonet drill and the assembled crowds joined in with equal vigor.

Cheers Mixed With Tears.

A man in the Canadian ranks shouted "And a tiger," at which the troops and crowd once more belated themselves hoarse. It was the first occasion since the announcement of the King's illness that the general public had an opportunity to free their throats to their feelings, and the people took advantage of it. After this the Life Guards rode up to the Queen's carriage, the King amid cheers, not unmixed with tears of the women, many of whom were deeply affected.

Queen Drove Slowly Past the troops, bowing smiling acknowledgments of the people's greetings. The Queen drove slowly past the other members of the Royal family followed, the colonials reformed in column and amidst hearty cheers from the ranks returned to their encampments.

Celebrities Were Photographed.

Subsequently the Canadian troops paraded in the Canadian arch and white-helmeted and were afterwards photographed. The arch will be illuminated to-night.

A Public Thanksgiving.

There is some talk in official circles of a public thanksgiving at St. Paul's Cathedral when the King is sufficient recovered to attend, but nothing has been definitely settled. The proposal, if carried out, will be quite different from the coronation, when it takes the form of a religious ceremony. The invitations to foreign powers will be considerably curtailed, being restricted to countries connected with Great Britain by ties of blood or special friendship.

THE 800 A CITY.

New Ontario is likely soon to boast a city, the new aspirant for urban rank being Sault Ste. Marie, the capital of East Algoma.

According to the recent assessment returns, the population of the "800" includes only householders and their families, is about 8500, an increase of 2300 or 25 per cent, in the past twelve months. Two suburbs of the town, situated near the Clergue works and known as Steelton and Tagona, are said to contain 1800 and 800 people respectively. By including these two settlements, the new candidate for cityhood would probably boast a showing of 11,000 to 12,000 people.

The 800 Star makes the latter estimate its figure. A town has to have only 10,000 people when it applies for a city charter.

In one year the assessed value of property in the town has jumped 33 per cent to \$4,151,000, a remarkable showing.

Who would have dared ten, or even five years ago to have prophesied that at this date the wilds of New Ontario would contain a city? The enterprise of the Consolidated Lake Superior Company is due the striking growth of Sault Ste. Marie.

And it will not be long before Greater Ontario will support more cities. Two we have now in sight, Fox, Arthur and Fort William, to wit. The twin towns at the head of the lakes will before long obtain urban rank.

MANITOBA CROP OUTLOOK.

The weather of the past few weeks has been extremely disagreeable, but it has not been without its compensations. Reports from all outlying points are excellent, excepting on low-lying lands, the growing grain is in an exceptionally promising condition. The balance of the province, in spite of the backward weather, much of it will head out at an earlier period than usual; and this, provided that we have reasonable weather during July and the early part of August, will ensure one of the best crops of wheat in the history of the province.

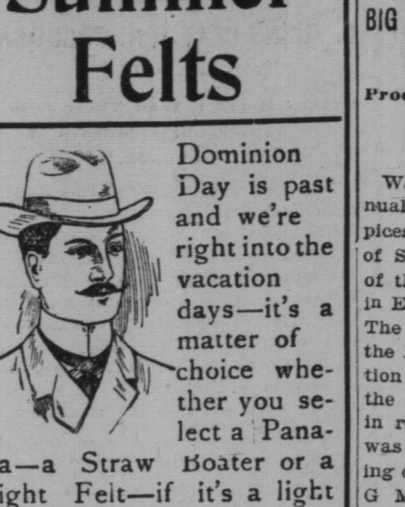
