



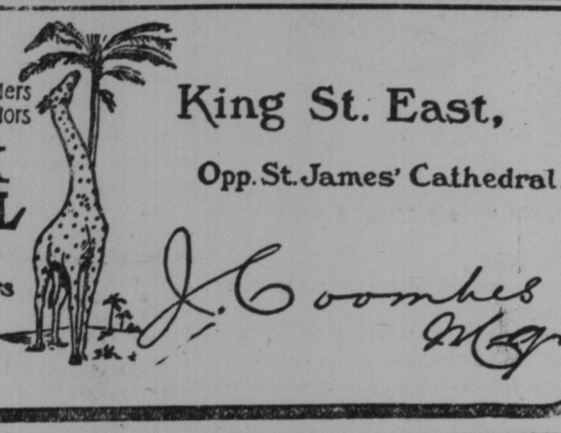

They went from room to room. They raced from end to end of the big building. Steel engravings of priceless value, rosewood desks, costly chandeliers were broken into bits, the interior resembling more a stable than a modern business office. The mob then rushed from the door as the cry of troops was heard with a big picture frame around his neck, from which he hung a costly painting. This was the way vandals went through the administration building of the big Ciergiev works.

### MOB FACED SOLDIERS.

And they were not scared by the appearance of soldiers. Half a block away the command was given to load and make ready to go. The mob stood its ground without wavering. It had reached enormous proportions. There were 1000 men present. They marched up and the sullen crowd opened to let them pass, hurling stones on the rear line. One daring leader struck one of the best men of the mob back with an umbrella as he passed. A shout of applause greeted the attack, and then the mob turned and two got ready for fight, but the order was not given to fire. Then the troops took possession and the mob swarmed around them.

### FOOD WHAT THEY WANTED.

Magistrate Quibb stepped out again with the Riot Act in his hand. He delivered an address to the men before him. He said that he would not pay the men, but that they must go home and get their own food. This put the men in good spirits, and they gave three cheers for the King with right good grace. Some of them did not give away when the troops made ready to fire. Their failure encouraged them and they began to yell and howl, and with the ropes and stretch with which he had been helping him the building still in his hand, springing on a box and declaring that he was hungry and had been treated like dogs and for one would as soon be shot dead as starved to death. The men yelled approvingly.
